## SCHOOL CANDIDATES MAKE STATEMENTS

Public attention is being focused on the up-coming School Board election to be held Saturday, April 1. Voters will cast ballots for the Junior High school.

Six candidates have entered the race to fill two places on the Spearman School Board Terms expiring for Max Baggerly and Tommy Gooch. Moore elected not to seek reelection.

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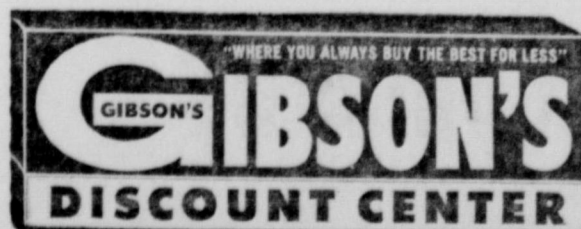

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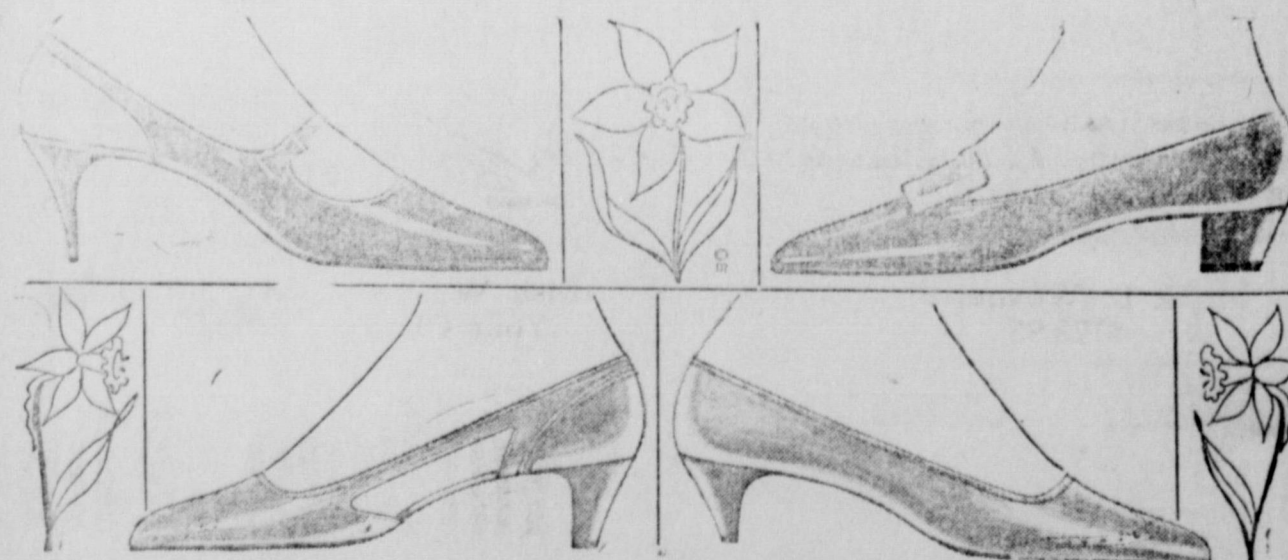

THE LYNX TRACK TEAM PLACED 9th IN 31 TEAM MEET (This was the Panhandle Relays last Friday and Saturday.)

The Spearman High School Track Team scored almost as many points in this single meet as they scored all season last year. In scoring 20 points the Lynx placed 9th in team standings. The Lynx defeated 22 other teams and lost to 8 opening their season on a winning note. Only 21 of the 31 teams entered were able to score points as competition was strong.

The Lynx sprint relay team composed of sophomores Wesley Jenkins, Tom Henderson, Mike Davis and Bobby Smith made it to the finals Saturday after turning in the 4th best relay time of 31 teams by running a 46.1 Friday in the prelims. However, in the finals between the top 8 teams Lynx anchor man Bobby Smith was slowed when a Wellington runner fell in Spearman's lane. This dropped the young Lynx sprinters from 4th to 8th and Smith brought the baton in 7th place...just one place out from points.

The Lynx mile relay team of Harley Reeves, Jim Brown, Joe Hutchison, and Hal Shufeldt placed 5th in the meet out of 29 teams entered in this endurance event. They turned in their best time of 3:42.2. Joe Hutchison ran a 55.5 leg, Harley Reeves a 57.4, Jim Brown a 56.0 and Hal Shufeldt a 53.3. Harley Reeves is the only Senior on the team and the only senior on the entire squad.

Junior Lynn Alls who was recruited from the P.E. classes two weeks ago started the coaches and his teammates by placing 6th out of 47 entries in the grueling 300 yd. Intermediate Hurdle race. He ran a 45.5 in the prelims and came on strong in the finals with a 43.3 finish. First place and a new meet record was a 42.0. The coaches expect much from Lynn as he is far from his potential yet. He could well be one of the finest hurdlers in the panhandle area before long.

Junior Mike Hendrick placed 3rd in the high jump clearing 5'6" & going out on 5'8". This is Mike's best performance to date. There were over 50 high jumpers entered in the meet. The class B defending state champion placed first clearing 6'2".

Hal Shufeldt, only a junior, raced to a fine 2nd place finish in the 440 dash and good time of 53.3. Again, Hal competed against 52 entries in this event.

I was very proud of the team. They did well considering that this was their opening meet and everyone else had already competed in at least one meet prior to the Panhandle Relays. Our kids are far from being in top

shape. They can double their physical condition in the next two weeks if the weather will cooperate. I expect improvement in every area as the weeks progress and as the boys gain in knowledge and meet experience.

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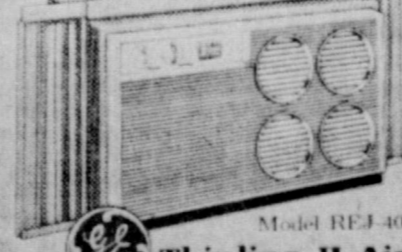

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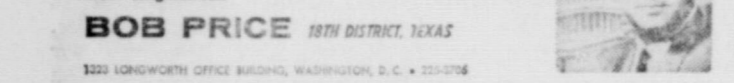

**Washington Report**  
From Congressman

The cost in dollars as well as loss of lives in the Viet Nam War continues to rise. Since my last report the Congress has approved an additional 12 billion dollars to carry on the war. This brings the total supplemental appropriations this session to 16.5 billion dollars.  
Even with this additional burden on the American taxpayer the President wants to continue pouring more money into domestic programs of doubtful value. If next year's budget were frozen at this year's level the taxpayer would be saved quite a lot of money - and a tax increase would be unnecessary.  
For example, if twelve recently-started programs such as the poverty war, Peace Corps, National Teachers Corps, and Demonstration Cities were held at present levels 1.2 billion dollars could be saved. In addition, a 10 percent cut in foreign aid, which has two year's money supply already in the pipeline, would save 253 million dollars. These cuts would not curtail these programs because both have huge amounts of unspent funds on hand.  
These figures make it clear that LBJ is making no efforts to trim spending to the realities of a war-time economy. They reveal a disregard for fiscal responsibility, and exploitation of the taxpayer while domestic spending goes up and up. If everyone must sacrifice, the government should, too.  
Since my last report I have had the opportunity to attend a briefing by the Defense Intelligence Agency at the invitation of Chairman L. Mendel Rivers of the Committee on Armed Services. It is quite evident from the information received at this briefing that the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese were tremendously effective in their efforts to resupply their troops during

the recent Lunar New Year truce. It is also quite evident that the President must be backed fully in his determination not to halt the bombing everytime someone thinks there "might be a chance" of peace talks if the bombing is stopped. The bombing has been stopped five times during the last two years, and all the communists have done is to build up their supplies.  
In the continuing battle with the bureaucracy, I have asked the Post Office Department to reconsider plans to discontinue railway post office service between Denver and Amarillo. I do not see how service can be improved, as the Post Office Department claims, by discontinuing the use of these cars which allow mail to be sorted enroute to its destination.  
I have received many letters recently in regard to the President's proposals for overhauling the draft. The Committee on Armed Services expects to hold extensive hearings in the weeks to come. I will be studying the record of these hearings closely in an effort to determine the most fair and equitable means of choosing young men to serve in the armed forces.

## Spearman's Airport Is A Very Valuable Community Asset

Everything and anything which ever constructed on Texas was carved out of a cow pasture. It is certainly true of things in Spearman, and especially the Spearman Air Port. The Spearman airport bases planes (with more licensed than any city of this size in the State of Texas! For instance, more planes are based here than at the Borger airport, and at least seventy licenses are in Spearman. There are instrumented pilots, including the operator, who regularly out of this airport. Another is presently working on his instrument rating. The present airport started in 1945 as a grass pasture west of the Santa Fe tracks. Taylor yard and the Spearman Redi-Mix plant. When businesses began to build, they began to land of necessity the far edge of the Santa Fe. A few hangars were built on the NE end of the strip adjacent to the property, which charge being made to the owners. In 1959, several local pilots and time, and, with permission of the railroad, the strip could discontinue use of property at any time, laid a wide strip of caliche and

hard surfaced it. They installed runway lights, the length being 2,965 feet. Substantial donations to this cause were made by among others, Tom Penn and Baker-Taylor. At the time when the present operator, Carroll Thompson, moved onto the field in June 1963, there were 8 aircraft based on the strip. Today there are 14 hangers and 28 aircraft based on the field, and in addition, at least 12 more aircraft based at owner's homes use the airport regularly. When there are 50 aircraft based on the field, Spearman will be eligible for a direct line to the Federal Aviation Agency's Flight Service Station at Dalhart, for weather briefing and flight plan filing. In 1963, Lester McLain, owner of property between the Santa Fe property and the north-south county road west of it, began to subdivide and sell lots along the west side of his property, reserving permanently a strip 100 feet wide east of the hangar lots for a runway. Recently the opportunity arose to acquire a strip 190 feet wide and one half mile long immediately north of this, making a combined length of strip available for a 4,380 foot runway. This property together with the strip reserved for runway on the McLain property has been deeded to the City of Spearman.

Work is now underway on constructing a hard surfaced, lighted strip to be 50 feet wide. Money to purchase the additional land was donated by interested pilots and others, with enough left over to start this new construction. Today, NOT ONE CENT OF CITY, STATE, or FEDERAL money has been spent on this airport. It is strictly a project of people who like to fly, joined by others who realize that aviation will be an increasingly valuable community asset! The airport is now supporting four families, which qualifies it as a going business concern! These are: Carroll Thompson, his father Mr. C. H. Thompson, his brother Dick Thompson who recently moved here from Booker, and Jake Guy. In addition, two high school ICT (Industrial Cooperative Training) students train here during the school year. Most of the flight instruction is handled by Dick Thompson who recently concluded a ground school course for eight students, and has started the course for five more. . . all of whom are taking flight instruction. Carroll averages 5 annual in inspections per month, including 6 aircraft from Wilbarger county near Wichita Falls, and 2 from Kansas. His ratings include Commercial; Single and Multi engine, Land; Instrument; Flight Instructor; Flight Instructor; Instrument Flight Instructor; Aircraft and Powerplant, with inspection

authorization; and is now working on his Air Transport Rating (ATIR). When business is slack . . . in the wintertime . . . the boys rebuild wrecked planes . . . 12 up to now . . . and in the spring and summer they usually stay quite busy spraying greenbugs, weeds, etc. Future plans (more accurately, hopes) call for installation of a low frequency low power homing beacon north of the north-south runway, making instrument approaches possible, which is a much safer mode of arrival than blundering around under low clouds trying to keep the ground in sight at all times. Need your greenbugs sprayed? Need a quick trip to Mexico? Want to learn to fly, or take instrument training? Need your plane repaired . . . it's all available at Spearman's Airport

### NEED FOR NEW VALUES EDITORIAL

Nothing shows more forcefully how far out of perspective values of human life have become than the need for the American Cancer Society's five-year educational program to drastically reduce unnecessary deaths from cancer. The Society has selected six sites of cancer, representing over 60 per cent of all cancer cases and some 48 per cent of all cancer deaths, for special educational emphasis. These sites of cancer - uterus, breast, lung, colon and rectum, oral cavity and skin - accounted for nearly 150,000 deaths in 1966, many of them due to lack of personal responsibility and personal vigilance. Take three samples: lung cancer took more than 50,000 lives last year; most lung cancers are caused by cigarette smoking. (Despite intensive warnings more than half of all teen-agers ignore the scientifically proved dangers to their health and become regular cigarette smokers by the time they are 18). Skin cancer took nearly 5,000 lives; most skin cancers are caused by too frequent over-exposure to direct sunlight. Uterine cancer took the lives of about 14,000 women; yet, due to the Pap test, it should be possible to detect this cancer at a stage when the chances of cure are virtually 100 per cent. Need for intensified and broadened instruction about cancer is in itself a harsh tragedy. People just do not behave as they should. Motivating people to take proper action can be difficult and frustrating, as it has been to the American Cancer Society. How difficult it is, is shockingly apparent in the five-year educational goals fixed by the Society. The goals are minimal, far below ideal, but goals, based on hard experience, that the Society believes can be achieved. We urge our readers to learn cancer's warning signals, act on them; have an annual health checkup, and contribute to the very important work of the American Cancer Society.

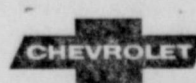

Here is Rebecca Hutchison's winning recipe for Pumpkin Bread. I'm sure you will want to try it.

- 3 1/3 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons soda
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 2/3 cup chopped pecans
- 2/3 cups chopped dates
- 2/3 cups sugar
- 2/3 cup salad oil
- 4 eggs
- 2 cups canned pumpkin
- 2/3 cup water.
- 1. Sift and measure flour.
- 2. Add baking powder, soda, salt and spices; sift together two times.
- 3. Toss nuts and dates lightly in flour mixture.
- 4. Beat sugar and oil in mixer at slow speed.
- 5. Add eggs one at a time.
- 6. Add pumpkin.
- 7. Add flour mixture and water alternately.
- 8. Beat until thoroughly mixed.

9. Pour into greased loaf pan.  
10. Bake in 350 degrees F. oven for 1 hour. Yields 1 large loaf.

Durable press fabric now has its own special thread. "Dual Duty" thread is designed particularly for sewing durable-press knits and stretch fabrics. Available in many sewing centers, the new thread sews and irons like cotton thread but gives the stronger, more durable seams of a synthetic thread.

The first "Dual Duty" thread had a nylon core which is being replaced by a core of polyester covered with silicone-treated cotton. The nylon gave twisting and knotting problems in hand sewing.

The thread, size 60, comes in a range of 30 colors including black and white.

The manufacturer makes these recommendations for sewing with "Dual Duty" thread.

Don't break the thread when you take it from the spool; cut it on a slant for easy threading.

Use a light touch when hand sewing and a loose tension when machine stitching.

Use a short length of thread (about 18 inches) and an embroidery needle when hand sewing.

Test the machine stitch on a double thickness of fabric until you have a smooth seam. A ripple at the end of a seam is caused by too much pressure on the pressure foot. To correct, loosen the pressure bar screw.

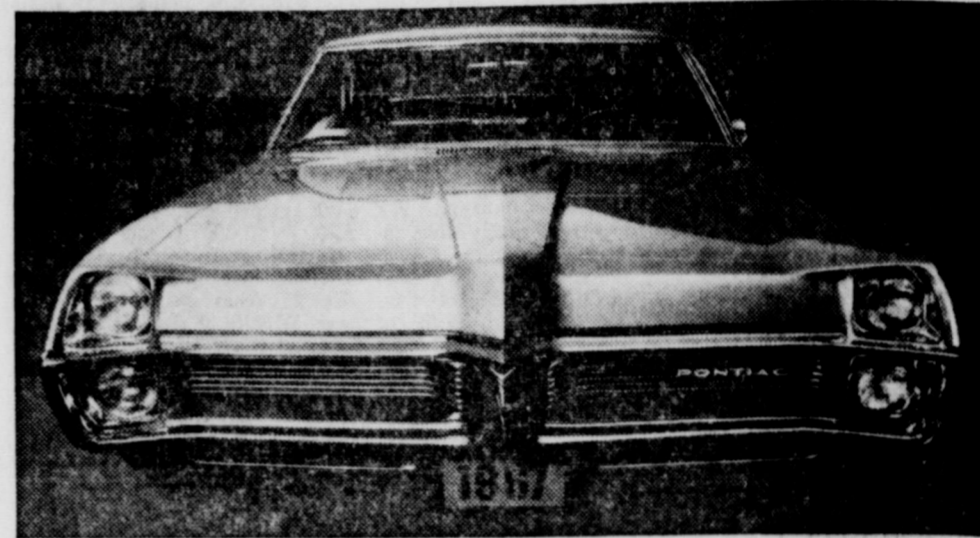

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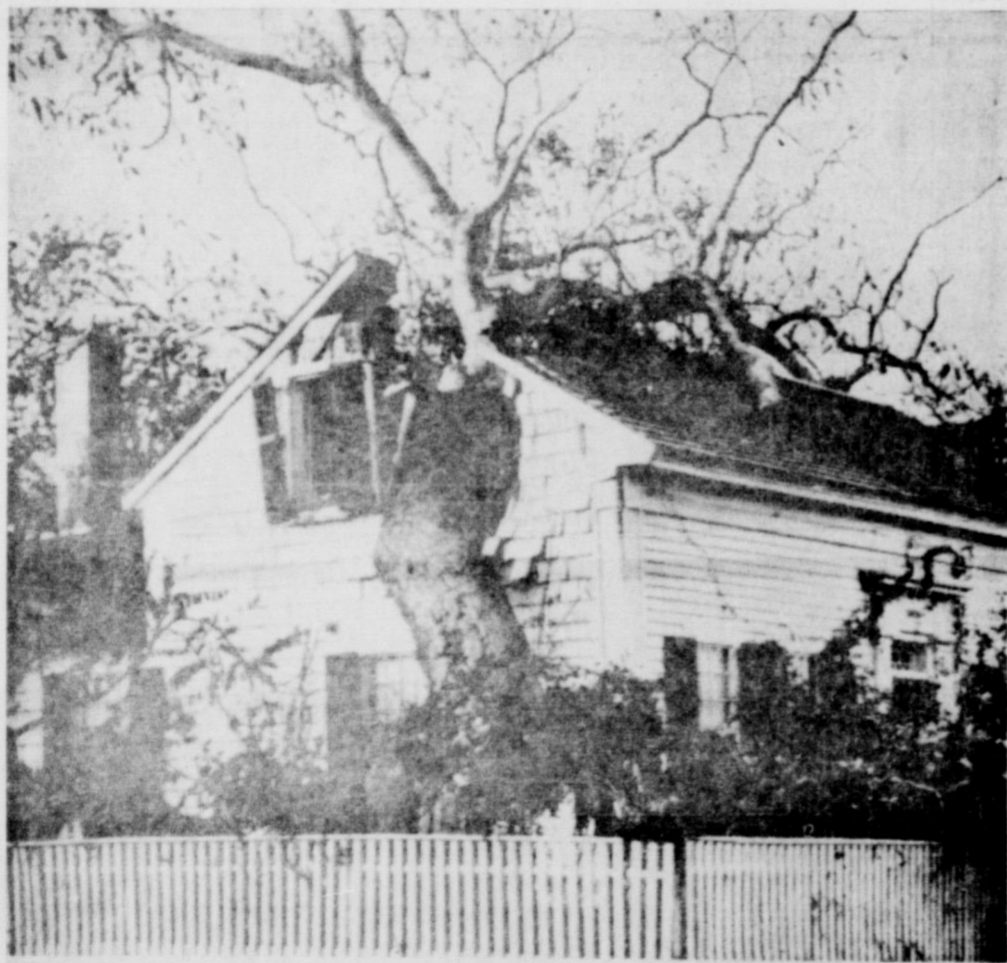
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
