First Snowfall December 9th

WTCC Concludes Spearman Study

Spearman needs more rental property, according to a study conducted by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Spearman was among 15 small west Texas towns which were studied during the past two weeks by representatives from the chamber to determine assets and problems and eventually arrive at solutions to these problems.

Members of the chamber's committee to study small towns met with representatives of 25 federal agencies in Washington Monday. The group will examine the services available from the agencies which would be helpful to the towns. They will then pass the information along to local leaders.

The analysis of Spearman showed the need for financing of construction of the proposed Palo Duro Dam on Palo Duro Creek eight miles north of Spearman. The study also showed that the town has a 30 to 70 year underground water supply, and that the city desperately needs more rental property.

Richard Counties, member of the WTCC, conducted the meeting held last Friday in Spearman. In February, hearings will be conducted to discuss the findings of the studies. Solutions to the individual community problems will be recommended by the committee in a report to the town.

Two Navy Deserters Captured Morse Robbery Is Solved

Sheriff J. B. Cooke reports that the local Sheriff's Dept. has been extra busy the past two weeks. Last week, local officers drove to Cordell, Okla., where they secured a statement from Vestal Lesley, that he had burglarized the Long Grocery in Morse, during the early part of December. Lesley took a pair of binoculars, and several wrist watches. The binoculars were recovered, but Lesley flushed the watches down the commode in the Cordell jail. He had smuggled the watches into the jail.

Two Navy deserters were picked up Monday night. One deserter had been AWOL for more than a year. The two men were from Ken and Okla. The men were released to the Air Police in Amarillo for transfer to proper Naval officers for disposition of the cases. Sheriff Cooke reports one incident exposure case tried in JP court this week, resulting in a \$500 fine to the accused. Also, one aggravated assault case was filed in county court.

City Aldermen Hear Nov. Report

City Aldermen heard the November report by City officials at the Monday night meeting held at the city hall.

Corporate Court Judge T. J. Pittman reported 93 cases heard with a total of \$885.00 fines assessed after (work-out) hours total fines were collected amounted to \$367.00.

Police Chief Lelan Wood reported 3 thefts during November. Two of these were recovered, one is outstanding, 80 traffic tickets were issued, 13 arrests were made and 6 accidents with a total of \$2,410.00 in damages but no injuries.

The animal control picked up 35 animals for the pound, 19 were destroyed, the others were "baled out." The fire department reported 7 calls. Most of these were trash fires, where burning trash had blown out of the barrels causing grass fires.

The auditor, Jett Mason, gave the annual audit report which was accepted as presented by the council. Manager Darce Foshee reported that the city had purchased two new 2-way radios for the Police cars. Bari Blevins of WTSU was home over the week-end visiting his parents Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Blevins.

MOTION FOR LIBRARY RECEIVED NO SECOND

The Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday afternoon in the Judges chambers. They approved the purchase of a historical marker for Hansford Cemetery (see story in this issue) and appointed Mrs. Dickie Robinson to serve as county health nurse. This is the first county nurse position. She will assist the county health officer, Dr. Damon Greig, and will receive no salary. She will be recognized by the State, as one of the first nurses in the State of Texas to serve in this capacity in a county the size of Hansford. Commissioner Joe Day made the motion that the County call an election on a \$100,000 bond election

for a new Library building. The motion died for lack of a second. In a case like this, the Judge is not allowed to second a motion, but he can vote in case of a tie. Some time ago petitions were circulated for the building of a new Library. Enough names were secured to petition the court for one. Judge Lee was authorized to suspend time for construction of an overpass near Morse in case of bad weather. The \$20,000 project is to be completed within 60 days. Commissioners present include: Joe Day, precinct 1; Ed Vernon, precinct 2; B. W. Renner, precinct 3 and George Lowe, precinct 4, along with Judge Lee and Clerk Keesee Richardson.

**City Employee
 Gets Citation**

AUSTIN---An official State Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Billy Gene Lowry, plant operations specialist for the Spearman water supply and sewage treatment system. The citation reflects the regard in which Lowry is held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Lowry's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

someone to tell his wife to come with the car. Sergeant Gamage took the child into the back seat of the car and continued his life-saving efforts. There was still no visible signs of life in the boy until just as the ambulance arrived the child began to respond. By this time the Sergeant was so exhausted he was barely able to get out of the car. The ambulance attendants immediately applied oxygen to the child and, accompanied by Mrs. Gamage, took the boy to Huntington Hospital where doctors took over.

Sergeant Gamage followed the ambulance to the hospital where he was told that the boy was alive. Reliable sources at the hospital stated that, without a doubt, the boy was alive because of the life saving attempts of Sergeant Gamage.

This is not the first time that the Sergeant has had a close call with death by drowning. He stated that when he saw the boy lying there he saw his own son. Seven years ago, his son David, then five years of age, was saved from drowning while swimming at a pool in Houston, Texas. A quick acting lifeguard saved his life with mouth to mouth resuscitation.

On Sunday, Sergeant Gamage saw young David Hyde, playing and shouting at home with the other children. Sergeant Gamage was asked how he felt to see the boy back in good health. He stated simply, "I was awful glad".

The following news story concerning SSGT. Edward H. Gamage was clipped from the Hemingford Abbots, England newspaper.

Sgt. Gamage is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Prater of Spearman. His wife is the former Lavonia Prater. The couple have been stationed in England 3 years. They have two children: Fred, age 4 and Eddie David, age 9. Sgt. Gamage is in the US Air Force.

Few people ever get the opportunity to repay a life saving debt. Last Wednesday Sgt. Edward H. Gamage, a camera repairman in the 10th Armament and Electronics Sq. had his chance. FARMERS TAX GUIDE

The 1967 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide is now available in my office. If you would like a copy, please come by the office or call or drop me a card and I will mail you one.

INVESTMENT TAX CREDIT SUSPENDED

There are several income tax changes this year that will affect farmers, ranchers and other self-employed people. According to James I. Mallett, Extension farm management specialist at Texas A & M University, there are two noteworthy suspensions.

First, the 7 percent investment tax credit on machinery and certain real property has been suspended on investments of over \$20,000 for period October 10, 1966, through December 31, 1967.

Mallett says investments which otherwise qualify for the investment tax credit and were purchased during the current tax year and before the October 10 suspension, are still eligible for the tax credit. The tax credit can mean quite a reduction in income taxes since it's deducted directly from the amount of taxes to be paid.

However, taxpayers may still select up to \$20,000 of investments made during the suspension period (October 10 1966-Dec. 31, 1967) to be eligible for the investment credit. Mallett says taxpayers need to decide which tax year, the remainder of 1966, or all of 1967, to make investments up to \$20,000 for the investment tax credit.

The carryover period for unused investment credit has extended from 5 to 7 years and the 2 year carry-back period is unchanged, he says.

Another suspension—the right to use rapid depreciation rates on buildings costing \$50,000 or more is suspended except for "buildings whose construction was begun before October 10, 1966, or where the taxpayer was under contracts in effect on October 9, 1966, calling for later construction."

The suspension applies only to property that would be used in a trade or a business—not property used for investment or rental purposes. The legislation does not affect the right to claim the 20 percent first year additional depreciation on tangible personal property with an expected useful life of six years or more for use in a trade or business.

HOMEMAKING

I want to publicly congratulate Sylvia Parks, 4-H member from Morse, who recently won a national award in the 4-H Electric Award program. She has won a \$500 scholarship from Westinghouse Corporation, who sponsors the 4-H Electric Awards Program.

Sylvia has worked very hard the past few years to win just such an award, and her perseverance has now paid off handsomely.

To my knowledge, Sylvia is the first National 4-H winner from Hansford County, but may be not be the last.

When did you last check your food supply? Do you know what food items you have on hand. It's a good idea to keep an ample stock of staple foods such as flour, sugar, salt, meal, baking powder, shortening, regularly used seasonings and canned milk or non-fat milk.

Equally important to have available: frozen or dried foods from each of the four food groups. This should prevent extra trips to the store and assure you that your family will have a good diet from one pay day until the next.

If a large portion of your food allowance is spent on perishable foods as soon as the money is available, it may be difficult to stretch your food supply until another paycheck. However, if you plan your meals in advance and stock your shelves for emergencies, you should be able to serve nutritious meals most anytime.

Now that winter is on its way to our area stockpiling for weather emergencies should be done soon. THE STRANGER AT THE DOOR

Some strangers who come to your door are well meaning people with legitimate business. The Better Business Bureau gives these cautions when answering the door.

1. Do not let anyone into your home until his or her intentions have been definitely established. If alone, this is not always advisable. One might say, "I think I will call my neighbor in - she might be interested in what you have to offer."
2. Beware of persons who claim to be making a survey or representing themselves as government officials wanting information.
3. Beware of "free offers and ask the sales person to write down the free articles you are to receive, signing his name. Usually there are strings attached.
4. Read carefully anything you are requested to sign and suggest that the representative come back after you have discussed the matter with a member of the family. What you think is a receipt or statement could be a contract to purchase.
5. Beware of statements that "you were the winner of a contest" or "selected for advertising purposes."
6. If the caller is rude or discourteous call the police.
7. If in doubt about the integrity of a firm call the Better Business Bureau before buying.

For the family with plans for a new dishwasher -

Make a quick survey of the market before you decide. Dishwashers, like automatic clothes washers, operate with a series of wash-rinse cycles. After a pre-rinse, high pressure sprays of hot water and concentrated detergent strike dishes from all angles to scrub food off. The dishes are then rinsed and re-washed many times over, followed by hot air drying. All good automatics wash dishes clean, provided an adequate supply of sufficiently hot water is available and the proper amount of detergent is used. 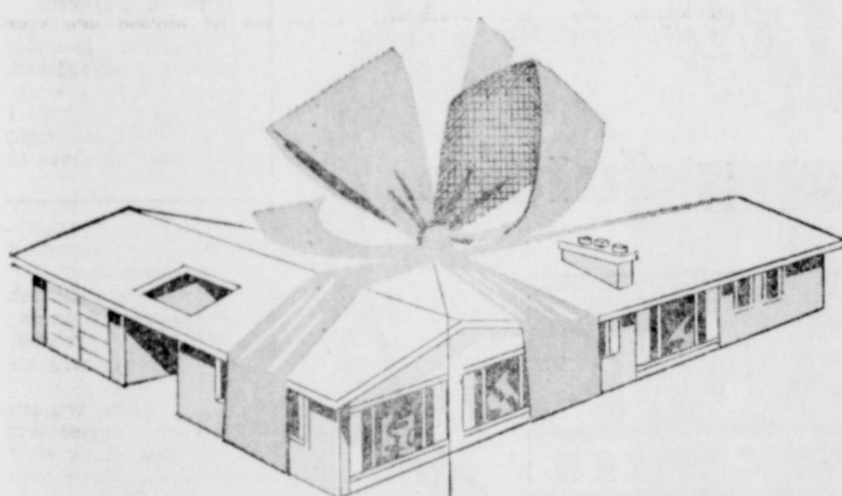

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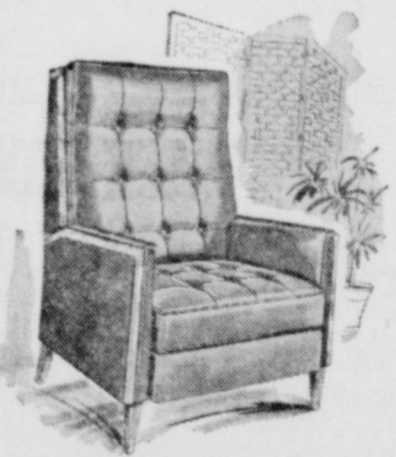
