

Broke 26-Year Record At Girl's State

Three of the four girls from Hansford County attending Girls state in Austin this week were elected to high offices and inaugurated Monday.

Debra Brock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Brock of Spearman, was chosen Governor and Cloetta Fullbright, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orville Fullbright of Spearman, was elected lieutenant Governor.

Diane Stedje of Gruver was elected as Justice of the Supreme Court. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Stedje.

It was the first time in the history of Girls State that delegates from the same school (and same county) were elected to the two top positions. The girls will be Seniors next year.

The 1967 Session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls held at Baylor U in 1941, to become the largest single extra-curricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. This year 400 girls are in attendance, plus two from Mexico City, making a total of more than 7,600 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. The purpose of the program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults.

The 400 girls made up a mythical "51st State" while in Austin. For a period of time the citizens of Girls State organize their own government that is city, county and state in accordance with regular election procedures. Every hour of the day they had a definite part in the functions of that State.

Debra and Cloetta worked hard on their "offices" before leaving Spearman. History teacher Mr. Jim Allen helped them with their government studies. The girls wrote campaign speeches and slogans, even wrote campaign songs which they sang in harmony. On the bus leaving from Amarillo they placed the big sign "Debra For Governor." Their bus, the first to reach Austin, met all other delegates as they arrived and assisted with their luggage. This was planned as part of their campaign!

Associate Justice Meade Griffin of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the various elected state officials of Bluebonnet Girls State Monday June 19 in the Rotunda of the State Capitol.

Climaxing the session which began June 14 and ends June 23 will be the selection of two outstanding citizens of 1967 who will be sent to Girls Nation in Washington, D. C. by the American Legion Auxiliary where the two young representatives will continue their study in responsibilities of the Republic.

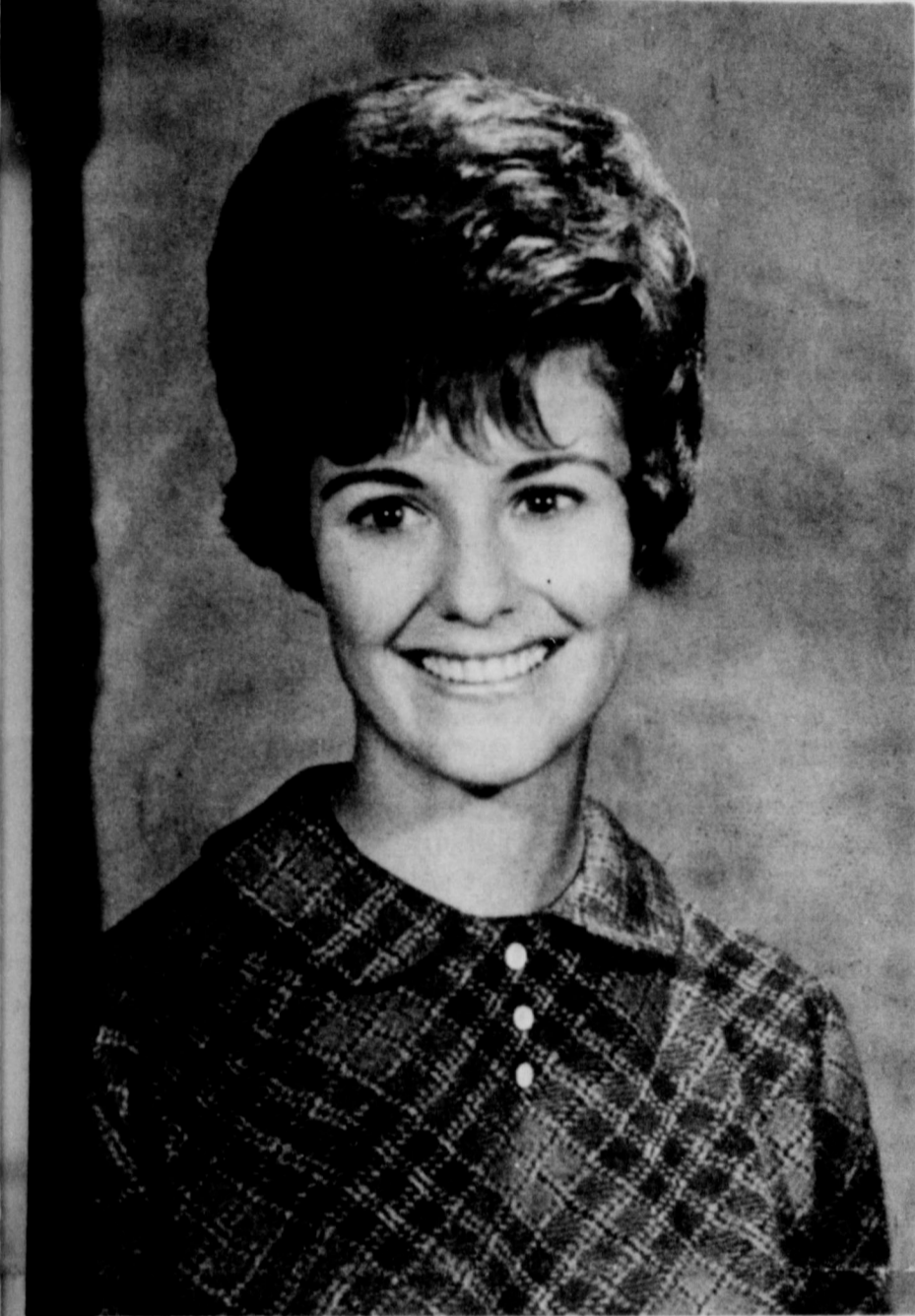
Debra is a Spearman High School cheerleader and Cloetta is a talented speech and drama student. Both girls are members of the National Honor Society.

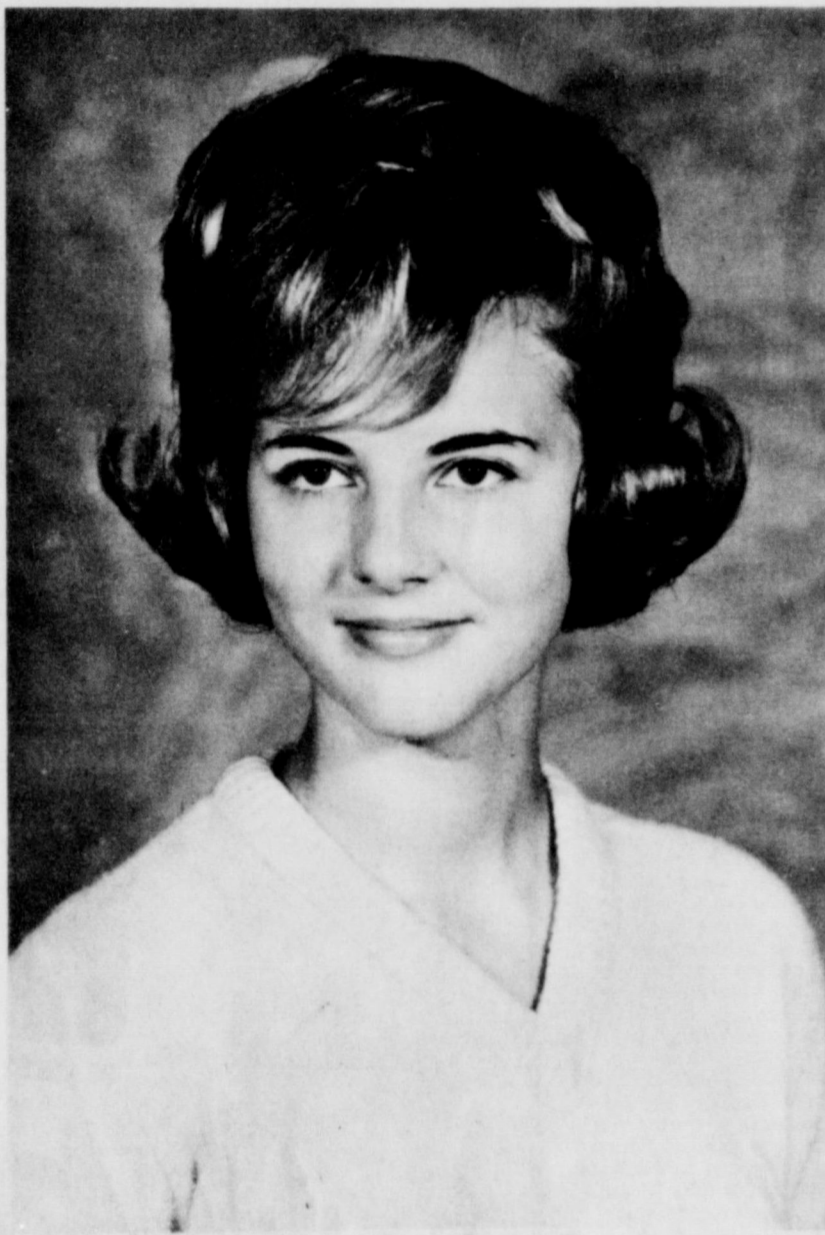

City councilmen met in regular session Monday night and heard a representative from St. Regis Paper Co. of Houston tell about the newest method in disposing of city trash.

The council made no definite decision on the paper bags, but are considering using some on trial basis. In the near future covered cans will be placed in a two block area in the south part of the city, on trial for a while. Councilmen are working toward a no trash burning ordinance.

School Board Votes Increase In School Teacher Salaries

At a regular school board meeting Tuesday night, the board voted a \$630.00 yearly salary increase for all class room teachers. This is in accordance with the State Senate Bill recently passed.

Salary increases will be made according to teacher's qualifications. Special assignment teachers will receive the increase if they are not already getting the maximum pay-scale wage.

Superintendent, Dr. B. E. Reeves, said this would help very much in securing teachers for recruiting has been real tough this year. Not many have applied for jobs with Spearman school system.

He needs to find teachers to replace W. W. Smith, Mrs. Eula Goodall, Mrs. Herndon, Mrs. Jerry Hawkins. A speech therapist has been approved for the school, but no one can be found for this position. He also needs an additional English teacher for High School.

Dr. Reeves said he had been interviewed by officials from a large school down state, to accept a position there. He told them he was not looking for a job and in fact would like to stay in Spearman; however if salary increase was attractive enough he would be available. Dr. Reeves has not heard further from the inquiring officials.

Reeves said he had instituted several programs in the Spearman school he would like to see through to the end.

In Tuesday's meeting the board took steps in requiring teachers to return to school. Those with Masters degrees will have to take six hours every 5 years. BA degrees will need 6 hours more schooling every 3 years.

It is the custom for the Rolling Plains Mule Train to make at least one big trip during the summer.

They will be off again for another cross country trek next week and local citizens will be seeing them in and on the news for an Associated Press news man has contacted them for information on their trip.

This year they chose to go west into northern New Mexico and will be gone for three weeks. Wagons and mules will be hauled from fifteen towns from four states into Cimarron, New Mexico on June 28. June 29, the mule skinnners will harness their mules along with the out-riders and hit the trail of Highway 64 headed for Ute Park where they will camp their first night.

The next day, Friday, they will leave for Eagle Nest and that evening will camp south of the Laguna Vista Lodge camping grounds provided by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Sullivan. July 1st they will go down Highway 38 to Red River and make camp at the bottom of Ski Range awaiting the parade of July 4th. After the July 4th celebration, train members will be sightseeing in the mountains on their mules. They will stay in Red River until about July 7 and then leave for Questa where they will stay overnight. They will then head out for Taos on July 8 where they will remain for several days. After this stay at Taos, they plan to leave the morning of July 12 for Raton to take part in the celebration staged by the Jaycees there on July 14 and 15.

While in Raton, they will be guests of the Raton Jaycees and camping on the property of Mayor James R. Arrington. They will begin the celebration with a trail ride up into lake country with breakfast, lunch and an evening barbecue. The parade will begin at 10 a.m. July 15 with the Rodeo Friday night and Saturday afternoon with a dance each night. The mule skinnners will be special guests at LaMesa Park that week-end with the Race Track officials honoring them with a special dedication.

The New Mexico Police Department will be assisting them during the entire trip for added safety precaution.

Wheat Yields Are Varied

After a few days rest due to heavy rains, combines began to roll across county wheat fields Monday. Elevators in Spearman reported lots of wheat delivered Monday, but slower Tuesday as heavy clouds again filled the sky.

Grain men report that yields are as varied as there are number of fields, which have been hit hard by nearly every destructive force the weather affords.

A devastating hail storm hit out in the Holt community last Thursday evening and literally wiped out a strip four miles wide by several miles long. Wheat was damaged from 100 percent to light. Along with the 3 inches of hail, came 2 and a half inches of hard, blowing rain. Spearman itself measured about 2 inches of rain last week.

Despite the razing by drought, and then hard freezes, the wheat is expected to produce on the average around 20 to 30 bushels. However, yields reports are so varied, no accurate picture can be drawn as yet, with yields as low as 2 bushels an acre up to 35 bushels per acre.

One grain man said there would be a lot of 20-bushel fields cut, but a lot more

10-15 bushel yields experienced.

Some of the dry land wheat, in isolated spots on small acreages, cut 19-20 bushels.

One elevator man said the best irrigated wheat delivered to him was cutting 30-40 bushel averages.

Hardly anyone anticipated a good yield from this years crop attributing the low yield to late freeze damage.

As usual, only the actual totaling of the grain after it has been cut will give any true account of the crop for 1967.

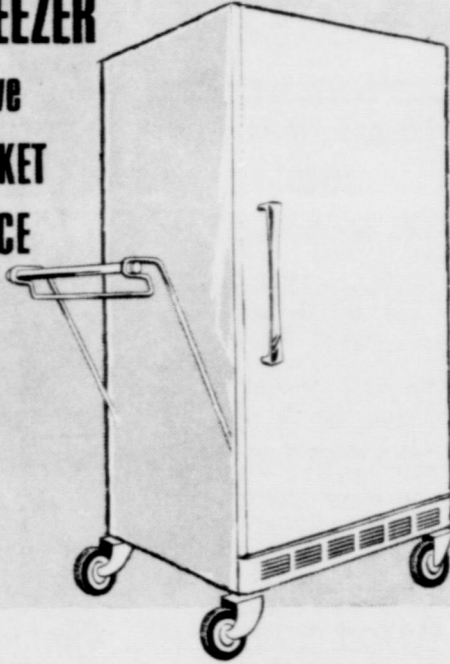

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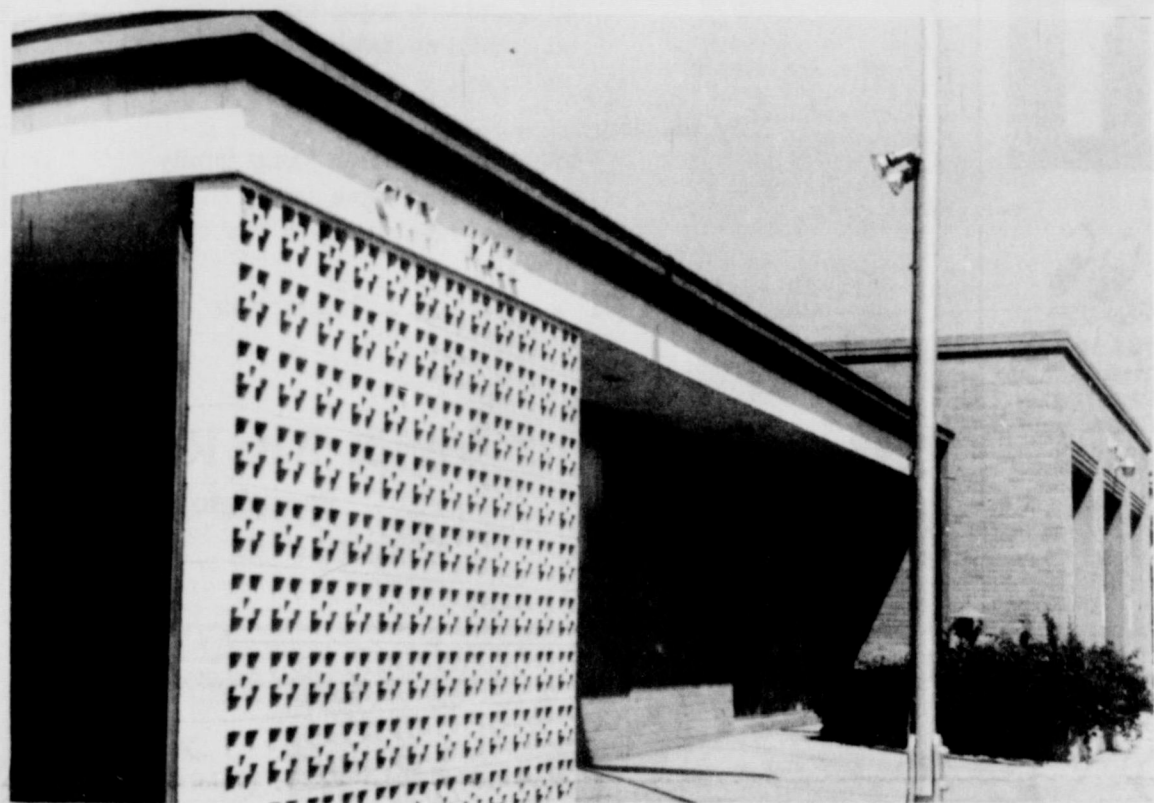
