nor. Diane Stedje of Gruver was elected as Justice of the Supreme Court. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Stedje.


It was the first time in the history of Girls State that delegates from the same school (and same county) were elected to the two top posit-ions. The girls will be Sen-

iors next year. The 1967 Session of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls held at Baylor U in 1941, to become the largest single extra curricular educational program for high sc-hool girls in Texas. This year 400 girls are in attendance. plus two from Mexico City. making a total of more than 7.600 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism act-ivity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. The purpose of the program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults.

The 400 girls made up a my thical "51st State" while in Austin. For a period of time the citizens of Girls State organize their own government that is city, county and state in accordance with regular election procedures. Every hour of the day they had a definate part in the functions of that State.

Debra and Cloetta worked hard on their "offices" before leaving Spearman. History teacher Mr, Jim Allen helped them with their government studies. The girls wrote cam-paign speeches and slogans, even wrote campaign songs which they sung in harmony. On the bus leaving from Am-arillo they placed the big sign "Debra For Governor."

Wheat Yields

Are Varied After a few days rest due

to heavy rains, combines began to roll across county wheat fields Monday. Elev-ators in Spearman reported lots of wheat delivered Monday, but slower Tuesday as heavy clouds again filled the sky. Grain men report that yi-

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elds are as varied as there are number of fields, which have been hit hard by nearly every destructive force the weather affords.

A devasting hail storm hit out in the Holt community last Thursday evening and li-terally wiped out a strip four miles wide by several miles long. Wheat was damaged from 100 percent to light. Along with the 3 inches of hail came 2 and a half inhail, came 2 and a half inches of hard, blowing rain. Spearman itself measured about 2 inches of rain last week.

Despite the razing by dr-outh, and then hard freezes, the wheat is expected to produce on the average around 20 to 30 bushels. However, vields reports are so varied, no accurate picture can be drawn as yet, with yields as low as 2 bushels an acre up to 35 bushels per acre. One grain man said there

would be a lot of 20-bushel fields cut, but a lot more

10-15 bushel yields experienced.

Some of the dry land wheat, in isolated spots on small ac-reages, cut 19-20 bushels. One elevator man said the best irrigated wheat delivered to him was cutting 30-40 bushel averages.

Hardly anyone anticipated a good yield from this years crop attributing the low yie-ld to late freeze damage. As usual, only the actual totaling of the grain after it has been cut will give any true account of the crop for 1967.
