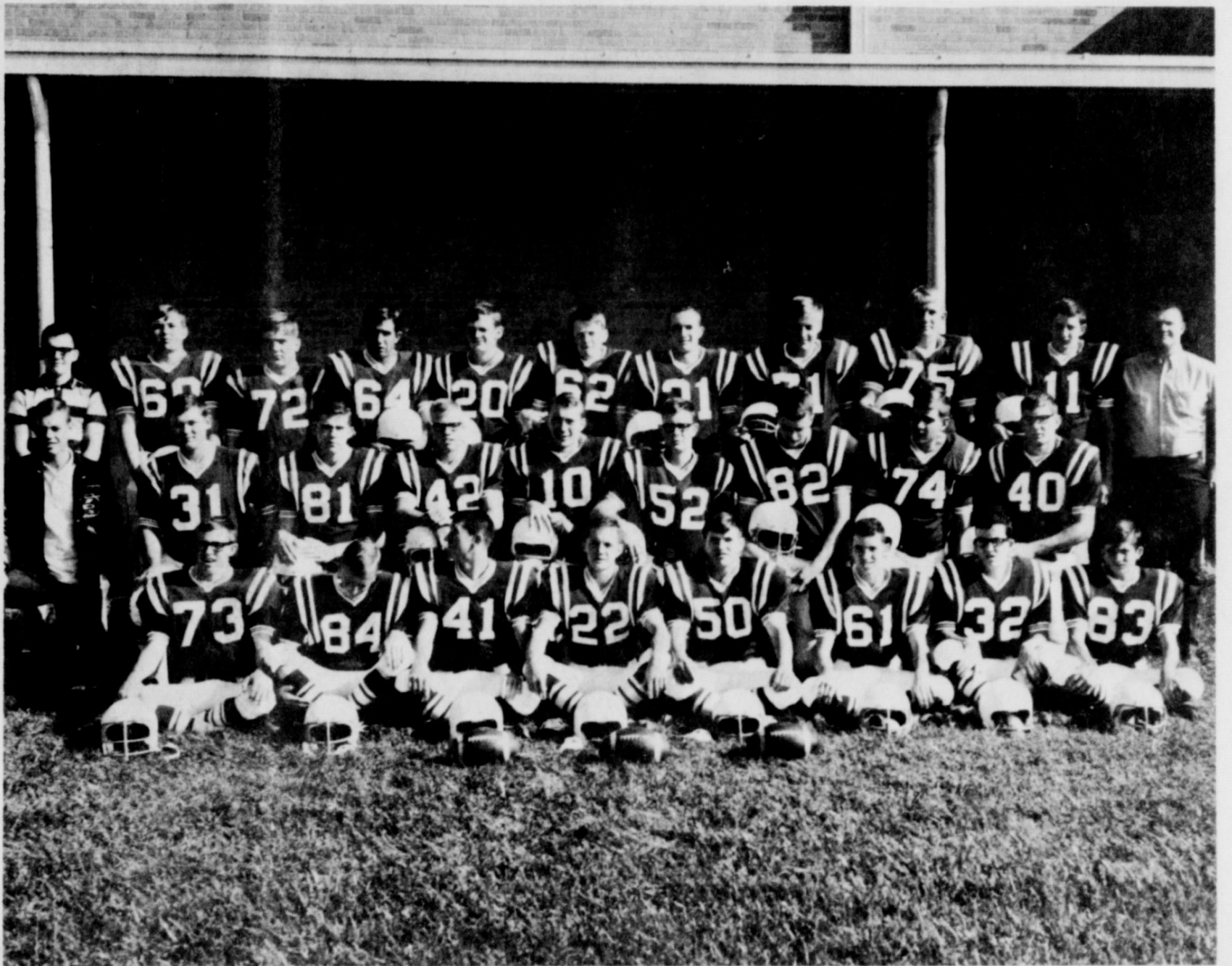

HAIL STORM DOES DAMAGE TO CROPS IN SOUTH PART OF HANSFORD COUNTY

Spearman was spared what possibly was the worst storm in history last Sunday, when a big cloud struck in the South part of Hansford, and North Hutchinson county, doing a great deal of damage to crops and bldgs. as well as other damage.

Heavy hail struck the Medlin Patterson, Jackson, Holt and Archer farms, near the Hutchinson-Hansford county line. All of the crops, grass and buildings were damaged in this particular area.

Medlin Patterson reported hail up to 12 inches deep, and he said all that saved his house, was the small hail building up to about six inches on his roof and protecting it from the big hail which started as soon as the hail was about six inches deep. Patterson said his maize was severely damaged, but his grass was also a total loss. He said he had never seen anything quite like it, and the hail was still piled up in piles on Tuesday morning after the storm on Sunday. Two inches of rain accompanied the 12 inches of hail.

All of the farmers in this area reported about the same report as Patterson did, with much damage to crops and out buildings.

The storm hit the area about 4:00 p. m., Sunday. Some late rain fell hit Spearman, but the big damage fell in the Hutchinson county area, and also a great deal of damage was done in Amarillo. All five of the transmitting towers at KGNC radio station were blown over during the storm.

Some Spearman residents who were caught in the storm reported complete loss of their cars. Mr. Allen Alford, local teacher, was attending the stage production of Texas, when he was caught in the hail storm, just out of Canyon. His car was almost a total loss according to rumors.

It was understood that Mr. and Mrs. Ira Harbour were in the storm, between Panhandle and Amarillo, when glass began flying out of the car windows, and Mrs. Harbour got in the back seat and put in over-coat over her and the children, while Ira drove out of the storm.

This same storm, almost shut down the Pantex Area East of Amarillo.

City Library Meet Today

"Mind Control" Class Will Be Taught Here

Approximately thirty people from Spearman have traveled to Amarillo every week end for the last nine months to study "Mind Control" from Jose Silva, a research Scientist in this field.

Mr. Silva, a Laredo, Texas native, is one of the top hypnotists of this time. He has developed a course in Mind Control in which he teaches his students a method of autosuggestion. Dr. Hahn of Trinity University told the group that he knows of no better hypnotist or research Scientist in the field.

Mr. Silva, who has taught classes in Amarillo, Lubbock, Corpus Christi, San Antonio and Dallas, has agreed to come to Spearman or Perryton if the two towns can have a class of 50, which town, depends on who obtains the most members.

The first course will be Sept. 18, 19, 20 (a 4 hour session each night.) The cost is \$35. This will be the only time Mr. Silva will be able to come to Spearman, so anyone interested should make every effort to do so now. The practice of hypnotism is older than many people realize. There is ample evidence to prove that the ancient Egyptians used it, handing it down to the Greeks and Romans. Modern Europeans became interested in 1775 when a Swiss Doctor Mesmer, published a paper, James Braid, an English Doctor, revised the theory and named it "hypnotism." Hypnotism was then used in surgery until the discovery of anesthesia. It was the only way of relieving a patient from pain. But as soon as anesthesia was discovered, it quickly replaced hypnotism in the operating room, and hypnotism became a novelty used for entertaining purposes.

This second-class status of hypnotism has been gradually changing as Scientists and Doctors have realized its importance and learned to separate fact from folklore. To understand hypnotism, you must know about your "conscious" mind and "unconscious" mind and how they work. Your conscious mind does the thinking of which you are aware; your subconscious mind can handle routine tasks that you have learned. You do not have to tell your legs to walk, your heart to beat, etc. Your unconscious mind is also a huge warehouse in which every thought and every impression you have ever had, are stored.

Many adults have allowed too many negative suggestions to come through to their subconscious mind and therefore have fears, inferiority feelings, psychosomatic diseases such as mental disturbances, heart disease, high blood pressure, arthritis, insomnia (in fact 90% of all man's illnesses are psychosomatic it is estimated.)

The study of self-hypnotism teaches you to first "concentrate" on relaxing your body and conscious mind so that the subconscious mind can accept positive suggestions. The importance of relaxation in daily life cannot be overstressed. Once you have mastered physical and mental relaxation you can learn to govern your subconscious mind. Through "Mind Control" you can replace inferiority feelings with a confident and relaxed personality. You can replace sick thoughts

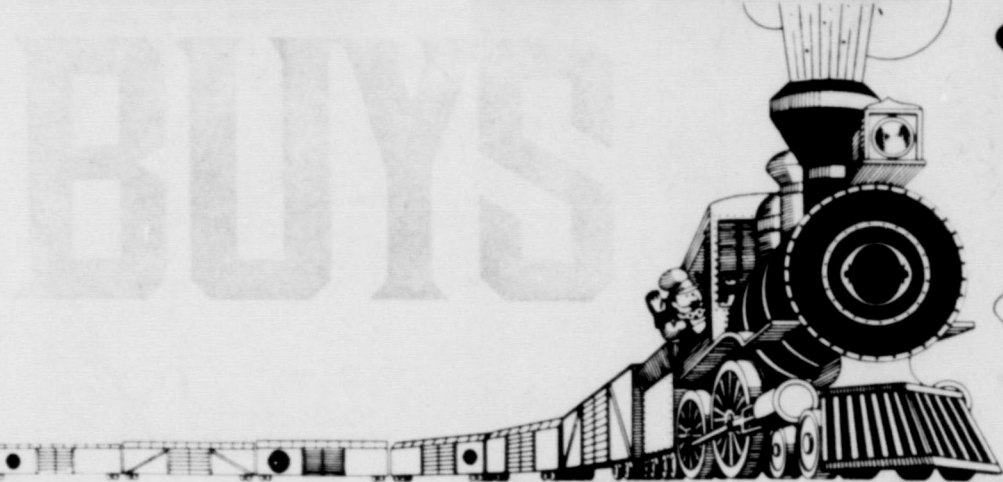

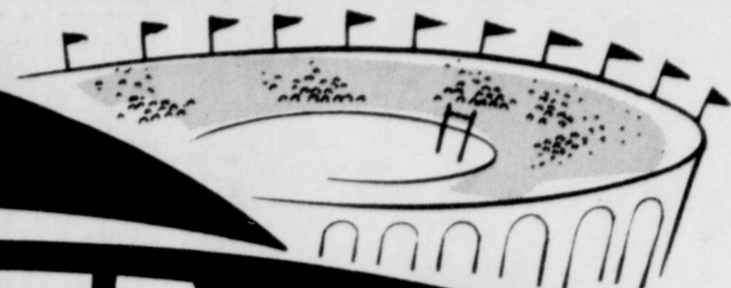
SPEECH DEPARTMENT, by Cloetta Fullbright

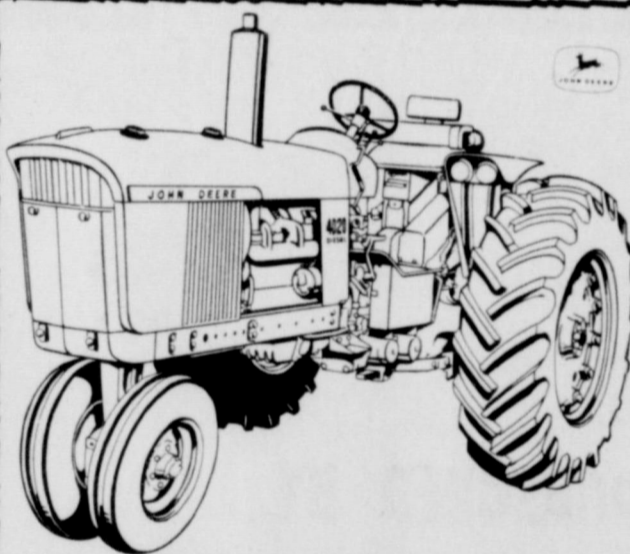

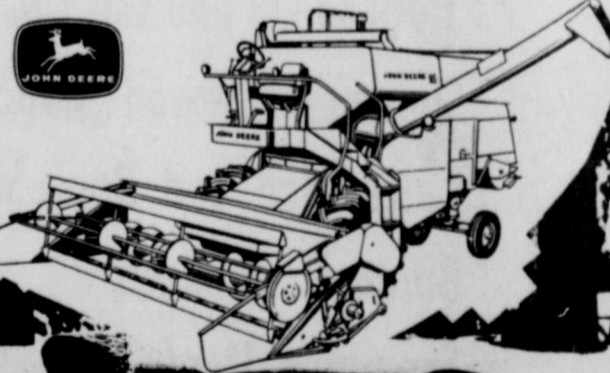

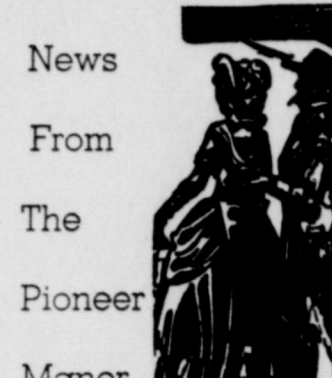

Much has been said about the game of Golf: It's an unending duel between a big man and a little ball, which no man has ever won. Some have died trying. Golfers buried on Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sunday afternoons have very small funerals. But for all the anguish of it, not in any vocation will you find more compatible companions, for the sport itself keeps its participants healthy, humble and poor.

Here is all you have to do to be a good golf player: Once you have mastered the grip and stance, all you have to bear in mind, in the brief two-second interval it takes to swing, is to keep your left elbow pointed in toward the left hip and your right arm loose and closer to the body than the left... and take the clubhead straight back and low along the ground until your hands are past your right knee... and then break the wrist at just the right instant while the left arm is still traveling straight back from the ball and the right arm stays glued to the body... and the hips come around in a perfect circle... and meanwhile everything will be mucked up unless the weight is 60 percent on the left foot and 40 percent on the right at the start... not an ounce more or less... and at just the right point in the turn the left knee bends in towards the right in a dragging motion until the left heel comes up off the ground... but not too far... and be sure the hands at the top of the swing are high and the shaft points along a line parallel with the ground... and if it's a downhill lie, the shaft is supposed to be pointed downhill too... and pause at the

top of the swing and count one, jerk the left arm straight down like a bell ringer yanking a belfry rope... and don't uncock the wrists too soon and pull the left hip around in a circle... but don't let the shoulders turn with the hips, they have to be facing the hole... and now transfer the weight 60% to the right foot and 40% on the left... not an ounce more or less... and tilt the left foot now so the right side of it is off the ground... but not too far... and keep the left leg straight... that's the one you hit against... and watch out for the left hand, it's supposed to be extended... but not too stiff or you'll hook and let the wrists uncock... but don't force them or you'll smother the shot... and don't break them too soon but keep your head down... AND HIT THE BALL!
