McClellan Wins Science Contest

David McClellan University Interscholastic League science contestant from Spearman High School, won first place in the Regional U.I.L. science contest at Lubbock on Saturday, April 22. David made 175 out of a possible 250 points and made the top score among contestants of B.A. and AA sized schools. The contest was comprised of fifty objective type questions taken from a reading list of scientific literature covering physics, chemistry, and biology.

David will enter the state contest in Austin on May 5. Last year David received a special award to do summer research work at the National Science Foundation at the University of Texas, where he did research work in Leukemia. He did receive this award by ranking 7th on his tests in competition with 561 students in Texas.

David, who is Salutatorian of the senior class, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. McClellan. Upon graduation he will attend the University of Texas and major in chemistry.

REA Installs New Equipment

The North Plains Electric Cooperative is in the process of adding new equipment and enlarging three of its substations in preparation for the peak summer load. Work on the Perryton Station was completed Friday night from 12:00 to 3:00 A.M. when the capacity of this station was doubled from 2500 to 5000 KVA.

The Lipscomb Substation will be de-energized Monday night from 12:00 midnight until 1:30 A.M. in order to change out the transformers there. Then on Wednesday night power will be cut off at the Spearman substation to remove the 1500 KVA transformers and replace them with 2500 KVA. In addition to the larger transformers being installed, larger voltage regulators have also been added. Additional regulators and capacitors are being installed on the lines where heavy loading has occurred and many miles of single phase has been and is being converted to heavier three phase lines.

"Just getting electric service to our rural members is not enough," Manager Earl Waide said, "adequate and dependable service must follow, which requires new and larger equipment and continuous maintenance."

Mr. Witcher said the trains which come into Spearman every Monday, Wednesday and Friday will correspond with the official local time in this community. They will continue the same arrival time.

T. J. Pittman, time keeper at the City Hall, says he doesn't promise to get up at 2 a.m. and change the clock, but that it will be changed in time for all employees to come to work by Monday morning.

Mr. Kenneth McKay, School Principal, said that the official clock-changer at the school was "Pop" Latham. Mr. Latham will change all the clocks at 7:45 Sunday evening.






