

BIKE RIDERS PROHIBITED AFTER DARK

ORDINANCE PROHIBITING BICYCLES ON PUBLIC STREETS IN SPEARMAN DURING CERTAIN HOURS:

Bicycles shall not be driven, ridden or permitted upon streets between the hours of thirty minutes af-ter sundown and thirty minutes before sunrise. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon con-viction in the Corporation Court of the City of Spear. man, be fined not less than \$10 and no more than \$100.

COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT by Robert Adamson

The time is once again app-oaching to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted

Since most soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrien-ts, the most logical starting po-int for determining fertilizer needs is the soil test, says Ro-pert Adamson. for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, such factors as the amount and stage of decomposother and stage of decompos-ition of previous crop residue, Physical condition of the soil, ability to irrigate adequately and intended grazing pract-ices will all influence the nit-

rogen need of the crop.
Data at the South Plains Research and Extension Center clearly indicates that where wheat is grown on Pullman soils for grain only, the time of nitrogen applications is of little importance. However, adds the agent, when wheat is to be grazed, all or part of the nitrogen should be applied preplant to stimulate early growth. Adequately fertili-

zed wheat forage can contain 20 per cent protein or 3 per cent nitrogen on a dry basis. Insufficient phosphorus can also limit wheat production, the agent points out. Pro-fitable response has long been evident on many of the san-

dy and mixed land soils. Yield increases have also been noted on Pullman soils shown to be deficient by soil testing.

Since phosphorus does not move appreciably with soil moisture, it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permanent roots. Therefore, preplant application is recom-ended. Wheat plants utilize much of the phosphorus

when they are young.
Adamson urges all wheat growers to send in soil samples as soon as possible. Coplete information on sample collection and mailing is available at the County Exten-

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

Section 1. That Article IX of

any other section of this ar-ticle, the Legislature in pro-viding for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and op-eration of a hospital district, the establishment, maintemental health services or mental retardation services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full re-sponsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activ ities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political sub-division to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or re-lated public health activities or services or the operation such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit

participation by any entity

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, or support of mental health the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto public health activities within or partly within the boundaries read as follows:
"Section 13. Notwithstanding of any hospital district, any yother section of this armunicipality or any other pole, the Legislature in prolitical subdivision or state-supported entity within the hos-pital district may participate in the establishment, mainte shall not be required to pro-vide that such district shall health services, mental re-assume full responsibility for tardation services, public health units and clinics and related nance, support, or operation of public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such pur-poses as provided by law."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE partment, or its said success under such provisions as Legislature may prescribe

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-e, as follows:

"Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and im-provement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general ob-ligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dol-lars (\$75,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called "Texas Park Develop-ment Bonds," shall be executed in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by the Parks and Wildlife Department or its successor, but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds, shall not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, finds feasible and practical in

forth herein. "All moneys received from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created with the State Treasurer to be known as the Texas Park Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, in such manner as prescribed by

law.
"Such fund shall be used by said Parks and Wildlife De-

partment, or its said successor. Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the purposes of acquiring lands from the United States, or any govern-mental agency thereof, from any governmental agency of the State of Texas, or from person, firm, or corpora-, for State Park Sites and developing said sites as State Parks.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision, or any interest on any such bonds, is outstanding and un-paid, there is hereby appro-priated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is suf-ficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, which includes any receipts derived during the prior fiscal year by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from admission charges to State Parks, as the Legislature may prescribe by general law.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Park Development Fund the interest and sinking fund established for the payment of bonds issued by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or accomplishing the purpose set said successor. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.

"From the moneys received by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said successor, from the sale of the bonds issued hereunder, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this section sufficient moneys to pay the in-terest to become due during the State fiscal year in which the bonds were issued. After

all bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future ma-turities of principal and in-terest, additional moneys reterest, additional moneys re-ceived from admission charges to State Parks shall be de-posited to the State Parks Fund, or any successor fund which may be established by the Legislature as a denosing the Legislature as a depositor for Park revenue earned by said Parks and Wildlife Department, or its said success

sor.
"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasen, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.
"Should the Legislature en-

act enabling laws in anticipa-tion of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their

anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following
