Spearman completed 3 out of 9 passes and intercepted one Gruber pass. Gruber completed 3 out of 6 passes with two interceptions which proved to be fatal for the Lynx.

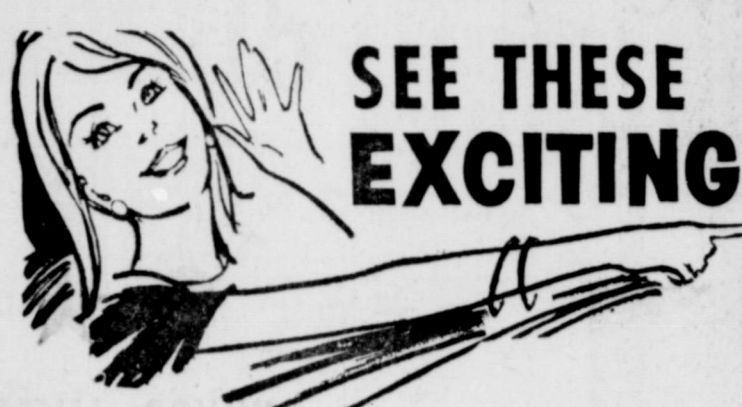
