

Bloodmobile Here July 28

The American Red Cross bloodmobile is scheduled to be in Spearman on Friday, July 28 from 9 a.m. to 2:15 p.m.

Hansford County is included in the Wichita Regional Blood Bank Center. 250 pints of blood per day are needed in the 132 hospitals in the region. Out of every 100 pints, 8 go to Veterans' hospitals and put the rest to use for other patients.

This county's quota for the year is 360 pints, or 4 percent of the total population. Wichita estimates that this county contributes a pint of blood, it is needed for Hansford County. Anyone may draw on the blood bank whenever blood is needed, where ever you might be!

The Red Cross has issued a plea to residents of Hansford county planning vacations to include a blood donation in their preparations. Pointing out that "Accidents and illness never take holiday," Mrs. Leona King, Blood Program chairman said that blood donation is a habit that should be cultivated to their advantage while in the summer months. The need for blood is mainly due to summer highway accidents, frequently increases.

In this current fiscal year, 100 blood collections for donations by the American Red Cross ranged from a low of 104 last July to a high of 1,200 in April of this year.

The solution is for all healthy Americans between the ages of 18 and 60 to donate blood before leaving on vacations, she said.

It will be for their own protection as well as for others, King concluded.

Mrs. King also stated that there is no need for a "special" before giving blood.

If you will donate a pint of blood, call Mrs. King at 310. This will be the last drive for blood in this county for 1967. The location of the blood drive will be in the First Baptist Church basement.

The 18 hole handicap tournament was won by the team of Don Smith and Kent Guthrie with a 63.

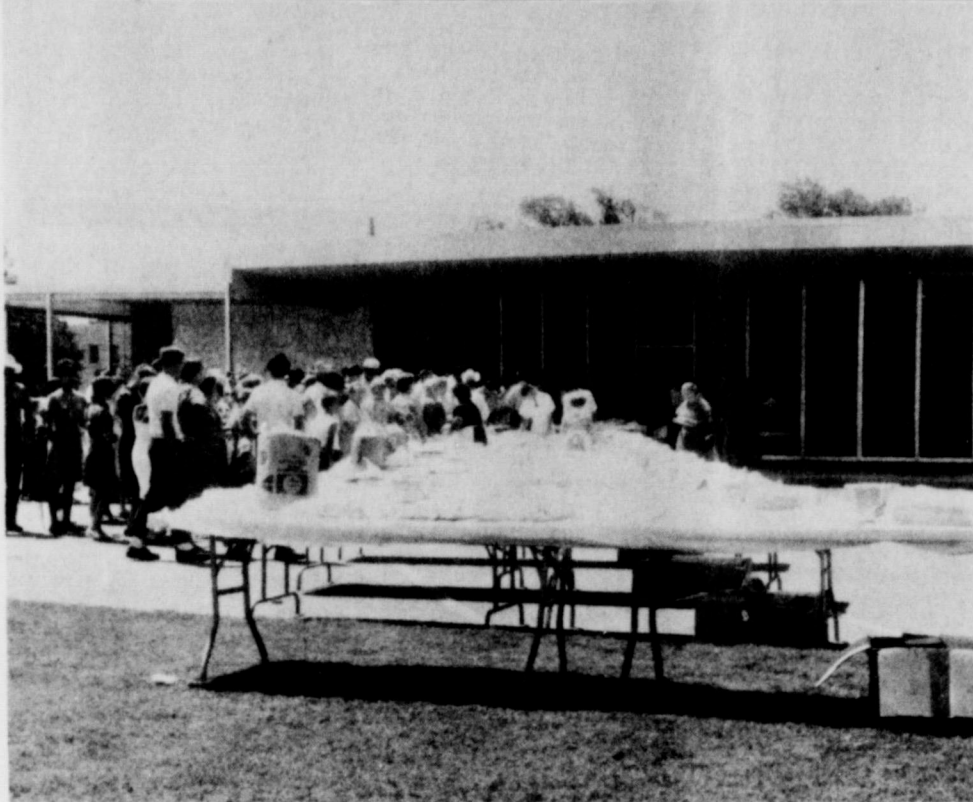

City Budget Being Eyed

City Aldermen met in regular session Monday night to hear departmental reports for the month of June, and to look over the proposed budget for fiscal year 1967-68 which Manager Foshee presented them.

The budget of \$388,630 is an increase of \$4,100, over last year. The major part of this increase would be for Public Safety (Police Dept.) No official action was taken on the budget.

The contract was let to Community Public Service to replace all incandescent lights in residential areas with Mercury vapor lights. Some 168 lights will be replaced. This will be a gradual process and could take as long as two years.

The Police report for June showed 54 traffic tickets, 4 warning tickets, 11 arrests and 10 auto accidents.

Animal Control had 6 animals held in the pound from May, 34 picked up in June, 22 destroyed, 6 paid out, 3 in the Vets clinic for observation and 9 held over.

Corporation Court had 60 cases filed and assessed a total of \$575.00 in fines. Of this, \$16.50 to be paid later, \$100.00 (skipped town), \$33 suspended, \$33, in themes, \$65, in jail time and \$41, floated. Actually collected: \$286.50.

The fire department had 2 regular drills and 3 calls: one was a car, one the Lynx Den and the other was Hendrick's trailer house.

\$50. Bond and Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Parrish won the \$25. Bond.

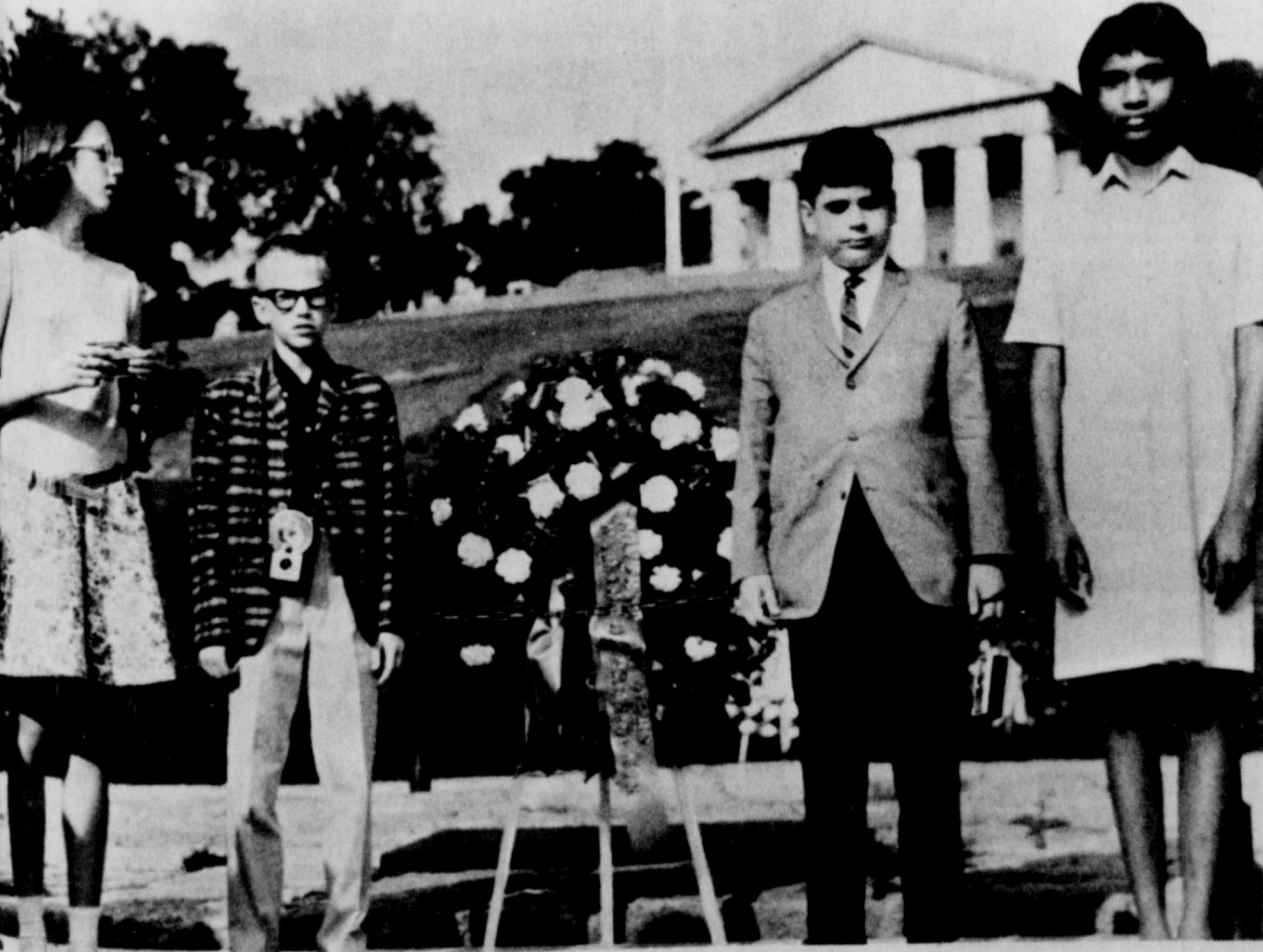

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Let Me See ... by Sybil

Well, the Cicadas are here again. Most of us call them Locusts. I enjoy hearing them "Sing" if you can call it that. Perhaps this is a left-over childhood memory for one of the few things I remember of my father, who was killed when I was a very small child is a memory of playing with locusts. He would tie sewing thread around a locust and attach it to the light fixture. I enjoyed watching it fly around the house giving it's shrill singing noise. Did you know that the locusts you hear singing in the trees this summer were 13 to 17 years old when they came out of the ground a few days ago? It's the male you hear making the noise. Soon the cicadas will mate, the female will lay eggs in the bark of trees, then she dies. These hatch into tiny worms which

fall to the ground and bore holes into the earth some 3 to 5 feet deep. There they stay for at least 13 years and some for 17 years, at which time they did and claw their way to the surface of the ground. Notice all the holes under trees and bushes. They emerge with a tough skin, and front diggers. Immediately they shed this hull and sit in the sun just long enough to dry their wings and fly up into the trees.

No one knows just how they exist, for they are not known to eat anything! Maybe God made them for food for the Cicada-Killers! That's those huge wasp-like creatures you see buzzing in all the trees. These large wasps live in the ground...in fact dig holes large enough for ground squirrels sometimes, with a mound of earth all around the entrance. They are constantly on the look-out for one of these poor, defenseless locusts. They light on it's back and within one second their long stinger has it paralyzed. They pick up the locusts, usually twice the size of the wasp, and off they go with it, down into the ground tunnel.

Its real sad to me to sit in my back yard patio and watch this unceasing battle between the cicada and it's enemy. The age old saying "survival of the fittest" goes on all time in Nature! To think these harmless locusts are buried for 17 long years, just to come forth and live such a short time! If the cicada-killer doesn't eat them my half-siamese cats did. Would you like to own a half siamese kitten? Stop by the house ANY TIME, and you can have one! If you wait much longer, you might have to take 2 or 3, for our purbred cat, PC, is in love with a traveling man! He is black,

369 Mi. Pipeline Being Laid

Construction of a 369-mile natural gas pipeline by the Northern Natural Gas Company of Omaha, Nebraska across the high plains of Texas is now underway.

The \$47 million project will snake northeastwardly from Kermit, Tex., to Beaver, Oklahoma, carrying natural gas from the Coynosa, Gomez and Reeves gas fields in the Permian Basin to the Northern Plains states.

Northern, one of the 5 largest natural gas transmission companies in the nation, estimates the 30-inch pipeline will be ready for service about November.

Prime contractor for the massive undertaking is R. H. Fulton, Contractor, Lubbock, Texas.

The pipeline will go under some 20 major highways and across countless rivers and streams that cross its path. One of the most formidable natural obstacles in the pipeline's path will be the 7 mile crossing of Palo Duro Canyon southeast of Amarillo. All crossings will be underground.

Pipe will be laid in 80 foot sections, on all but 115 mi. on the southern end of the job where lengths will be 60 feet long. Two hundred and fifty-four miles of pipe arrived from the manufacturer in 40 foot sections and is being double-jointed at nine pipe storage sites along the route. The Hood Corp., Whittier, Calif., and Fulton are double-jointing the pipe at various locations at the present time.

In addition to the huge pipeline, Northern will also construct 4 compressor stations to move the gas through the pipeline. Each station will house a 9300 horsepower turbine engine and will be located at Kermit, Plainview, Claude and Seminole.

The compressor stations will be what's called "unattended stations" ... their operating function being carried on by automated equipment ... but will require 4 to 8 full time employees for maintenance.

Two of the stations will be finished at the end of 1967. The other subordinate officers will be located along the line.

A program to provide irrigation engines at no capital investment with free maintenance to farmers in the Golden Spread has been started by Peoples Natural Gas of Amarillo.

The first engine was set this week on the R. C. Porter Farm 10 miles south of Spearman.

Melvin Semrad, supervisor of market development for Peoples, said the engine program is the first of its kind ever to be offered to Golden Spread farmers.

"We will guarantee that during critical watering periods that, if an engine does breakdown, the farmer will not be without service more than 24 hours from the time he notifies our representative," Semrad said.

During heavy irrigation times, farmers can lose as much as \$5 to \$10 per acre in yield if their engines are down more than 48 hours.

Semrad said that the farmer will have no engine investment costs, will have free maintenance, guaranteed continual service, low cost of operation and low cost natural gas fuel under the Peoples Natural Gas engine program.

"A fulltime service representative will be in Hansford County seven days a week and will be available 24 hours a day," Semrad said.

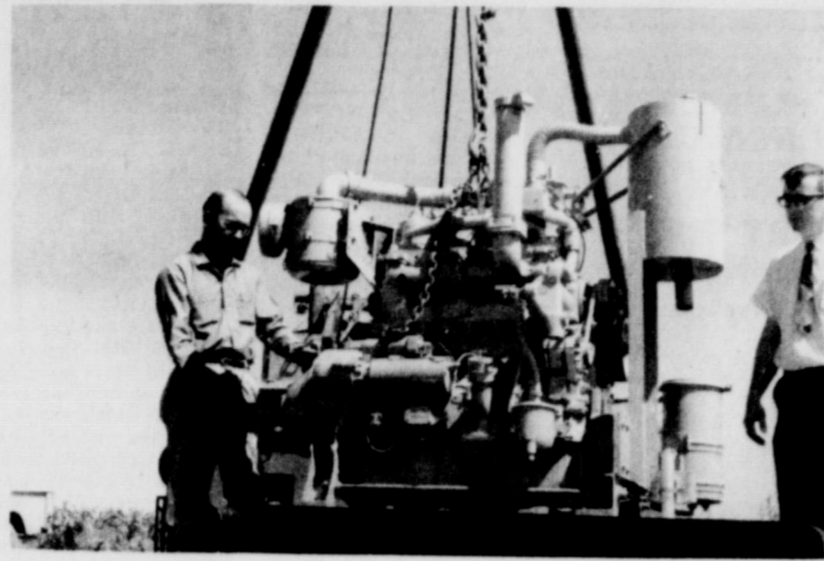
Standby replacement engines also are available at no extra cost to the farmer.

"Cummins Sales and Service Inc. of Amarillo is providing the engines and has guaranteed us they will run 30,000 hours. At that time, a major overhaul will be made at no cost to the farmer. Cost of the overhaul will be paid for by Peoples Natural Gas," Semrad said.

Peoples will service the engines including oil changing and adding, spark plug changing, filter changing, tune-ups and other necessary maintenance for full seasonal operation.
