PROPER FEEDING OF COWS AND CALVES

> With the arrival of colder weather, proper feeding of cows and calves takes on important significance.

The production efficiency and comfort of a mature cow is not reduced by cold weather provided she is full of forage, has a dry coat and is exposed to dry still air.

The temperature at a given level of feed intake where no additional feed in necessary to maintain body temperature is called the critical temperature. It is slightly above the temperature at which cattle begin to shiver.

A cow on a fasting diet or without any feed will reach the critical temperature at about 55 degrees hey wanted," and to share with Fahrenheit. A maintenance ration will lower the critical temperature to about 23 degrees F.
