Mike Crawford's experiences in dealing with refugees in Viet Nam., Recently a mountain area was declared free war zone: notices were dropped from helicopters warning the people to evacuate. Mike's platoon was assigned to the task of being sure everyone was alerted.

People started pouring from the mountians but were stopped by a rain swollen river with no bridge. So Mike and the few other helicopters in his platoon spent a week helping evacuate the population to a new re-settlement area. He said the children mostly thought it a lark to ride in the giant 'loud bird': for the fearful ones, GI gifts of candy and gum soon dried the tears. Some of the very old would hide their eves and have to be urged aboard. but many enjoyed it as did the children. Many of these hill people had never even ridden in truck.
