

Steal something worth \$50 or more and you face a felony rap in district court, and that is indeed serious business. Convictions go on your record and this record follows you through life.

A convicted felon has a problem with his citizenship. He can-not become an officer in the armed services. Prospective em-ployers are reluctant to hire a convicted thief even if the thief didn't intend to get so seriously involved when he took that car stereo, or radio from a store, or etc.

Boys will be boys, all right, in this day as in a generation ago


