City Council To Take Bids On 1,500 New Trash Cans

City Councilmen met in regular session Monday night. This meeting had been advertised as an open meeting for the Budget hearing.

On September 25, City Police arrested Daniel Henson on a swindle by worthless check warrant by Panhandle, Tex. officials.

On October 9, the City will take bids on 1500 covered cans for city trash disposal. These cans, 30 gallon capacity at least, will probably cost each resident in the neighborhood of \$3 to \$4 each.

With the change to new covered trash cans for the City, no trash burning will be allowed. An increase in trash service will be necessary. Rates on this service will be increased. Residents will pay \$1.75 per barrel each month.

Commissioners, after attending the conference in Amarillo last Friday concerning the State Retirement plan for county employees, voted unanimously against the plan.

Other business to come out of the Commissioners Court meeting Monday morning was the decision to purchase two pickup trucks; one for George Lowe, Precinct 4, and one for Joe Day, Precinct 1.

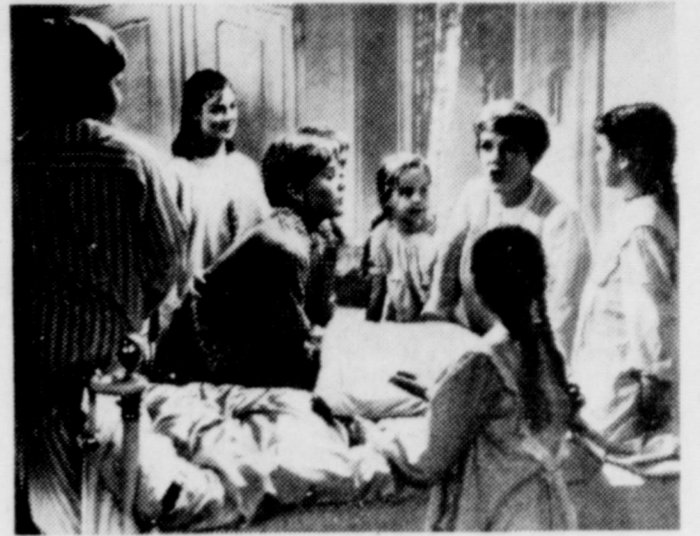

"Now," she laughs, "the wheel has come full circle. COUNTY TAX EVALUATION SHOWS MILLION \$ INCREASE

The County tax statements, to be mailed this week, will have a "new look." The big difference, from past years, is the new small size and the fact that the discount is already figured for you!

The 4 X 9 inch pink slip is so easily handled, clerks in the county Tax office stuffed all statements and had them ready for mailing in one day!

The County Tax Roll was prepared on IBM machines by the Texas Statistical Service in Waxahachie, Texas. This service was sanctioned by County Commissioners Court several months ago.

Believe it or not, a large portion of County tax payers misfigured their discount every year. These mistakes required much red tape for County Tax clerks to correct.

This year's assessed property evaluation in the county, totals \$32,778,651.00.

On this evaluation figure, \$601,919.57 will be collected. \$454,837.19 of this will remain in the County and \$147,082.38 will go to the State.

The evaluation of State and County Oil and Gas property amounts to \$18,022,062.00. The amount of taxes to be paid on this property will be \$339,820.37. Of this amount \$255,114.71 is County Tax.

Hansford County's property evaluation shows a million dollar increase from last year. Last year's evaluation was \$31,674,267.00.

Speed Limit

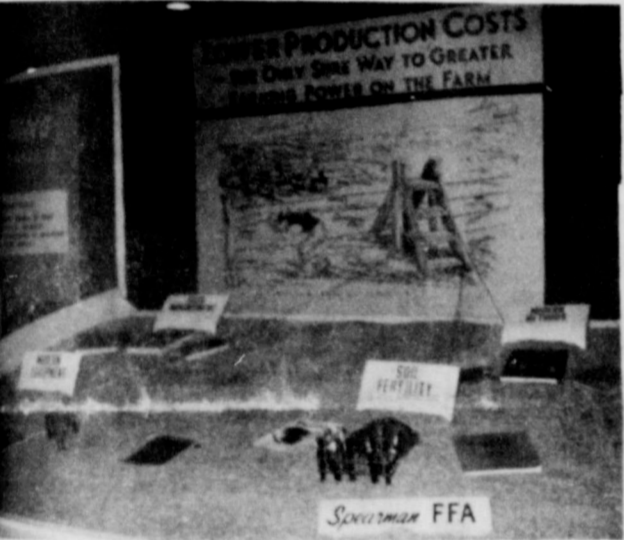
Department of Public Safety highway patrolmen are paying more attention to speeders.

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . . .

Sweet potatoes offer many flavor talents for September eating. Sweet potatoes are one of our plentiful foods this month.

When shopping for sweet potatoes, you may prefer either the moist or dry varieties. Both are delicious, although different in appearance and texture. The dry type is yellow-fleshed, while the moist varieties tend toward more orange.

The most popular method of preparing sweet potatoes are boiling for mashing or baking for serving "as is". To accent their flavor, you can add a variety of spices - cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, poppy seed, ginger and apple pie spice. Be sure to serve with butter or margarine.

For a delightful sweet potato dish, try Sweet Potato and Apricot Casserole. Ingredients that you will need are: 3 cooked sweet potatoes, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 egg, 1/2 cup orange juice, and 1/2 cup dried apricots, soaked and chopped; 1/2 cup nuts.

Cook sweet potatoes in their skins, then peel and mash. Add melted butter, brown sugar, nutmeg, salt, and unbeaten egg. Mix well. Add chopped apricots and orange juice. Spoon into well-greased casserole dish, and bake in medium oven, 350 degrees, for 25 minutes, or until lightly browned.

Bananas and sweet potato combine well to make a flavorful duet. Fix Banana Sweet Potatoes and find out what a pleasing combination they make. To prepare, mash 6 parts cooked sweetpotatoes, with 1 part very ripe banana, adding brown sugar, butter and cinnamon to taste. Fashion sweetpotato into "banana" shapes. Place on a greased baking dish, brush with melted butter, and bake in a moderate oven until thoroughly heated and tipped with brown. Serve along with the side pork or baked ham.
