nment control. Commissioner Vernon stated that the Retirement Plan would call for about 10% to be withheld from employee's checks, with a little over half of this vested and returned at 3% interest. "A person could receive more than this 3% by investing his or her money loca -11y," he said. A person must be employed by the county 12 years, and be 60 years of age before being eligible for Retirement which pays only a maximum of \$133, per month. In the meantime, if county officials are defeated while in office, or resign, none of the funds paid by the county during this employee's term is refund-able. All four Commissioners agreed that the 10% increase in salaries would be much more beneficial to county employ -ees than the 'State Retirement





City Council To Take Bids On 1,500 New Trash Cans

City Councilmen met in regular session Monday night. This meeting had been advertised as an open meeting for the Budget hearing. No one was present to hear the reading of the budget and the Council adopted it as follows: For year Oct. 1, 1967 to Sept. 30, 1968 General Fund \$149, 330.00, Sy-stems (utilities) \$250,000.00, Park Fund ^Budget \$3,660.00.

Councilmen voted to lease the lot north of Pettitt's garage to Jack Moran for auto storage. The Council also, as a mat ter of form, passed Ordinance 317 which has to do with levy-ing 1967 taxes at \$1,50 per \$100,00 assessed evaluation, based on 40% of the actual value. This is routine, and is acted upon in this manner each vear.

On October 9, the City will take bids on 1500 covered cans for city trash disposal. These cans, 30 gallon capacity at least, will probably cost each resident in the neighborhood of \$3 to \$4 each. Although this new trash service has not actually been adopted as yet, Councilmen do plan to do so. With the change to new cov-ered trash cans for the City, no trash burning will be allo-wed. An increase in trash ser-

vice will be necessary. Rates on this service will be increased. Residents will pay \$1.75 per barrel each month. Some will need more than one trash can. Business firms who now pay \$3.00 each month for trash pick-up, will pay \$5.25. Business firms who now pay \$5.

The County tax statements, to be mailed this week, will have a "new look." The big difference, from past years, is the new small size and the fact that the discount is alrea dy figured for you!

The 4 X 9 inch pink slip is so easily handled, clerks in the county Tax office stuffed all statements and had them ready for mailing in one day! The large sheet of last year, had to be folded several times and required one week of labor to stu-

ff into envelopes. The County Tax Roll was pre-pared on IBM machines by the Texas Statistical Service in Waxahachie, Texas. This service was sanctioned by County Commissioners Court several

months ago. Believe it or not, a large portion of County tax payers mis-figured their discount every year. These mistakes required much red tape for County Tax clerks to correct. The fact that discounts are already figured and plainly shown on stat-ements will aid both the tax payer and office clerks. This year's assessed property evaluation in the county, totals \$32, 778, 651, 00. On this evaluation figure, \$601, 919, 57 will be collected. \$454, 837, 19 of this will remain in the County and \$147,082.38

will go to the State. The evaluation of State and County Oil and Gas property amounts to \$18,022,062.00. The amount of taxes to be paid on this property will be \$339,820.37. Of this amount \$255,114.71 is County Tax. Hansford County's property evaluation shows a million dollar increase from last year.

For a delightful weet potato dish, try sweet Potato and Ap-ricot Casserole, Ingredients that you will need are: 3 cooked sweet potatoes, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 1/8 teaspoon shown sugar, 1/8 teaspoon salt 1 egg, 1/2 cup orange juice, and 1/2 cup dried apricots, soaked and chopped; 1/2 cup nuts. Cook sweet potatoes in their skins, then peal and mash. Add melted butter, brown sugar, nutmeg, salt, and unbeaten egg. Mix well. Add chopped apricots and orange juice. Spoon into well-greased casserole dish, and bake in medium oven, 350 degrees, for 25 ed sweet potatoes, 2 tablesp-

ium oven, 350 degrees, for 25 minutes, or until lightly browned.

Bananas and sweet potato combine well to make a flavorful duet. Fix Banana Sweet Potatoes and find out what a pleas-ing combination they make. To prepare, mash 6 parts coo-ked sweetpotatoes, with 1 part very ripe banana, adding brown sugar, butter and cinnamon to taste. Fashion sweetpotato into banalike "shapes. Place on a greased baking dish, brush with melted butter, and bake in a moderate oven until thoroughly heated and tipped with brown. Serve along with the side pork or baked ham.
