School Enrollment Totals 1112

Enrollment figures from Pr-incipal's offices Tuesday shows Spearman Public Schools enfollment figure to be up from

last year by 27 pupils, James Pendergraft, Junior High Principal, said he had enrolled 92 Fifth graders, 94 sixth graders, 104 seventh gra-

ders and 80 eighth graders, with a total of 370.

These figures compare with Sept. 1966 enrollment of 82 fifth graders, 106 sixth, 74 seventh and 97 eighth total of 359. It is interesting to note, however, that Junior High graduated 89 fifth graders, 104 sixth, 80 seventh and 98 eighth graders. At the end of sch-ool the middle grades had gained some 12 students.

The first four elementary grades show a total of 377 students enrolled! Elementary Principal Allen Alford said he had five first grades with 102 pupils, four second grades with 83 pupils, four third grades with 87 pupils and five fourth grades with 105 pupils.

These figures compare with last September enrollment: first, 99; second, 87; third, 104 and fourth, 82, with a total of 372.

High School Principal Kenneth McKay shows 103 Fr-eshmen, 101 Sophmores, 77 Juniors and 84 Seniors, for a total of 365

Last year High School had a total of 354 September enro-llment with 103 Freshmen, 87 Sophmores, 84 Juniors and 80 Seniors.

Enrollment was 1109 in 1965, 1085 in 1966. 1112 is the total so far this year.

thers this week, and by many a youngster too probably. Though pupils don't look for-

when the time finally arrives they are all pretty much reato shed summer's boring routines and settle down to a new and exciting school term. 

can be obtained only when good-quality ingredients are used and proper procedures are followed. Correct proportions of fruit or vegetable, sugar, salt, vinegar, and spices are essential. Alum and lime are not needed to make pickles crisp and firm if good-quality ingredients and up-to-date procedures are used.

Use tested recipes. Read the complete recipe before starting preparation and make sure necessary ingredients are on hand. Measure all ingredients

Pickles divide into two important families -- those made by the quick process and the brine-cure. Most women now ise the quick-process to save time and work. In this meth-od you cook the vegetable or fruit in vinegar to preserve it. In the brine-cure you hold vegetable in brine about 4 weeks. Then you soak them in water to remove surplus







Editor's note: Below are ques-tions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q -- Does Selective Service establish the physical, mental and moral standards for entry into the Armed Forces?

A -- No. These are prescrib-ed by the Secretary of Defen-Q -- Who conducts the exam -

inations to a man's acceptab-A -- Army personnel acting

as the agent of the Depart-ment of Defense. Q--Who says I am liable for service in the Armed Forces? A -- The Congress of the Un-

ited States.
Q--Who says I'm available for induction into the Armed

Forces? A -- Your draft board. Q--Who says I'm acceptab-le for induction and service?

A -- The Department of De-Q--I thought the Department of Defense ran Selective Service. Isn't it a part of the

Defense Department.

A-No. It's an independent agency of the President. The Director of Selective Service is responsible directly to the President and not to the Sec retary of Defense.

Q--Can military men serve on draft boards?

A -- No. Not even a member of the military Reserves.


