1 Dead, 3 Injured Here In October

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of October, according to Sergeant W. J. McLean, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one death, three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$325,000.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1966, shows a total of 14 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 13 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$19,600.00.

Hal Shufeldt Gets On List

Spearman's Hal Shufeldt was in the ranks of last week's Globe News "player of the week" grid named for honors for outstanding play.

Shufeldt, a 170-pound halfback converted to fullback, made a shambles of the Panhandle defenses with a 218 yard individual rushing effort.

The hard-charging junior carried the ball on 35 of the Lynx' 64 offensive plays and scored two touchdowns. His performance keyed Spearman's 29-16 triumph over the Panthers in the district 1-AA headliner.

Shufeldt whose major forte is a tremendous sense of balance, led the Lynx back from a 16-0 deficit with his running and blocking.

The big junior once carried the ball six consecutive times scoring from the one yard line after a 35-yard push. Shufeldt's other touchdown rambles were for 42 yards, his longest single jaunt of the evening.

1 Killed 3 Hurt In 2-Car Crash

Beri Blevins, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Blevins of 1096 Evans, was among those injured in a two car crash Saturday night near Muleshoe, Texas.

Beri, a student at WTSU had gone to Muleshoe with his friend Miss Cynthia Pool to spend the week end with her parents.

The accident occurred at 6:45 p.m. Saturday northwest of Muleshoe on US 88 when a car driven by James Robert Janoe skidded into the car driven by Blevins.

Janoe, 26, was pronounced dead at the scene. He was alone in his car. He was stationed at Webb, AFB, Big Springs, Texas.

Beri Blevins 19, suffered face lacerations, a broken leg and several broken teeth. He was listed in fair condition at Green Hospital in Muleshoe, but was to be moved to an Amarillo Hospital early this week.

Riding in the car with Blevins was his friend Cynthia Pool, and her brother and wife Mr. and Mrs. Charles Pool. These three were listed in serious condition at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, Texas.

River Navigation Into Kansas To Save Hansford Farmers \$234,000

WICHITA, Kansas (Special) -- Hansford County farmers will save an average of \$234,000 a year on wheat shipping costs if river navigation is extended into Central Kansas, a university research team said today.

Dr. F. O. Woodard, head of the department of economics at Wichita State University, said the savings are based upon "the lowest-cost form of transportation available." Navigation could be extended into Mid-Kansas as early as 1985.

Woodard headed a research team which is preparing a study for agencies being asked to make a comprehensive study of land and water resources on the Arkansas River and its tributaries upstream from Tulsa, Okla. The figures will be submitted at a hearing here Dec. 15.

The study shows total savings to wheat producers in just six Panhandle counties would be more than \$75.6 million during a 50-year period. Savings on phosphates shipped into the area would be an additional \$300,700. There would be comparable savings on all other goods and products which can be carried by water.

Don W. Pray, Wichita, president of the Mid-Arkansas Valley Association, said the WSU findings would be included in testimony MAVDA will give at the hearing on the comprehensive study of the river.

"This hearing-and the continuing study we hope will result from it-includes all beneficial uses of the river and its tributaries," Pray said. "Flood control; irrigation; water supply for farms, people and industry; pollution abatement and recreation all will be included," he said.

The study will be carried out by federal agencies under the direction of the Army Corps of Engineers.

Pray said MAVDA now is contacting people in Oklahoma, Kansas and Colorado to ask them to support the study at the hearing.

River improvements will be complete on the Arkansas between the Mississippi river and Tulsa by 1970, according to present timetables.

Pray said preliminary reports indicate full development of the river upstream from Tulsa "will be possible although the answer will not really be known until the federal study is made."

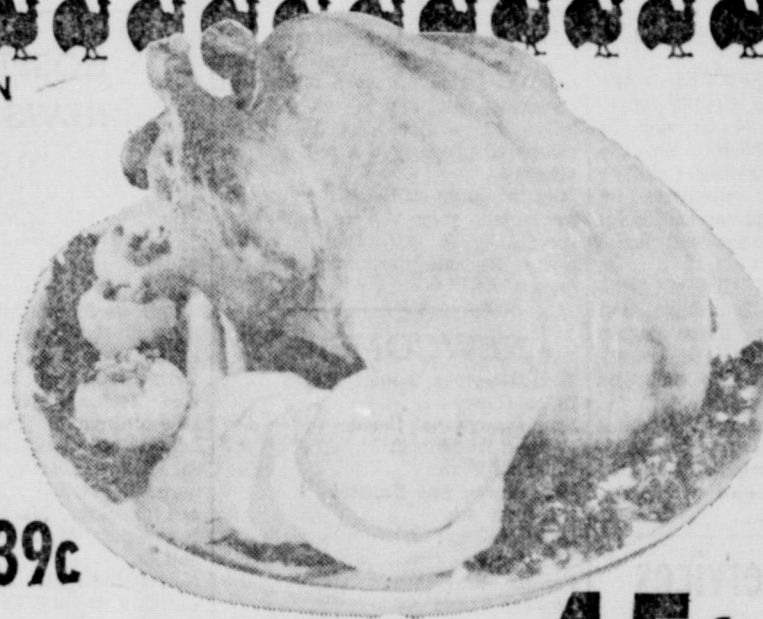

Must Register For 1967 Vote

The poll tax requirement for
voting was held invalid in Feb-
ruary of this year by a three
judge federal court. It based its
ruling on the due process clause
of the Federal Constitution. The
court said this requirement was
equivalent to a charge or penalty
imposed on the exercise of a fun-
damental right, & it indicated
that any charge for registration
could be illegal. The United
States Supreme Court affirmed
the decision.


Immediately following the three
judge decision the State Legis-
lature was called into special ses-
sion and it adopted a new regis-
tration act. The major change in
the law was that registration with
the County Tax Collector should
be without charge.
Under the law passed in Feb-
ruary voters will register an-
nually, as they have previously
done, during the period of Octo-
ber 1 through January 31. A
temporary registration was al-
lowed in March 1966, but this
was a one-time provision only.
You do not have to pay a poll
tax now, but you must register.
The time to do this is now. To
be eligible to vote in 1967 elec-
tions, you must go by the Coun-
ty Tax Office and register. Dead-
line date is January 31.
Everyone from the age of 21
years through 60 must register
in order to vote. If you are over
60, you are exempt.
Although no State or National
elections of importance are on
the agenda now, there will be
constitutional amendments, local
bond elections, school board, city
clerks etc. coming up in
1967, so it is of utmost import-
ance that you register before
January 31.



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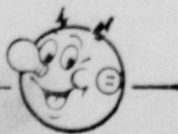

TEXAS 4-H SENDS TOP GROUP TO CLUB CONGRESS

Sylvia Parks and Doug McCloy from Morse Jr. Leaders 4-H Club will be among thirty-seven of Texas' most outstanding 4-H Club members who will represent their state at the upcoming National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, November 26 - December 2.

Tom Davison, assistant state 4-H leader, said the Texans would be among the 1,600 boys and girls from throughout the nation attending this "number one 4-H meeting." Each of the delegates has earned his or her trip on the basis of outstanding achievements in 4-H over a period of several years, the state leader added.

Theme for this year's Congress is the "Pursuit of Excellence." In their general assemblies, the delegates will hear prominent leaders from government, education, business and industry challenge them to set even higher standards for their adult lives.

Receptions, special breakfasts, luncheons and dinners will be held for the delegates. Tours have been scheduled to the International Livestock Exposition, Museum of Science and Industry, Art Institute of Chicago, Field Museum of Natural History and other cultural and educational centers in Chicago.

Davison said the Texans would assemble in Dallas on Nov. 25 and would be luncheon guests of the First National Bank Robert Stewart, president and R. P.

CAN NOW TEST FOR SOIL MICRONUTRIENTS

Texas A and M's soil testing service for farmers, gardeners and homeowners is being expanded to include micronutrient tests, according to John E. Hutchison, director of the Agricultural Extension Service. The announcement came following installation of an atomic absorption spectrophotometer provided through a grant from the Texas Plant Food Educational Society.

Dr. Charles Welch, head of Extension's soil testing service, said that the new instrument can measure magnesium, zinc, iron, manganese and copper in plant and soil extracts and provide a scientific basis for the use of these elements. Previously soil tests measured only phosphorus, potassium, organic matter, soil acidity and salinity hazards, the soil chemist said.

Procedures for utilizing all capabilities of the new equipment are under development and instructions for obtaining micronutrient tests will be available from my office soon.

Thinking about stocking your freezer with beef? The simplest and easiest way is to buy a quarter or side of beef and have it processed. If your family likes only certain cuts, a better way to stock up might be to buy your favorites when they're offered "on special" at the market.

To get the most for your money when buying a ham, buy it either whole or by the half. That way you know you'll get those meaty center slices. A "ham half" must be exactly that, whereas a piece of ham labeled butt or shank "end" or "portion" means the butcher has removed the center slices and probably sold them separately for more money.

You can save on your milk bill by buying some fresh, some canned, some dry. Try mixing half fresh milk, half re-constituted nonfat dry milk. The mixture costs you much less than the equal amount of

fresh milk, and you can tell very little-if any-difference in taste.

Had you realized there is more difference in bacon than just thickness of slice? There are several things to consider. Regular bacon comes from the under side of the hog, is sliced and packaged in one and two pound packages and is priced in three different ranges.

Irregular bacon comes from the ends of the bacon slabs. It's less expensive because the slices aren't as uniform and attractive, but the flavor is the same. Bacon squares is cut from the jowl of the hog. It is fatter than regular bacon. Leanest of all is Canadian-style bacon which isn't bacon at all, but one of the most expensive cuts of pork, the loin.

Senior citizens will be interested in a new tax booklet called "Tax Benefits for Older Americans." It explains new tax laws as they apply to citizens 65 years of age and older. Tax-saving information includes: explanation of benefits for a surviving spouse and head of household, added exemptions for age and blindness, and the amount of tax credit which is allowed for retirement income.
