One of the chief topics of conversation around town, this week, was the opinion that the merchants were pushing the Christmas season too far in advance. A lot of people were of the opinion that, year after year, the Christmas season was being pushed to the point where, pretty soon, we would start Christmas shopping on labor Day. Last night, I dug out an old newspaper that was printed in a town about the size of Spearman. The date was October 5th, 1939. I was greatly surprised to see that there were a number of ads in this paper projecting the idea. of doing your Christmas shopping early. Some of the prices sort of shook me up too. There was an American Grocer Store ad that quoted such prices as "Gold Seal Flour at twelve pounds for thirty-five cents. Asco coffee was ten cents a pound. They of-fered grapefruit juice in the number 2 can for five cents. Victor sliced bread was five cents a loaf and sweet cream butter was offered at thirty-five cents the pound. There were other values, such as green stringless beans at five cents a pound and chuck roast for only fifteen cents a pound." Of course a fellow making eighty dollars a week today was making about twenty-five dollars a week back then. Several things in that paper did make me wonder and one was the fact that chickens were bargain priced at twenty-nine cents a pound. I bought one last week at a Spear man market for the same price. It seems that some things never change like a five cents pack of chewing gum, or a pack of life savers for a nickel.

I sure hope things don't change too rapidly in Spearman, because I like everything just like it is. These are some of the folks I saw during the past few days in our town, where you can still get a five cents cup of coffee for a dime...J.B. Cooke turning down a free cup of coffee, Bill Partridge wrapping gifts, Nelson Bell getting ready to expand the store, Loren Simmons ixing a tire, Jimmy Shieldknight driving a Jeep, R. L. Mc-Clellan talking to salesman, Dick Holton talking on his twoway, John Bishop looking for a gift box, P.A. Lyon taking in the sun, Dayton Phillips running a wire, Frank Massad sweeping the sidewalk, Ned Turner driving a new Ford, Ray Gibson sorting candy, Pete Fisher counting candy, Freddie Largent washing dishes, Clay Gibner talking a Saturday off, Lawrence Anthony driving a truck, Wes Nivens looking worried, Tommy Russell explaining about windshield wipers, Bob Nobles listen-ing, Alton Ellsworth looking smart, Peggy Ellsworth being smar he average modern woman spends seventy-five percent of er time sitting down. . as figures clearly show.



However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the con-struction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn state-ment is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.






