## Spearman And Gruver Jaycees To Stage Celebration May 27

The Hansford County Celebration, being planned this year jointly by the Spearman and Gruver Junior Chambers of Commerce, will be held Saturday May 27th. These groups have secured a Carnival which will be in Spearman all week beginning Monday May 22. A percentage of the proceeds go to the Jaycees. There will be no Rodeo this year. Everything has been scheduled for the one day, Saturday May 27. The parade down Spearman's main street is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. with floats using the theme "Irrigation Age."

Cash prizes for the best floats will be \$40, \$25 and \$10. Trophies will be awarded to the best decorated bicycles for boys and girls divisions. Dick Cunniff is chairman of the parade and anyone wishing to enter the parade in costume should notify him. Following the parade the

## Next Monday Is Deadline For Farmers

Wheat farmers have until May 15 to turn in the number of acres they have seeded to wheat if they expect to receive payments this year.

This announcement was made this week by Hansford AGS office manager Elzeyer Vanderburg.

A farmer must report the number of acres he seeded, regardless of the condition of the crop, if part or all of the seeded acres has been abandoned, they still must be reported.

If a farmer does not make a report on his acreage he will not receive any of his support payments.

"More than half of the farmers in the county have yet to make this report," Vanderburg said, "May 15 is the deadline, and there will be no extension," he concluded.

Actually Mrs. Blackburn has been in business for a few weeks already, but she will soon open her new and larger shop when work soon be completed and ready for occupancy at this same address.

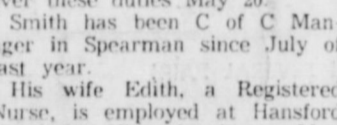
## 90 Cases Tried In City Court

**College Students Must Report To Local Draft Boards Soon**

AUSTIN, Texas, May 5.—The state director of Texas draft boards Friday advised nearly 100,000 draft-college and university undergraduates classified in Class II-S to take action before the end of the spring semester on an "important matter for their possible benefit." Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, urged these students to request their college or university registrars to send their class standings to local boards as soon as these standings are available after the spring semester ends. "If these class standings are not sent in for the 1966-67 school year, it is likely that a lot of these students will get reclassified into Class I-A next fall just because their draft boards don't have this information," the state draft director said. "Some colleges and universities will report these class standings without requests from the students," he continued, "but others will do it only when the student asks that it be done."

Because class standings were not sent in on many college students in Class II-S during the summer of 1966 for the 1965-66 school year, approximately a third of them in Texas were reclassified into Class I-A. "Eventually nearly all of these were restored to Class II-S," Colonel Schwartz said, "because they took steps to get the class standings upon reclassification; but some had to undergo the armed forces physical-mental examination and some got orders to report for induction into the armed services before the certificates for class standing reached their local boards." College and university registrars will be able to report the class standings during the summer after all grades are reported and compared. The standings are reported to local boards by the registrars on Selective Service System Forms Nos. 109 or 109-A, or on forms designed by the colleges and universities themselves. Class standings are not reported on graduate students and stu-

dents of professions such as medicine, dentistry, and law. Only satisfactory or unsatisfactory performance is reported on these.

**Bill Introduced To Stop Defiant Flag Desecration**  
A bill to curb deliberate and defiant desecration of the American Flag was introduced today by Representative Bob Price.  
The House Judiciary Committee will begin hearings on Price's bill next week. Price said he would appear before a Judiciary sub-committee with Texas Senator John Tower and Towers brother, Lawrence, who is the President of the American Flag Foundation.  
"It is strange indeed," Price said, "to see on the same day in the same newspaper pictures of American young men dying in Vietnam and also pictures of other young men burning their nation's flag in the safety of an American part. Certainly the Bill of Rights was never intended to protect those who contemptuously set fire to the American Flag."  
"One of the greatest strengths of this nation," he added, "is the right of descent. This right was established by our Founding Fathers and must remain inviolate. However, the right of descent from particular policies or with particular individuals was never intended to sanction the desecration of the American Flag which is the symbol of our national heritage and unites all Americans in their allegiance. To the Republic for which it stands."  
Price's bill would authorize punishment for desecration of the U. S. Flag by up to a years imprisonment and a \$1,000.00 fine.
