Area Men Purchase 117 Pigs

A group of Panhandle men returned Tuesday morning from a three-day trip through Kansas, Missouri, Iowa and Illinois buying Pigs for Ag and 4-H projects.

Troy Sloan and Jerry Hawkins were Spearman men making the trip. Sloan took his pickup truck and trailer. Hawkins, High School Ag Instructor, accompanied him. The men said the hog farmers throughout these states were hard to deal with this time. The corn crops were still green and they wanted to keep most of their hogs to feed out on this later-than-usual crop.

The group traveled some 2200 miles. Others from this area making the trip included Hutchinson County Agent Charles Beedy, John Scott, hog farmer from Skellytown, and Larry Schikendance, Borger Ag teacher. They were able to purchase 117 pigs, averaging 40-50 pounds each, breeds purchased included Berkshires, Durocs, Poland China, Hampshires, Spots and Chester Whites.

These States, where hog farms are numerous, have a much larger supply of animals available than the Texas Panhandle has.

School Taxes Show Increase

October 1st each year is tax paying time and this year may be a record as to number of statements mailed and evaluation.

City and County tax evaluations have increased over last year.

Spearman Independent School District tax statements are now in the hands of payers. 3434 statements were mailed.

The assessed property evaluation on school taxes this year totals \$45,353,508.00, an increase of \$2,731,910.00 over last year. This increase is due to increased gas production.

On this evaluation figure, \$829,971.40 will be collected in taxes.

Of course the largest evaluation comes from the Oil Companies. Pan American is the largest Tax payer and will pay a total of \$68,888.15.

Spearman's Jynxing Lynx played their most brilliant game of the year Friday night at their home-coming affair, when they knocked over the fine Stinnett team 28-16 in a real crowd pleaser.

With time running out in the half, Spearman pulled their pretties play of the year. Shieldknight ran to his right, threw the ball back to his left and down to the middle, into the waiting arms of Mike Davis who scored easily. The play was good for 52 yds!

The half ended with the Lynx leading 22-8.

The Lynx lost two scoring opportunities in the third, but just couldn't get a break and didn't put any score on the board.

In the fourth quarter, Brown again gave Spearman good field position with some fine runs. Faries and Cochran were also outstanding in the second half.

However, real excitement gripped the Spearman fans when Shieldknight ran a twisting turning 30 yard touchdown, in the fourth quarter to ice the ball game.

All-in-all, this was the best game of the year for the fine Lynx. Maybe it was played for Miss Marsha Schuman, who was crowned the 1967 football queen.

In any event, the Lynx will have their work cut-out for them, when they meet the Dalhart Wolves at Dalhart this Friday night.

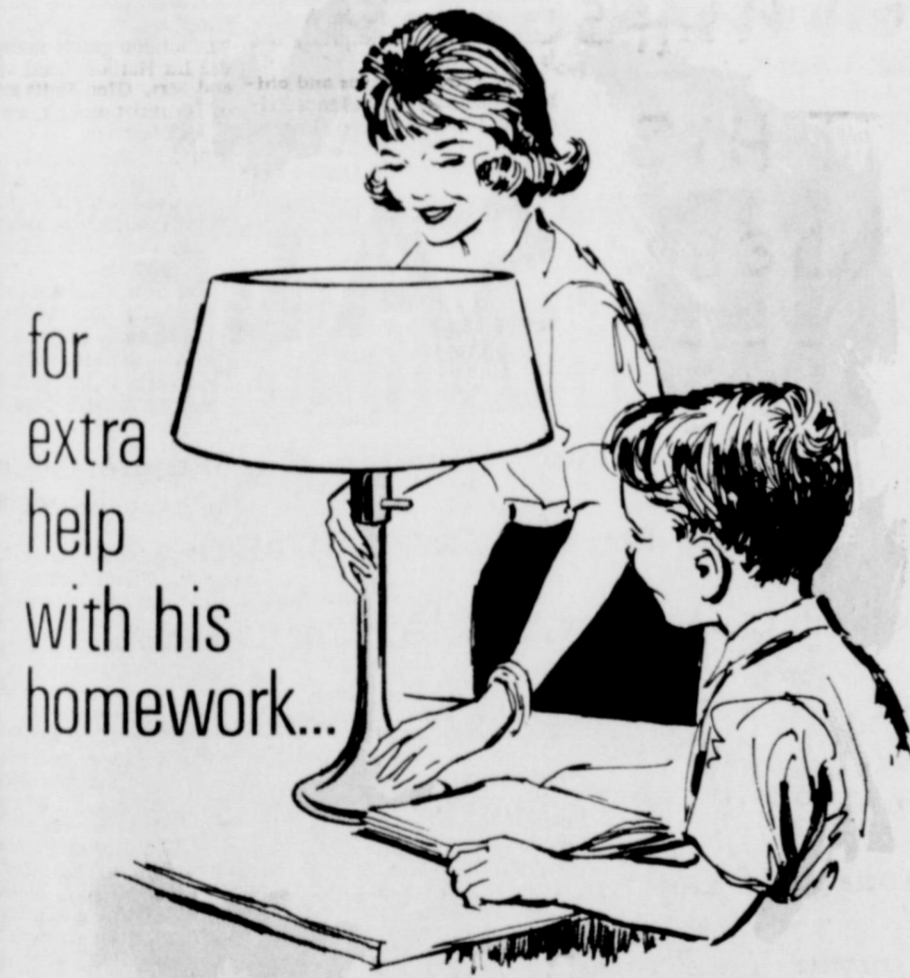

They enticed us with dinner at the Gold Tree so I pulled myself away from the washing machine and off we took! Never regretted one minute of my week end until Monday morning.... A very interesting couple stopped by the office this week. They were Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Spearman, natives of England, now living in Norfolk, Virginia. A man up in New York State had given him the name of this small Texas town and he decided to look it up and see if some of his ancestors had anything to do with founding our City. We gave him all the info we had on the naming of Spearman. Spearman was named after Thomas E. Spearman the then Vice-President of the Santa Fe Railway

Company, 1917.

All this genealogy discussion reminded me that we have two women in Spearman who are members of the DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution) They are Mrs. John Allen and Mrs. H. P. Cates, both daughters of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Buchanan, early settlers of Hansford, I wonder if there are other DAR members in the county? In order to become a member of the DAR, you must prove your ancestors fought in the American Revolution. The Buchanan family have known theirs did, but only recently proved it. Lucille Allen put in several years of much letter writing to and from "readers" in Kentucky, Missouri and Pennsylvania. At the beginning, she tried going through her mother's side of the family to find the "fighting" ancestor! She couldn't trace any who participated in the right battle though! She did find that the late (and very beloved to all) Mary Jane Buchanan was the daughter of Elinore Elizabeth Monroe whose great uncles were President James Monroe and General Robert E. Lee. The Buchanan side of the family was easier traced. The Scottish Clan Buchanan was founded in the 13th century by the Earl of Lennox in Sterling Co. Scotland. Anthony Buchanan, born 1788, immigrated to Ireland with 7 children. Five of these immigrated to Canada in 1847, one was John Buchanan John later traveled to Missouri on to South Texas, then to Oklahoma, around Erick. This is where J. H. Buchanan met his wife. His great grand father Joseph Brown fought in the American Revolution as a wagon soldier. He was a Quaker and refused to fight, so he drove the wagon ambulance. It is a most interesting experience to go through all the stacks of photo-copies, hundreds of letters and newspaper clippings, old pass ports, etc. all resulting in final proof of who's who! Perhaps the most interesting bit of news to turn up was this: In the 1870's a certain branch of the Buchanan tree settled on land which now is New York City proper. Later these settlers leased this land to New York City for 99 years. This 99 year lease is up soon, and the New York City officials are desperately trying to trace down all Buchanan family heirs. Know what the going price is for the land New York City rests on??? Over one hundred and thirty MILLION dollars. Instead of turning up a "skeleton in the closet" the Buchanans might have stumbled across a gold mine!
