They were able to purchase 117 pigs, averaging 40-50 pounds each, breeds pur-chased included Berkshires, Durocs, Poland China, Hampsh - ire, Spots and Chaster Whites,

September Weather Summary

The average temperature in the city throughout September was 80 degrees according to the US Weather guage at the H. P. Cates home. The top temperature was a sizzling 100 degrees on Sept. 12. The lowest reading recorded during the month was 44 on Sept. 27

The only 100 degree readings for the entire summer (through September) totals just three days. The other two were in

July.
Eight days in September temperatures read in the 90s, 17 days in the 80s and there were 5 days with readings below the 80 mark.

Spearman received . 25 inches of rainfall which fell on the 5th, 6th and 7th days of the month. This brings the year's total moisture to 18,62, which is 2.91 below the average normal for the year.

School Taxes Show Increase

tions have increased over last year. Spearman Independent Sch -

ool District tax statements are now in the hands of payers. 3434 statements were mailed. The assessed property evalua-

tion on school taxes this year totals \$45,353,508,00, an in-crease of \$2,731,910,00 over last year. This increase is due to increased gas production.
On this evaluation figure, \$829, 971, 40 will be collected

Of course the largest evalua-tion comes from the Oil Companies. Pan American is the largest Tax payer and will pay a total of \$68,888.15.

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
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
