

Textbooks May Be Protested, List Is Available To Public

In a letter to School Superintendent B. E. Reeves last week, the State Board of Education commissioner enclosed a list of books which publishers intend to submit for adoption in Nov. 1967. The commissioner requested that the list be given public-ity and kept available for pu-

blic inspection and review.
The State Textbook committee will meet October 10, 1967 to hear petitions regarding any of the books offered for adoption.

Any citizen desiring to enter a protest against a book or books which are offered for use in Texas Public Schools must declare by September 1. weather begins to get warm enough to play golf. The Textbook committee will make its recommendations from the list on October 11. Textbooks adopted from the list will become available for distribution to Texas school children for the school year beginning Sept. 1, 1968. Local school officials may choose one or more of the textbooks adopted for each sub-ject, which means that final decision as to the specific texts that will be used in each school system will be made by local selection committees and local boards.

The list of books is on file in the office of Dr. Reeves and can be seen by anyone so desiring, at Spearman High School.
