6th Historical **Marker Placed**

The sixth Official Texas Historical Marker to be erec ted in Hansford County was set in place at 9 A. M. June

This was the marker for Hansford Cemetery and was placed at the cemetery entrance at Old Hansford.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect measures 20 X 20 inches and was sponsored by Hansford County Historical Survey Co-mmittee. Tom Jones of Gruver is chairman.

The inscription on the mar-ker reads:" Hansford Cemeker reads:" Hansford Ceme-tery. First burial ground set aside in this county. Early, grave (1890) was that of Mrs. Alfie P. Magee, wife of the first Sheriff. Also buried here: the Cator Brothers, founders of Zulo Stockade; and the Wright Brothers, early ra-nchers. Only official cemes tery in County until 1928, is still in use. Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, 1967." This marker and its loca-tion will appear in the next tion will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Mark-ers, in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours, and to acquaint the people of Hansford County with their own unique historical past.

The first five markers to be placed by this committee were: Bob Cator marker; Do-dge-City, Tascosa Trail ma-rker, History of Hansford County marker, both placed at old Hansford; Bob Martin ma-rker (first Sheriff killed in line of duty) placed on Court house; and the Old Farwell (first town in county) marker,

A large tree was blocking the road and as the soldiers were moving it a booby trap ex-ploded. Evidently Mitts took the full impact. No others were wounded. He received shrapnel injuries in the throat and both legs. One leg was broken. When he wrote the letter he was in a field hos-

letter he was in a field hospital in Bien Hoa, Republic of Vietnam, and was to be transferred soon. He did not know where he would be sent

Mitts has been in the Army since October, 1966. He was sent to Vietnam last April. He is with the Headquarters Company of the 4th infantry Division.

This is the second Hansford County soldier to be wounded in action in Vietnam. The first one was Cpl. Raymond Tindell, USMC, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Tindell of Spearman.







Calls For Changes In Licenses

Great strides were taken to protect motorists on Texas highways May 30 when Governor John Connally signed his traffic safety program into law. The first of the series of bills, the Traffic Safety Act of 1967, provides for authority of the Governor to estab-lish a statewide traffic safety program which provides for research and developmental projects and direct coop-eration of state agencies. The Act also provides for a Traffic Safety Fund into which all funds received for the eration of state agencies. The Act also provides for a Traffic Safety Fund into which all funds received for the purpose of implementing the Act willbe placed. Estab-lishment of this Act will enable Texas to receive federal aid under the Federal Highway Safety Act of 1966 which requires all state governments to establish governor-ad-ministered highway safety programs or lose 10 percent of ministered highway safety programs or lose 10 percent of

the federal money. Texas drivers' licenses will soon take on a new look by the addition of a picture of the license on laminated cards, Drivers' licenses for persons under 21 years of age will be provisional and a different color than those iss-ued to adults. The color of the license and the picture will help liquor store operators determine whether or

The applicant at the rate of \$6 rather than the present \$3

fee. A fee of \$1 will be charged for duplicate licenses. The Department of Public Safety may in its discretion require an examination for the renewal of a license. Man datory license suspension for the first moving traffic violation has been increased from six to 12 months and subject to orders of state courts, up to 18 months for subsequent violations. Drivers whose licenses have been suspended or revoked or are subject to suspension or re-vocation will have to attend rehabilitation schools which will be established and devoloped by the Department of

Public Safety. In order for an applicant to get a drivers' license he must be 18 years old unless he has completed a driver education course approved by the Department and is 16 years of age. Those who take driver education however, will as in the past, be granted a 10 percent discount on their bodily injury-property damage-medical payments and collision insurance by all insurance companies in the state who follow the prescribed rates set by the St.

Board of Insurance. The only exceptions under which a license may be iss-ued at the age of 15 are hardship cases and where the driver has completed the classroom portion of a driver education course and drives only with a licensed adult

The fee for inspection of motor vehicles will be raised to \$1.75 rather than \$1.50. Now on the mandatory inspection checklists are front seatbelts where seatbelt anchorages are part of the manufacturers original equipment, wheels, rims, and steering. The Commercial Driver Training School and Instructor

Licensing Act requires state police to regulate them and license driver training schools and their operators.
