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

Cookies -- easy to make, easy to eat and an all time favorite children's delight. This makes them a good cat-alyst for young Miss' cooking skills since a new cook must start out by making something she wants to make -- and likes to eat. To begin your new cook right, give her-or him-the idea cooking is not all work. Cookies are a good starter. Sharing what she makes is a big motivation. She may wish to bake cookies for Christmas for Dad, Grandmother, her favorite teacher or even Santa Claus. Practice first with a mix. For preschool children the drawn out process of mixing "from scratch" is too long. It does not hold their attention but they love to help decorate. A pre-schooler won't want to give her cookies away either. She is more self oriented at this age, she wants to eat

them herself. No-Bake Peanut Butter -Raisins Chews have been developed by U.S. Department of Agriculture specialists to combine two nourishing. plentiful foods. It makes 25

1 cup corn syrup 1 cup nonfat dry milk 1 cup powdered sugar 1 cup raisins Mix peanut butter, corn syrup, milk and powdered sugar. Add raisins and mix well. Press out 1/2 inch thick in an 8x8 pan. Cut into squares. Chill before serving. These cookies taste like candy bars, and are a favorite with youngsters. CANDY BAR COOKIES 1 cup brown sugar cup light corn syrup teaspoon salt cup peanut butter cup soft butter d teaspoons vanilla 4 cups raw quick-cooking

pieces Start oven at 350 degrees. Grease a 13x9x2 inch pan with unsalted shortening. Mix brown sugar and butter in large bowl until light and fluffy. Add corn syrup, va-nilla, salt and rolled oats and beat on low speed to mix ingredients well.

Spread the mixture evenly in pan. Bake 15 minutes. While the mixture bakes,

the peanut butter and mix chocolate in small bowl. Remove the pan from ov-

en, and at once spread the peanut-butter - chocolate mixture evenly over the top to cover until the heat melts the chocolate. When cool, cut into bars.

Although the new manmade fibers have helped the homemaker with easy care clothing and household tex-tiles, they had added another problem. Many of the fibers tend to absorb oily substances but do not absorb water; thus, making the removal of oily stains difficult. The trait especially is true with polyester, containing fabrics. Resins in permanent press fab-, rics also add to the problem of making oily stain remov-al more difficult. Their ef-fectiveness is influenced to some extent by the texture and color of the fabric and the type of stain.

Wash the stain as soon as possible, and pre-spot it with a liquid detergent. Fabrics with permanent press finish may be washed at home or dry-cleaned.

It is better to eat your breakfast then to drink it. While the fast breakfast drinks cut the time you spend in the kitchen in the morning, they add dollars to your food bill.

Japan Entry In Hemisfair

San Antonio-Japan has become the twenty-third nation to announce participation in HemisFair and will occupy 6,000 square feet of space in what promises to be one of the more interesting exhibits at the first World's Fair to be held in the Southwestern area

of the United States. The announcement was made by Hideho Tanaka. Consul General of Japan in Houston. Tanaka, who advis-ed HemisFair's Jack Newman Director of International Re-lations, by letter, declared, "Japan's participation in this great Fair is most significant because it will be a clear manifestation of the close relations between the peoples of Texas and Japan. I also take this opportunity to wish that this event will create even deeper understanding between both peoples."

HemisFair President Mar shall Steves said he was most happy to hear the news about Japan's participation and thanked Tanaka and his government for their cordial message accompanying the announcement. Said Steves,

"It is indeed a happy moment as we continue to move forward toward the grand opening date of HemisFair. We are most pleased to accept the participation of the Japanese government and we can rest assured that Japan will have an outstanding presenta-tion at our World's Fair which will be drawing interested visitors from throughout the world.

Tanaka said he was inform-ing HemisFair of the Japanese participation after receiving an official communication from the Ministry of Foreign

The biggest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.



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
Dear Bob and John:
