## Local Board Notified 1968 Draft Increase

State draft boards received their quotas of men for induction last week and this week received February quotas for pre-induction physical examinations.

Local draft board officials have notified 18 men to re-report January 31 for examinations: Charles Johnson, Daniel Pike, Ronald Swan, Daniel Cann, William Abraham, Curtis Crosier, Jack Meek,

Willis Smith, Bill Trosper, Wesley Jarvis, Michael Key, Alfred Lemons, Robert Phillips, Rodney Emmel, Lynn Johnson, Harley Reeves, Rennie Berry and Cleydus Harper.

The local draft board was called upon to furnish 12 men for induction in February, the largest call since November 1966 when 20 men were drafted. January's call was for one man.

Officials stated that 1968 draft calls will be for large numbers of men to replace those drafted in 1966 who are now being released.

The draft has been set at a total of 96,300 for the first three months of this year (nationally). This overall figure would call for inductions at a rate of 23,000 monthly for the rest of 1968. This compares with monthly quotas averaging 30,000 in 1966 and 18,500 in 1967. Texas' February quota was 1165, the state's share of a national call for 23,300 for the army.

The local board originally had a call for 15 for pre-induction examinations, but because the call was received, it was increased 15%... or 18 men.

The 12 men who will be inducted January 31 are: Larry Schilling, Dennis Mandrell, Donald Burke, David Swan, Larry Beasley, Larry Jackson, Gordon Fausset, Billy Womble, Jesse Vera, Johnnie Smith, James Steidle and Mickey Armstrong.

## SHS Students Vote For Foreign Exchange Student Home Is Needed

Members of the American Field Service chapter, sponsors of foreign exchange students, are asking that Spearman residents consider keeping a foreign student next year.

Spearman has had two foreign exchange students: Geir Overland from Norway here in 1965, Chris Lobo from Brazil was a student last year. However, because no one volunteered to keep one in their home, no exchange student was invited to Spearman for the 1967-68 school term.

Thousands of students from foreign countries desiring to study in America are turned down each year because of lack of foster homes.

Anyone interested in keeping an exchange student next year is asked to contact Jack McWhirter, chairman of the local field service chapter. Call him by dialing 2249, and make your desires known. McWhirter said the chapter made a survey in Spearman High School, and the entire student body expressed its desire for having a foreign exchange student. The Student Council helps, in a financial way, with the expenses of keeping a foreign exchange student.

## Lynx Wallop Wolves 69-27

The Spearman Lynx, undefeated in district play, poured points on the Dalhart Wolves in a 69-27 Tuesday night by a score of 69-27. The Lynx added another win to their district record and they won their first game of the second half.

The Lynx trailed the first few minutes of the game but before the first quarter was over they took the lead by a score of 13-8. During the second quarter the Lynx added more points, to make a half time score of 32-14. In the third quarter Dalhart was cold with only 3 points added to their score to give them 17 points, third quarter score was 50-17.

The fourth quarter was mostly the second team doing the honors and scoring 19 points to give the Lynx 69 points and holding Dalhart to 27 points to give them a total of 27 points. Final score was 69 for Spearman, 27 for Dalhart. This gave the Lynx their seventh district win of the season.

Next Tuesday night the Lynx and the Blackhaws from Phillips will meet in the Lynx Gym for the deciding game for first place. Everyone is asked to attend and support the Lynx in this game. Your support means a lot to the boys.

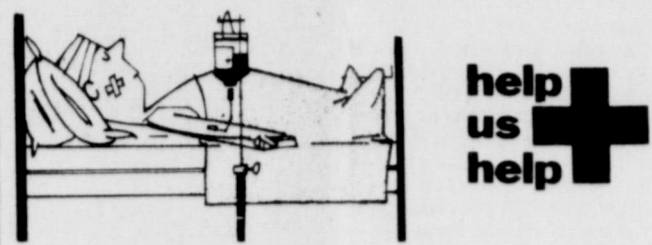
## Car Wreck Injures One

## Capt. Sheets Has Completed Army Service

Dr. and Mrs. Perry Sheets and their three children have recently been visiting their parents in Spearman: Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Sheets and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Novak.

Dr. Sheets received his discharge from the U.S. Army on January 3 after serving two years.

Sheets received his DVM degree from Texas A & M University in 1965 and volunteered for duty with the U.S. Army. He went in as a First Lieut. and after serving some six months received his Captain's commission.

Before entering service, Dr. Sheets worked four months at San Antonio Austin Highway Veterinarian Clinic.

He received his basic training at Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio. From there he was sent to Chicago for special schooling with preventive medicine and meat inspection which is the primary duties of an Army veterinarian. Upon completion of his schooling there he was shipped to Ft. Stewart, Georgia. Last July Capt. Sheets was sent to Hunter Army Air Base, Hinesville, Ga. where he remained until his discharge this month.

Dr. and Mrs. Sheets will reside in San Antonio where he will continue his work at the Austin Highway Veterinarian Hospital.

# Candidates File For Re-election

Political activity picked up in Hansford County this week when District Judge Max Boyer and Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector J.B. Cooke filed for places on the Democratic ballot.

Democratic Chairman J.D. Helms said these men filed as candidates for re-election to their respective offices.

Previously Joe Day had authorized this newspaper to announce his candidature for re-election as Commissioner, Precinct 1.

Also, in the columns of this issue of the Reporter, voters will read the announcement of Republican Malouf Abraham who asks re-election to the office of State Representative for this District. His district for the past two years has been the 84th district and with the addition of Hansford County this year will be known as the 79th district. A native of Canadian, he is well known in this area.

J.D. Helms has filed for re-election to the office of

Democratic Chairman for Hansford County.

These announcements marked the first political activity in the county this year. A survey at the County court house reveals the terms of county officials expire as follows: District Judge, District Attorney, County Attorney, Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector, Commissioner Precinct one and Commissioner Precinct three.

The deadline for filing for places on the ballot is Feb. 5.

The Democratic Primary and the Republican primary will be Saturday May 4, 1968.

## Chart Dating From 1880 Shows Wet Years With Jan. Moisture

Light, steady rain showers which began falling Saturday night and continued most of the day Sunday left Spearman with .59 according to US weather observer Mrs. H. P. Cates. Amounts varies over the county. South of Spearman Garland Head measured .65 and further west of him John Trindle received nearly an inch. Toward Gruver, Ned Turner recorded .90 in his rain gauge.

The must needed rain boosted the moral of wheat farmers and ranchers and brightened prospects for the Panhandle agriculture industry. Some cities throughout the Golden Spread received from one to two inches from the weekend showers.

The .59 plus the .06 inches recorded January 3 brought January's total moisture to .66 so far.

In looking over the weather chart back to the year 1880, it is interesting to note that every year, in which at least .60 of moisture was recorded in January, ended as a "wet" year with above average moisture being recorded.

This .66 total is the most January moisture to fall since 1960 when 1.08 was recorded. That year 30.27 inches of rain fell. In 1959 we had .78 in January with a year's total of 23.88. In 1957, .67 fell in January and 24.75 for the year. So if January's moisture is any indication, perhaps we may expect a wet 1968.

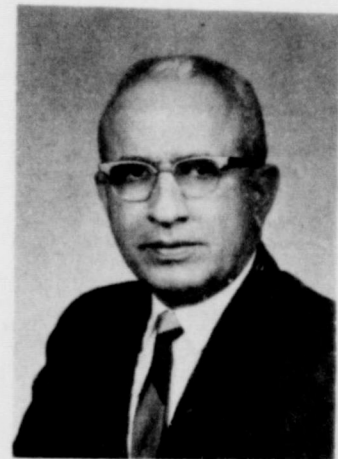

I have enjoyed serving in the House very much and have certainly learned a lot about State Government. I know this experience will benefit me greatly next term. I have made it a point to stay in touch with the people of the District and will continue to do so. I am looking forward to serving Hansford County and hope to get a lot better acquainted with you folks in the coming months. When I ran two years ago, there was only one Republican in the House. Three of us were elected and now there will be seven Republicans in the House for the Special Session coming up, with a lot more next year. In 1966 when Mr. Abraham ran for State Representative on the Republican ticket, he won easily over his Democrat opponent receiving 61 percent of the vote. ### 1968 Amendments Adds To Benefits

The 1968 amendments to the social security law increased benefit payments of persons now on the rolls, and also will increase the payments of all future beneficiaries a minimum of 13 percent.

Travis C. Briggs, Amarillo social security manager said today.

For example, under the new law, a person retiring at age 65 who average \$350 monthly in covered work will receive a monthly retirement payment of \$140.40. The former benefit was \$124.20.

For workers who earn \$6000 or less a year, the amendments mean sizable increases in benefits without comparable increases in taxes as were scheduled in the old law. The tax rate for 1968 is the same as it was in 1967.

Increased taxes are scheduled, however, for the one worker in four who earns over \$6600 yearly. He will be paying taxes on earnings up to \$7800. These higher paid workers who will pay the increased taxes will get substantially higher benefits. For example, a man now 27 or younger who pays social security taxes on \$7800 annually until retirement at age 65 will collect thirty percent higher benefits--\$215 a month for himself--\$323 for self and wife at 65.

Benefit payments to the disabled and survivors of insured workers are also increased comparably to the retirement benefits.

### Local Teachers Attend Clinic

Edwin Peary, president of the local Texas Classroom Teachers Association and Mike King, treasurer of the local association attended the second annual Political Action Clinic in Austin Jan. 19 and 20. Their trip was paid for the local teachers group.

This clinic, sponsored by Texas Classroom Teachers Association is planned to help teachers become active, political citizens and an effective political force in Texas.

The clinic drew teachers from all over the state to hear keynote speakers Lieut. Gov. Preston Smith; Ben Barnes, speaker of the Texas House of Representatives; and Wally Johnson, a political consultant from the National Education Association.

Theme for the 1968 clinic was "Every Teacher...an Active Political Citizen."

Designed to increase the political awareness of Texas teachers, the clinic was coordinated by Oather Raynes of Dallas, state legislative chairman of TCTA.

Methods of endorsing candidates and legislative proposals, how to get out the vote, and how to determine qualifications of candidates will be discussed.

Featuring a "cracker barrel session" on how to combat political apathy and group discussions on political involvement, the two-day meet opened with a speech by Barnes entitled "Education in Texas--Nothing Short of Excellence." The closing luncheon featured Preston Smith's discussion of educational legislation in Texas.

Following a successful clinic last February, TCTA was instrumental in obtaining passage of bills on teachers salaries, professional consultation, and continuing contracts during the last legislative session.

### Texas Economy To Get Boost

The economy of Texas will get a multi-million dollar boost this year through direct spending of visitors to HemisFair '68.

More than 600 Texas tourism development leaders were told at the Governor's annual Tourist Conference in Austin that \$205 million will be spent outside of HemisFair by fair visitors during the six-month run.

Jim Gaines, chief executive officer of the international exposition, also said the state itself will gain upwards of \$18 million from new spending.

"There is no way that you can get to HemisFair without traveling through a lot of Texas--both going and coming," Gaines said. "The average out-of-state visitor without any side trips will travel nearly 800 miles of Texas' great highway system, spending \$165 million on just his car, on food, drink and lodging as he goes."

Gov. John Connally said due to HemisFair, Texas tourism is expected to be at an all-time high, perhaps even bigger than it will be in 1969.

Connally unveiled the official travel trails during the conference, and delegates were briefed on promoting local areas to attract the fair visitor, as the state's tourism industry turned full attention to HemisFair for 1968.

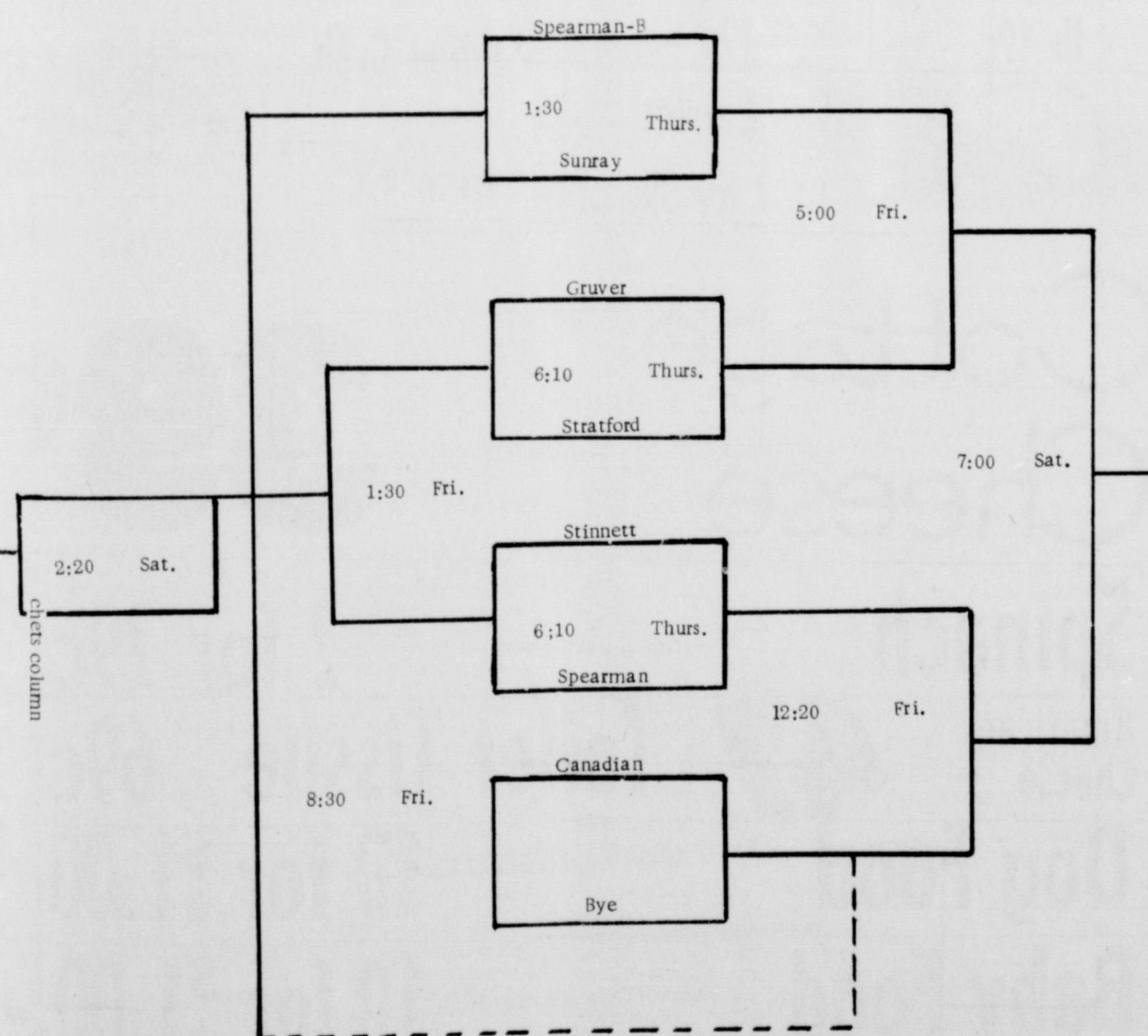
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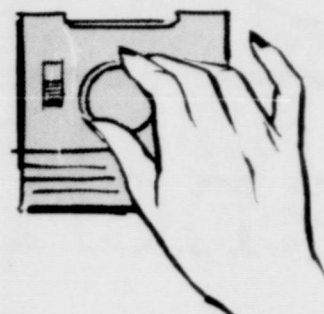
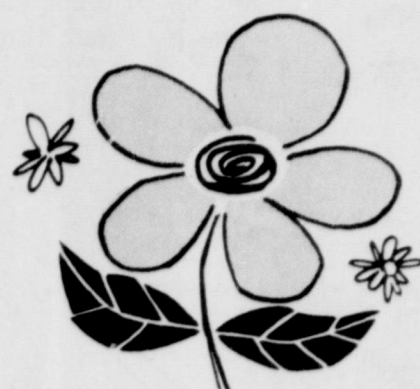
