Rural Housing Loans Expanded

More than 94 rural people in Hansford, Hutchinson, Lipscomb and Ochiltree Counties have new or vastly improved homes as a result of \$250,050 in insured loan funds advanc ed through the Farmers Home Administration in the past two years, Robert J. Holloway local County Supervisor of the supervised credit agency reported today.

The rural housing program was greatly expanded in 1965 when, as part of President Lyndon B. Johnson's effort to strengthen rural America, the financing of the loans was switched from federal to private sources. Practically all of the rural housing loan funds now come from private sources on an insured basis. The construction that took

place as a part of the credit program provided 3861 mandays of employment for local camenters, plumbers, electricians, and masons.

In addition, the housing funds circulating through the four county area gave the local economy a boost of approximately \$1,000,000 since it is estimated that these funds changed hands seven times.

For example, under the new law, a person retiring at age 65 who averagee \$350 month. ly in covered work will receive a monthly retirement payment of \$140.40. The former benefit was \$124.20. For workers who earn \$6600

or less a year, the amend - . ments mean sizable increases in benefits without comparable increases in taxes as were scheduled in the old law. The tax rate for 1968 is the same as it was in 1967.

Increased taxes are scheduled, however, for the one worker in four who earns over \$6600 yearly. He will be paying taxes on earnings up to \$7800. These higher paid workers who will pay the increased taxes will get substantially higher benefits. For example, a man now 27 or younger who pays social security taxes on \$7800 annually until retirement at age 65 will collect thirty percent higher benefits -- \$218 a month for himself -- \$323 for self and

Benefit payments to the disabled and survivors of insured workers are also increased comparably to the retirement benefits.

The United States Treas-ury, the most avid coin collector and any expert in the field will promptly assure you that those Kennedy half dollars will still be worth the current fifty cents value to your great, great grandchildren. Most rare coins that have any above face value, are already in the hands of professional coin collectors and these collectors add or detract from their collections by trading with other collectors. Maybe you think Indian Head pennies are go-ing to bring a premium one of these sweet days. If you do, you're beating a dead horse. A shoe box full of Indian Head pennies is worth one cent each and a liberty head nickle is worth exactly five times as much. Some time ago, I came in possession of one of the old pre-Roosevelt dollar bills. This was one of the old large sized bills. A friend saw this dollar and asked me what I wanted for it. He was greatly surprised when I tole him he could have it for one dollar. He didn't realize that it wasn't worth a penny more than any single dollar in his cash register. He proudly took the old dollar bill home and I'm sure he has it safely snuggled away in some bureau drawer. When it comes to tight money, this sort of currency is tighter than the skin on a grape. Normally, this column is devoted to the people I see in and around Spearman, but since most of the people I see every week are interested in, the Hansford County area and its betterment, I thought I'd devote the space this week to something of local interest. This is just an idea, but I believe it has merit, so I'll make it short and to the point. 


