
#### Christmas Suit **Trash And Treasure Sale** Fund Underway Mr. Will Harris, the





#### State Health Dept. Honors Spearman Men

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Billy G. Lowry and James B. Lantz, plant operations specialists for the Spearman water supply system. The citation reflects the regard in which the men are held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sew age Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant manage ment.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Depart ment sanitary engineers. State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.
