





Help Your Lions Club By Helping The Blind To See



Following is the story about Mrs. Joyce Raymond, the Panhandle, Texas house wife and mother who spoke to Spearman Lions club last week. Mrs. Raymond received help through the Hi-Plains Eye Bank, sponsored by Lions Clubs, and with eye transplants, was able to "see again."

THEN THERE WAS LIGHT

T guess I do not remember being

able to see clearly before the miracle, I know I must have when I

was a small child. My eyes never
gave much trouble, except when
I had hayfever in the summer.

After my marriage in 1948 my eyes began to bother me, but I never saw a doctor until I began having trouble reading. He fitted me with glasses, but in spite of this my vision grew steadily worse. On one visit to the optometrist, we had a long talk and he told me that he would refer me to an opthalmologist for further treatment. I was beginning to worry. care of my home and family. I had married a wonderful man and we had a beautiful baby girl, or so Dick said, for I couldn't see her too well. Now there was going to be another baby soon, and I want ed so much to be able to see it

The ophthalmologist said I had a condition of the eye called Keratoconus and there was little that could be done. He fitted me with contact lenses and said it would be a matter of time, but eventually I would be blind.

It seemed that my heart broke into a million pieces. For the first time, in a long time, I prayed, "Lord, why did this happen to me?" I could not stand the thoughts of living in darkness for the rest of my life. I was only

19 years old. My vision was 20/200 and 20/400. My world was a dark gray, blurry mess. I could only wear the contact lenses for a few hours at a time and the pain was so great that I could hardly stand

God blessed our home with a little boy and for a while after this with the aid of contact lenses I could still manage my home and family.

I had such a wonderful hushand to love me, who would have done anything for me. He did the bill paying, the grocery buying, and the other things I could not manage to do. He also helped take care of the baby and housework. My mother and father were wonderful, they helped me in every way that they could. I always felt that God had blessed me with more than I deserved.

The next eleven years were hard ones, but our home was made happier with two more children, a girl and a boy. Our financial situation wasn't too good Contact lenses were expensive and I had to have four pair, while trying to find a pair that would fit.

My health was bad and after our little girl was born, my right lung collapsed. I was in the hospital and at my mother's home for some three months. It seemed that things could not get much worse, but they did. Before our boy came, I had another bad spell with my lungs, and I spent sixteen more days in the hospital. By this time we were in real need. God provides for his own and by His grace, we made it.

I came to the point where I had to lay aside my contact. I had had so much pain and disappointment that I felt I could no longer stand it. With each pair of contacts my hopes would rise and I would think, "maybe it will be

different this time, and I can wear them," but always to my bitter disappointment they would fail. I prayed and in my heart I found peace, believing that this was my cross to bear.

I began to prepare for my dark world. I redeived my talking book from which came so many pleasant hours of music and books that I had longed to read. I received my Sunday School Lessons so that I could help with my class. I then began to take Braillo. This was very difficult for me because I wanted to look at the dots instead of feeling them.

I had a wonderful Braillo teacher who was blind. She tried to prepare me for the "world" that lay ahead. She would say, "Joyce, quit fighting it, it will get easier some day". It never got easier. I wanted to see more than anything. I wanted to see my children for I feared that we would go somewhere and they would be dirty. I wanted to see Dick's beautiful smile, from across the room and know that he loved me. I wanted to be able to cook without having to feel my way while I was making a pie so that I know if it was good. I know now that I was more fortunate than than many people

who could not see.

Our baby boy was seven months old when I awoke one morning to find no vision at all in my right eye. I knew this was the end. A visit to the doctor confirmed my suspicions. My eye had ruptured The doctor told me I would have to have a cornea transplant. I do not believe I can ever put into words the fear that was in my heart. I told the doctor that I did not want this. He said I would have to have the operation or loose my eye to cancer. He sent me 340 miles to another city, to plants and had been successful This type of operation was new and one that my doctor did not perform as yet. He confirmed the condition of my eye, adding that it was my only chance to see again. The chances were not good that the operation would be successful. Only God knows the fears that were in my heart as I consented to that operation. I came home with little hope of ever seeing again and my thoughts were so troubled it was hard for

We waited a month for an eye from a donor. Eyes are enucleated only from deceased who have previously donated them. With each ring of the phone I would want to run and hide. February 28, 1961, at 2:00 P.M. the phone rang, I

answered to find the nurse in the doctor's office asking me if I could be at the hospital at 10:00 P.M. that night. I almost said no. I was frantic the next few hours as we finished packing for our 21 day stay and depositing our children at grandma's house.

I couldn't kiss my baby good-bye, he was asleep in his bed - I had to just turn around and walk out. The next morning after a sleep-less night, at 7:30 A.M. the nurse gave me a shot and two pills that were to put me on cloud 9. The operation was to be a local, the doctor said there was less chance

of being sick this way.

They wheeled me into the operating room at 8:30 A.M. and for the next hour and forty-five minutes the doctor performed a miracle as he removed the old cornea. I looked up to see the beautiful lights over head and saw them as clearly as possible. As the doctor fitted the new cornea on my eye and he began to stitch it in place, I could see everything he did, it was so wonderful to see.

He bandaged both eyes and they took me back to my room. As Dick took my hand I said, "Honey, I watched him. I could see, Honey. I could see! Thinking I was still groggy he just said to go to sleep and he held my hand.

The next few days were tedious ones. I was unable to move my head and could not lay on my right side because of my eye. A friend of ours who was an L.V.N. went with us as I had to have constant watching for fear I might turn over or try to get up in my sleep. For three days I lay in a black nothingness. I was fed, bathed, and cared for by Dick & our friend, I worried about the children for I missed them so much, I knew that they did not understand and they missed us, too.

As I lay in the hospital in the darkness not knowing how I would be able to manage now if this corneal transplant was not a success, I began to pray for understanding and guidance.

It had been a long road to where I lay now, I wondered if I had enough strength to continue. It now seemed as if I was reliving all of those years again in my mind.

I did not have much hope that I would be able to see, I only trusted God, and tried to understand what was happening to me. The fourth day I could sit up and the doctor removed the bandage from the left eye so I could see a little, but the light hurt my eye and I was still almost helpless.

and I were left alone. He cared for me and when I was released from the hospital we had to stay until the doctor could take part of the stitches out.

The twenty-first day finally came and we went to the office to have the stitches removed. This was very painful although the eye was deadened. He removed four of the eighteen stitches. The doctor said to return in two weeks. We went home and I sat straight up the whole way. We had to have as little inline as peccible.

have as little jolting as possible.

The pain was bad, but the sun was worse, for the light was almost more than I could take, but the thoughts of being home with my children made my heart

David was 8 1/2 months old now and was staying with my aunt. When we reached home he didn't know me and the bandage on my eye scared him. The other children were overjoyed at seeing us again and our homecoming was marked with many tears.

I was unable to do any work. Dick had to return to his job and the children were still in school. I could not lift David, so I could not be left alone. The next few weeks were wonderful for me, but hard for everyone else. It was so good to be home because I had missed everyone so much.

The children were good to help. Nancy was almost eleven and a good little housekeeper as I had tried to prepare her to take over for me when my sight was gone. Ricky was going on eight and he too was a big help. Chris was going on five and she was quite a little nurse.

With help from mother and grandmother, friends and loved ones, we survived the next six weeks with no major catastraphies. We made a trip to the doctor every two weeks. I could make out objects with my right eye, but nothing more.

One morning as I took the little metal shield off my eye to bathe it, I made out the faucets clearly with my right eye. I called for Dick, and he came running for fear that I had fallen. I told him that I could see out of my right eye. Oh, what a happy day! I could see clearly things that were just blurs with my left eye.

Everyday my eye got better, soon I was seeing entirely with my right eye and with each day my vision improved. Before long I was fitted with glasses and my vision was 20/20. I walked out of the ophthalmologist's effice into the most beautiful world anyone could ever hope to see. I had forgotten how green the grass was.

or how blue the sky. I could see people walking along the street, I smiled at each of them. I know they must have thought that I was

When I got home I went through the house touching things because everything was new to me. My children and Dick were so beauti-

ful.

The doctor said I would be anxious to have the second operation and I thought, "He doesn't know me very well," but I wanted my driver's license and Dick had promised if I would consent to the operation and if it was successful, I could get my driver's license, I knew that to be able to drive I had to have good vision in both eyes. I called the doctor just as he said I would and arranged for a second transplant. On our 14th Wedding Anniversary, January 16,

1962, we received my call.

The next 21 days weren't as the f. st ones had been so Dick was able to leave me and go back to work. Now I had enough vision to care pretty well for myself in the hospital after the first week.

A few months later I was fitted

with glasses again and I had 20/20 vision in both eyes.

You can never know how much being able to see means until you've lost it. To me seeing is more wonderful because I was

without sight for so long.

I saw David take his first steps, something I had missed with the other three. Everything he did was so cute to me because I saw it for myself.

I received my driver's license in November of 1963. Now I was able to go and do things all wives do. I love each and every chore. I love to watch Nancy sing in the choir and I go to all of Ricky's baseball games to watch him pitch. This is a thrill that is indescribable.

only God can make an eye, but through miracles the blind are able to see again and I know if it had not been His will, I would not be able to see now, and to His name I give the glory.

I say a prayer each time I look out the kitchen window because I can see my children playing. Each time I go to make a speech at one of the local Lions Clubs, I tell them how merciful God was to me and I thank God for the Hi-Plains Eye Bank which has recently been organized by the Lions Clubs of the Panhandle of Texas. I pray that those who walk in blindness may know the miracle that came to me when out of darkness, "THEN THERE WAS LIGHT."

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
