General Rains Fall Over Area Tuesday

Some areas had not received moisture since August. The official recording for Spearman was .97. East of the city at the Ray Phelps farm a little over one inch fell. South of Spearman at the Allen Pierce farm .90 was recorded. West, at the Ned Turner farm close to an inch fell and at North at the James Martin place they received about an inch. No hail fell in the Spearman area. Although most of the dry land wheat was too far gone to be helped by the rains, it is a most welcome drink for pasture land which has been dry so long. Hansford County has had two large prairie fires within the past 4 weeks.

Spearman's new Mayor, Dr. D. Hackley, and the re-elected Aldermen met for the first time since the election, to hear the departmental reports for March. City Judge T. J. Pittman reported cases heard. Total fines assessed \$1,063.50. To be paid later \$250. \$97.50 paid by students writing safety themes; Jail time \$80.; suspended \$5.00 Total collected \$1,250. Police reported 90 tickets issued, motor vehicle accidents with an estimated property damage of \$35.30, handled 6 drunks, one DWI, one Profane language case and two bicycle thefts. Animal Control: 2 animals held from February. Pick up 32, destroyed 23. Eleven were paid out of the pond and one held over. The Fire Department answered 10 calls in March. Two of these were grass fires. The others including a Beauty shop, Trailer house, and storage building. Aldermen set a date to meet with the Park Board to work out a long range plan for City Parks. This plan will include hiring care takers, ground equipment, drinking fountains, and whatever is necessary to better improve our parks. Councilmen canvassed the election returns and newly elected councilmen and Mayor Hackley took the oath of office. J. K. Hicks was appointed Mayor pro-Tem and Dr. Hackley was appointed City Health Officer for the next year.

Board Votes To Maintain Morse School

The Morse School Board, in a regular monthly meeting Monday night voted to maintain and operate a four-year accredited high school. Supt. John Brumley said "This ends the school board's evaluation and study of the Morse school system." Brumley said the vote of the school board was a majority. The board had considered closing the high school and had opened a study as to this feasibility. Superintendents from four nearby high schools had been contacted about the possibility of transferring Morse High school students and arranging for their fees and transportation. Dissenting voters were worrying about the cost of maintaining the high school. They felt that in the next five to 10 years the expense of maintaining a high school in Morse could completely skyrocket. Some tax payers felt that to transfer the high school students and pay their fees at the receiving school would make the tax burden lighter and give the students greater opportunities for academic and extracurricular activities. Brumley said he was pleased with the outcome of the Monday night meeting when voters elected to keep the high school. He said the school board and residents of Morse were behind him 100 percent.

Educators Report On Spearman Schools

A 12-member team of leading State Educators visited Spearman Schools Monday and Tuesday of this week to complete a 14-month evaluation study of the Spearman Independent School system's program. Supt. Bill Reeves said such a self-study is one requirement for membership in the Southern Association of Secondary Junior High and Elementary Schools. The Southern Association standards are above the minimums required by the State and graduates of member schools are more readily accepted in colleges and universities. Spearman High school is a member, and the Junior High and Elementary schools will make application for membership after the completion of the self-study. The team of educators made a question type depth analysis of every aspect of the school program and facilities, which was reported to the Spearman Board and Faculty in detail at 3 p.m. Tuesday. A more detailed written report will be available in a few weeks to any interested person. The committee was very impressed with the students, staff and program. However, they noted need for improvement in the way of development of curricular guides need of one more Counselor, a program that would better meet needs of the college-bound students. Track Coach Gives Report

The days of Spearman track teams being the doormat of the Panhandle appear to be over. Last Friday the Lynx won the Junior division track and field trophy in the district meet at Panhandle. The JUNIOR DIVISION is the combined teams of the 7th, 8th, and 9th grade teams. The Lynx 7th grade team placed 2nd, the 8th grade placed 1st and the 9th grade team placed 2nd. Officials of the meet awarded the JUNIOR DIVISION TROPHY to the Spearman schools. (The coaches of these teams will send in a detailed report on their boys and the results.) We are very proud of these boys.

The Lynx varsity beat every one of its times and also broke several all-time school records this past Saturday at the Berger Relays. Bobby Smith, only a sophomore placed 2nd in the 220 dash with a 23.2. The old school record was 23.3. Another sophomore, Mike Davis finished 5th with his top time of 23.6. The second record to fall was the 440 dash. Hal Shufeldt ran in 52.9 which beats his brothers old record of 53.0. Hal placed 2nd in this event. Sophomore Joe Hutchison ran top time in the 440 also placing 5th with 54.2.

A third school record fell as discus thrower Steve Holten, another sophomore, hurled the platter 122'4". However, Steve's record was short lived as junior discus thrower Roy Russell hurled it 128' 10" to place 5th for the Lynx.

Wesley Jenkins, also a sophomore, has been shaving away at

the school 100 dash record which still stands at 10.00. Wesley started at 10.5 and went from there to 10.4, 10.3, 10.1, 10.2, and ran his second 10.1 for 3rd place at Berger. In addition, Bobby Smith and Mike Davis are striving for it also. Bobby placed 4th in the 100 dash and ran his best time of 10.3. Mike missed getting to the finals in the 100 as did several others but lost the toss of the coin.

The sprint relay (440 relay) team of Wesley Jenkins, Mike Davis Tom Henderson, and Bobby Smith ran their top time and placed 3rd with a season best of 45.7. This is an all sophomore relay team. The old school record in this event is 44.9 but these young men are whittling away at it. To them it's just a matter of time before they break it.

The mile relay team of Wesley Jenkins, Jim Brown, Joe Hutchison, and Hal Shufeldt ran their season's best and placed 4th with a fine time of 3:38.1. Again, all of these boys return next year. The old school record in the Mile Relay is 3:33.4. Mike Hendrick jumped his best HIGH JUMP and placed 3rd by clearing 5'10". He went out at 6'0. Charles Shieldknight also bested his old jump and cleared 5'6" and went out on 5'8". Charles finished in 7th place.

Spearman's track team improves each week and interest continues to grow in the track program. We took 20 boys on most of our trips. It appears that we will need to purchase about 10 new uniforms for next year because of the number of boys who have voiced interest in coming out. Cong. Bob Price Introduces Bills

Congressman Bob Price introduced two agriculture import restrictive bills in the house Monday.

One, Price said, would roll back quotas on dairy products and close the loop holes in present dairy regulations under which the flow of foreign milk and dairy products into this country last year hit 2.7 billion pounds and is running at an even higher rate this year.

The other bill would amend a section of the Agricultural Adjustment Act under which the U. S. Tariff Commission may impose quotas. "Section 22 of this act has been ineffective," Price said, "because of the time involved in tariff commission hearings and the reluctance of the Secretary of Agriculture to request presidential action in triggering a hearing."

"The bill I and others have introduced would apply to all agricultural imports including beef,"

Price stated "and would give Congress the Authority to initiate the action upon resolution of either the house of senate agricultural committees."

"Both Dairy and meat imports could be brought to reasonable levels under such procedures before reaching the present alarming and damaging levels," Price concluded.

The goal for the 1967 Cancer Crusade in Texas is two million dollars, roughly a dollar for each Texan now living who will have cancer if present trends continue.

The climate is hopeful, however, since one-half of all cancer victims could be cured through early diagnosis and prompt treatment. To emphasize the vital need for regular, complete health examinations, the Hansford County crusade this year will seek to reach every home in the community.

Volunteers wishing to join in the Crusade and Survey are invited to telephone Mrs. Ray Martin at 2776 for more information.


In addition to the urgent goals of getting information about cancer into every household in the county and raising the funds needed to continue cancer control activities throughout the state, volunteers for the ACS will have a new and important assignment.

The Cancer Education Survey will be conducted in Texas for the first time this year; an estimated 600,000 replies will be collected from households in every section of the state.

Here in Hansford County, the Survey will be carried out by Crusaders during the house-to-house drive on April 23. After householders have been given the list of cancer's seven warning signals, they will be asked to fill out a brief, confidential form, asking questions about their own health practices. The completed forms can then be mailed back in the envelope provided and will be counted in the District Cancer society offices. A follow up on this will be conducted in 1968 to compare progress made.

A survey of this size would be impossible by a health organization were it not for the tremendous cooperation of volunteers.
