With the hostile fire thus effectively suppressed, Sergeant Richards joined the 4th Battalion in an assault which werwhelmed the Viet Cong posiions and defeated a determined enemy force. Master Sergeant Richards' heroic actions were in ceeping with the highest tradi-tions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon nimself and the military service.' Carroll J., a well known Spearman man, is a career soldier. The 34-year old Master Sgt. has erved 16 years, and has been in Gruver. Vietnam since last September. His wife, Patsy, with their four children, reside in Dallas.
