A popular young house-wife & mother from Spearman has been selected to appear in the 1963 edition of OUTSTANDING YOUNG WOMEN OF AMERICA.

She is Mrs. Betty Taylor Sheppard, who with her husband Bert and four children, lives at 1030 S. Dressen St.

Women appearing in this book are awarded this honor because of their outstanding contributions and accomplishments in civic endeavors, religious, professional and political activities. The editors choose those women they think most exemplify the term "Outstanding."

Mrs. Sheppard, outside of being a busy wife and mother, is General Chairman of the Women's Society of Christian Service and a member of the official Board, "A Girl Scout troop leader, member of the Happy Homes Home Demonstration Club, member of the Junior Flower Club, Treasurer of the Spearman Study Club, a member of the Junior Board for the Top of Texas District TFWC. Teaches the 4th grade Sunday School class at the Methodist Church and is a leader of the Junior Methodist Youth Fellowship. She has been an officer in the Spearman P.T.A. and is active in various other organizations.

OUTSTANDING YOUNG WOMEN OF AMERICA is an annual biographical compilation of 6,000 outstanding young women between the ages of 21 and 35. These young women have distinguished themselves in civic and professional activities.

Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson, who serves as honorary chairman of the Board of Advisory Editors for the publication, has said the book is especially meaningful to her because the achievements and abilities of women is a subject close to her heart.

Selections for OUTSTANDING YOUNG WOMEN OF AMERICA are made by the Board of Advisory Editors. Mrs. Dexter Otis Arnold, honorary president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, is chairman.

United States Senator Margaret Chase Smith, in her introductory message for the 1963 edition of OUTSTANDING YOUNG WOMEN OF AMERICA, said, "This book calls attention to the great capabilities of our young women and their ability to get things done."

Miss Eva Adams, Director of the United States Mint, says the women included in the 1966 edition "are marked for recognition because they shunned mediocrity."

The publication was conceived by the leaders of the nation's women's clubs. They felt that young women who give their time for community projects should be recognized. The recognition of these outstanding women is included each year.

Guidelines for selection include: unselfish service to others, charitable activities, community service, professional, excellence, business advancement, and civic and professional recognition.

The book is 7" x 10" in size and contains 800 pages. The binding is blue with gold embossing.

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New Traffic Safety Program To Be Presented In January

There is a needed job to be done! And we do not have very long to do it! This job needs YOUR help! The 60th Texas Legislature will convene in Austin in January. YOU and I need to make our voices heard, loud and clear, to our Legislators, about the program on Traffic Legislation. So read on, and then call, write, wire or go to see your Legislators.

The business of saving lives goes on each day--holidays and all. And we all need to work at the business more diligently. Why? In Texas last year, we killed 3,623 in nearly a million wrecks, and it cost \$498,007,000 to do it!

These Texas traffic statistics are APPALLING! We must have certain legislation enacted by our Texas Legislature if we are ever to make a significant reduction in these heartbreaking facts.

At the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Board meeting in Austin October 5, 1966, Governor Connally listed a 7 point program of traffic safety legislation which he will present to the Legislature in January as follows:

1. Drive Education for all young drivers.
2. A revision of the Texas Driver License Law. To be included are a minimum driving age of 18, with a Driver Education license offered at 16, provisional licenses for all drivers under age 21; periodic reexamination of all drivers.
3. Severe penalties for driving while license is suspended or revoked.
4. Automatic suspension of license for serious traffic offenses, including driving while intoxicated.
5. Traffic Courts of Record.
6. Stricter motor vehicle inspection.
7. Additional men and higher salaries for the Department of Public Safety.

The Governor promised that he will do all that he possible can to get this program enacted. But a responsibility rests upon all Texans to make our voices heard. The time for your voice and your influence to be heard is now--between now and the convening of the Legislature in January.

Did you know that an increase in automobile insurance rates was announced shortly after the close of the last session of our Legislature? The only way to bring automobile insurance rates down is to reduce the number of wrecks--and many of the remedies for the problem lie in legislation.

So, please, won't you stop just long enough to write a card or make a phone call to your State Legislator and let him know that you are vitally interested in supporting the proposed program on Traffic Legislation?

Lutheran Churches Cooperate In 450th Reformation Year

For the first time in many years,
Lutheran churches in the United
States will combine efforts in joint
programs that will mark the 450th
anniversary of the Reformation in
1517.

While the entire year is being
noted as the 450th anniversary year,
initial events will take place in
January.

The Rev. William G. Hill, pastor
of Faith Lutheran Church in Spe-
arman, is one of the more than
17,000 Lutheran Ministers engaged
in carrying out the observance be-
ing conducted by four major Lutheran
bodies which represent nearly
nine million individuals.

Cooperating in coordinating the
program are the Lutheran Church
in America, Synod of Evangelical
Lutheran Churches, The American
Lutheran Church, and The Lutheran
Church-Missouri Synod.

As of Jan. 1, 1967, these four
churches will be cooperating in the
Lutheran Council in the USA, which
comes into official being that day.

Citing the 450th Reformation ob-
servance's objectives, Pastor Hill
said: "The Slogan for the anniversary
is 'Life... New Life.' The
objectives of the observance are to
proclaim Jesus Christ, the Lord
of the Church and the Savior of
men, and to stir Christian people
to greater faithfulness and devotion."

He added that it is hoped the vari-
ous events scheduled from Janu-
ary through October will help
Christians "realize anew the rich-
ness of their heritage and the gre-

atness of the tasks to which God
calls them in this day."

He also explained that the slogan
is based on "the references in St.
John to Jesus Christ as the Life of
men and the New Life (resurrection
and renewal) which the Spirit of
God would bestow on men today."

A daily Bible reading plan was
introduced January 1 for Lutherans
who seek to make the observance
more personal. On January 22 and
on March 12, the congregations of
the four Lutheran churches will be
invited to celebrate a Lutheran Evi-
ngelists Festival.

Materials for the festival will
emphasize the "new life that comes
through prayer and new life for

the family of God--fresh aware-
ness of the harvest fields of God,
more witnesses sent with the life-
impacting Gospel."

Although the observance has been
planned by the Lutheran church
many other denominations have
expressed an eagerness to partici-
pate.

Must Register For 1967 Vote

The poll tax requirement for voting was held invalid in February of this year by a three judge federal court. It based its ruling on the due process clause of the Federal Constitution. The court said this requirement was equivalent to a charge or penalty imposed on the exercise of a fundamental right, & it indicated that any charge for registration would be illegal. The United States Supreme Court affirmed the decision.

Immediately following the three judge decision the State Legislature was called into special session and it adopted a new registration act. The major change in the law was that registration with the County Tax Collector should be without charge.

Under the law passed in February voters will register annually, as they have previously done, during the period of October 1 through January 31. A temporary registration was allowed in March 1966, but this was a one-time provision only.

You do not have to pay a poll tax now, but you must register. The time to do this is now. To be eligible to vote in 1967 elections, you must go by the County Tax Office and register. Deadline date is January 31.

Everyone from the age of 21 years through 60 must register in order to vote. If you are over 60, you are exempt.

Although no State or National elections of importance are on the agenda now, there will be constitutional amendments, local bond elections school board city aldermen etc. coming up in 1967, so it is of utmost importance that you register before January 31.

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HOMEMAKING NOTES

The textile term spandex is one which is becoming part of the vocabulary of the American consumer. Spandex is a 100 percent man-made elastomer and does not contain any natural rubber.

Basically it is stronger than natural elastic thread yet it is lighter in weight and more durable. It stretches like rubber and snaps back into place.

Spandex is a relatively new fiber. Previous to 1960 it had not been named. Textile chemists were searching for a fiber which would have the elastic qualities of rubber but still be a textile fiber.

It is used in three forms; bare or uncovered, covered or core spun. The use of bare spandex will produce a very lightweight garment because the weight of the covering yarn is eliminated. The amount of stretch in a fabric can be regulated if covered spandex is used. Bare and covered spandex is used mostly in fabrics for foundation garments and other types of support garments. The third use of spandex as a core-spun yarn is in garments which are not formfitting but which have the correct amount of stretch for a comfortable fit.

Garments containing spandex should be washed according to the fiber content other than spandex yarns. If the garment is wool, for example, or contains wool it must be treated as wool. Washing in general does not affect the spandex yarns with the exception of white fabrics which discolor when washed with a chlorine bleach. Oxygen type bleaches such as sodium perborate may be used safely and are recommended even though they are not as active as the chlorine type.

Because some brands of spandex are not as resistant to heat as others it would be advisable to reduce tumbler temperatures to 140 to 160 degrees F., if tumbler drying areas should be taken during pressing finishing not to distort the shape of garments containing spandex.

All synthetic fibers, regardless of the fiber type, name or family, have some characteristics or properties in common.

You'll find it helpful to remember these properties as you shop. They give you a clue to the way the fabrics made from the fibers will perform and the care you should give them for the greatest satisfaction.

Synthetics have low moisture absorbency. They are thermoplastic, meaning the fibers are softened by heat.

These fibers are insect, mildew and bacteria resistant. They are sensitive to staining from oil and grease, some fibers more than others. If a grease stain stands for a time it may form a permanent gray stain.

The synthetic fibers are somewhat slippery. They will not shrink. Quick drying is one of their assets. If dried in clothes dryer, dry in small loads to avoid heat set wrinkles. When the dryer stops, remove the garments immediately & place them on hangers.

Another advantage of the garments made from synthetic fibers is the minimum ironing they require.

To help you better understand the names and characteristics of certain fabrics, may I suggest a copy of our Extension bulletin L-652, "Clothing — Action-Fabrics" it is small, handy to carry in your purse, ladies when you are shopping to be used as a guide to the fabrics you really want.

Sewing on crepe, anyone? Because it drapes so beautifully, crepe has been featured in many holiday, winter and spring fashions. The same quality which allows it to drape also makes it difficult to handle, stretching and shifting when sewn and pressed.

Pin the crepe to paper when you cut out the garment to prevent the fabric from shifting. Machine stitch with a fine needle, motorized cotton thread, 12-15 stitches per inch.

Stitch with tissue paper between the fabric and throat plate to prevent marring the fabric surface. Use pre-churn, woven binding to stay waistline and shoulder seams.

Test your pressing on a scrap of fabric. Too much moisture will cause a puckered effect on the fabric. Press on the wrong side of the fabric with a light luting and lowering.

Use a dry press cloth next to the material, with a slightly dampened one over it. Press seams over a seam roll so imprints don't appear on the right side.

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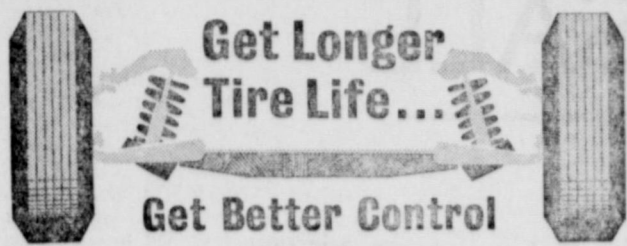

WARNING FROM POSTMASTER

Mailboxes are protected by Federal law, and pranks or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes or their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment. Postmaster Jacobs warned today.

The Postmaster noted that some 25,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30 for damaging or destroying mail receptacles.

Postmaster Jacobs quoted from the law: "Whoever wilfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or break open the same or wilfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

This applies to all mail receptacles and the mail in them, even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their personal property, Postmaster Jacobs emphasized.

"Pranksters" and especially children who do not know any better - should be made to realize the seriousness of their actions," the Postmaster said. "A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the humor out of any prank."

Often the mailbox damage is the work of youths, who do it for "kicks" and the courts have shown little sympathy for this

youthful means of expression. In Michigan, a justice sentenced 2 18 year olds to 10 days in jail, including two on a diet of baby food. The diet specification, explained the judge was because the youths "acted like babies." They were also fined \$25 each plus \$15 costs.

In New York State, five youth were fined \$25 each plus restitution or restoration, plus no driving for an indefinite period, plus an 8 p. m. curfew, plus a written analysis by each of a magazine article entitled "A Judge Gets Tough on Hoodlums."

Two Iowa youths who damaged 39 mailboxes were required to personally apologize to each boxholder in addition to making repairs or providing a new box.

In Missouri, three 17-year olds lost their driving privileges were given a 9 p. m. curfew & had to report twice weekly to juvenile authorities. They had damaged 63 mailboxes.

And in Arkansas, four juveniles faced the following: (1) no driving until further notice, (2) a 10 p. m. curfew, (3) return to court in a month with letters from their school principals reporting on grades and attitudes, (4) full restitution of all damages, and (5) wear a sign for 30 days stating "I have not learned to respect the property of others."

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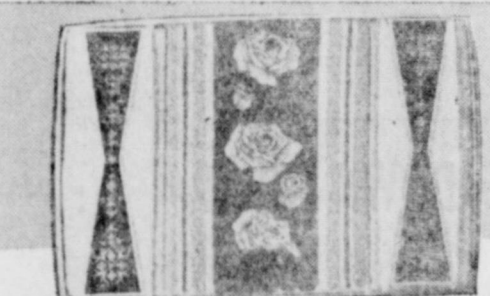

In spite of the ready availability of a safe, effective, inexpensive oral vaccine, the increase amount of polio in the state is alarming!

The State Health department is asking that each county conduct a Polio immunization drive.

Hansford County has planned a Polio drive for January 18, 19 & 20. This county is the first one in the Panhandle to do this, and the third in the State, but according to one local physician, "we do not want to wait until someone in our county is crippled for life before we have an immunization drive."

The Home Demonstration clubs are sponsoring this drive in Spearman and Morse, and the American Legion ladies in Gruver. The drive is ENCOURAGED and will be supervised by the entire Hansford county Medical Profession. They recommend that everybody, young and old, even if you have had all three types-----have this booster if you have not had one the past year.

The trivalent polio virus vaccine will be given on a sugar cube, & will cost fifty cents. This is the safe effective 3-in-one vaccine.

The vaccine will be distributed to Spearman school students on the mornings of January 18 and 19. Spearman adults may receive their sugar cube at the HD building all day long on January 19.

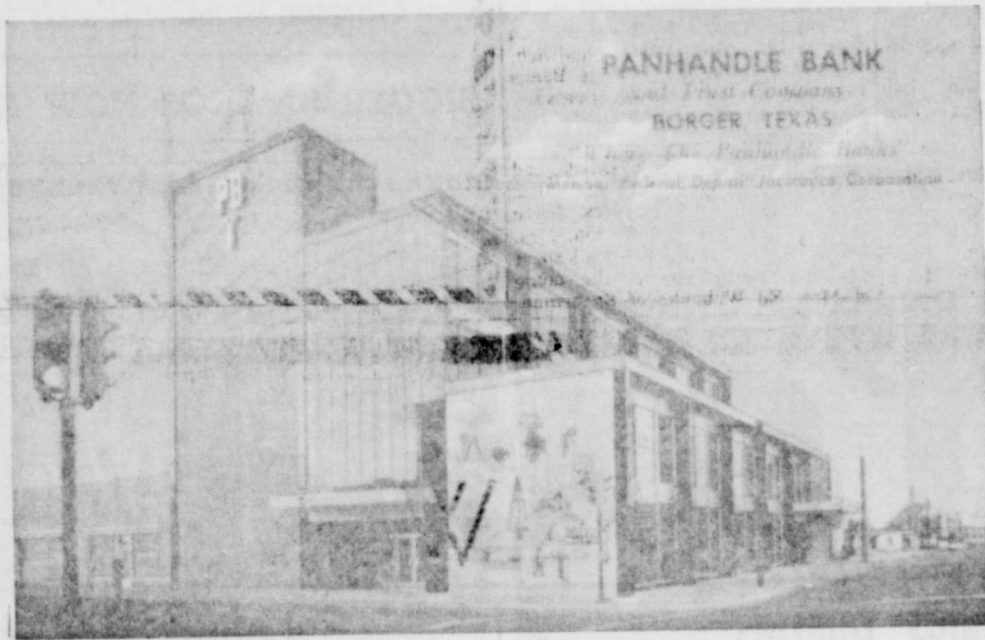

Mr. and Mrs. Galye I. Brown were honored Sunday, Jan. 1st in their home for their 25th wedding anniversary.

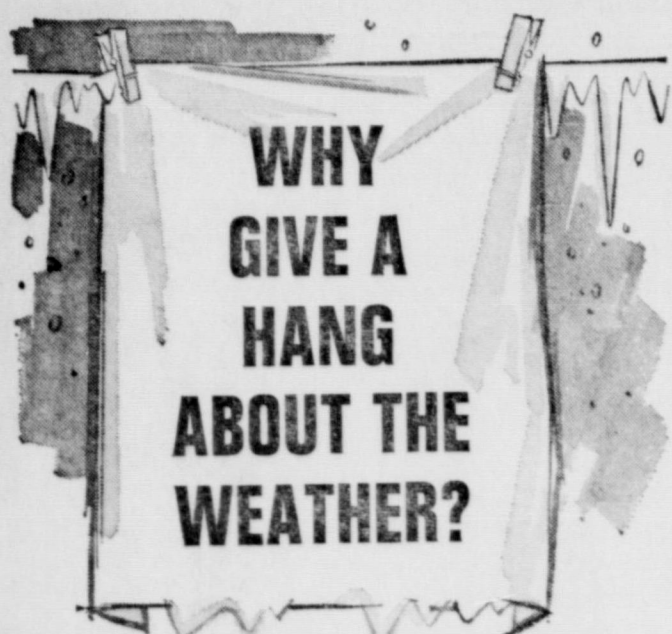
The occasion was a surprise given by Mrs. Jerry Taylor, Jim, Bette, Bruce, and Kathy Brown, children of the couple.

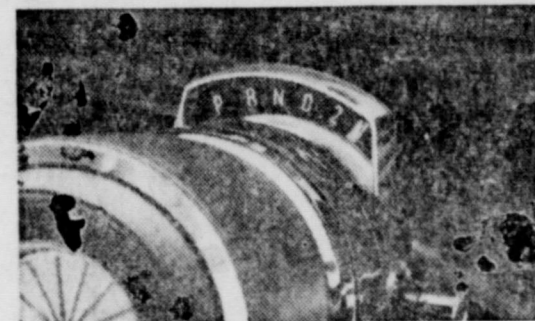
