The poll tax requirement for oting was held invalid in Feblary of this year by a three idge federal court. It based its uling on the due process clause the Federal Constitution. The ourt said this requirement was quivalent to a charge or penalty mposed on the exercise of a fun amental right, & it indicated nat any charge for registration ould be illegal. The United tates Supreme Court affirmed he decision.

Immediately following the three udge decision the State Legisature was called into special sesion and it adopted a new regisration act. The major change in he law was that registration with he County Tax Collector should e without charge.

Under the law passed in Febuary voters will register an. nually, as they have previously done, during the period of Octoper 1 through January 31. A was a one-time provision only.

You do not have to pay a poll ax now, but you must register. The time to do this is now. To be eligible to vote in 1967 elections, you must go by the County Tax Office and register. Dead-

Everyone from the age of 21 in order to vote. If you are over 60, you are exempt.

Spandex is a relatively new fiber. Previous to 1960 it had not been frontiersman ever had to shovel his named. Textile chemists were seaching for a fiber which would have he elastic qualities of rubber but still be a textile fiber.

It is used in three forms; bare or uncovered, covered or core spun, The use of bare spandex will produce a very lightweight garment because the weight of the covering varns is eliminated. The amount of stretch in a fabric can be regulated if covered spandex is used. Bare and covered spandex is used mostly in fabrics for foundation garments and other types of support garments. The third use of spandex as a core-spun yarn is in garments which are not formfitting but which have the correct amount of stretch for a comfortable fit.

Garments containing spandex should be washed according to the fiber content other than spandex varns. If the garment is wool, for example, or contains wool it must be treated as wool. Washing in general does not affect the spandex Boxwell Brothers varns with the exception of white fabrics which discolor when washed with a chlorine bleach. Oxygen type bleaches such as sodium perborate may be used safely and are recommended even though they are
