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HOMEMAKING NOTES

This year the typical "bride" will spend more than \$3,000 to launch her first home, according to recent survey. One of the most important purchases in the single product category is kitchenware. Why is it those are the things a bride never gets at showers?

Everyday things a bride needs are good knives, basic cookbooks, baking pans, broom, spatulas, strainer and measuring cups and spoons. Comments one homemaker "Our first trip to the dime store for wastebaskets and muffin and pie pans nearly broke us."

Besides these things that any bride can use, here is a partial list of other ideas for selecting shower and wedding gifts (and for those people like me who are thrown into a quandry about what to give each time a gift is called for, this should help tremendously):

1. Buy what the bride likes. Add to her china or crystal, or silver, or stainless steel or pots and pans. She's selected the designs and many of these are luxuries she might not buy for herself.
2. Ask the bride's mother for help and information on style of furnishings; or colors for bath-towels, blankets and sheets.
3. If checking isn't possible, play it safe in the houseware or linen department. Put quality ahead of quantity.
4. Appliances are usually welcome - share the cost with one or more friends of the couple. Consider an electric fry pan, griddle, blender, toaster, large coffee maker, pressure sautepan or can opener. Any bride can use good casserole dishes, a cake carrier and some large utensils that hold 5 or 6 quarts. (DON'T get teeny-weeny pans because they're cute for two people. Give pans big enough to include the hired hand, parents, other company, or next year's family addition.)
5. Gifts for outdoors might be a picnic table, outdoor light, lawn furniture, picnic basket, thermos jug or a large mailbox with the couple's name on it. Also appreciated would be a set of "her" tools (hammer, pliers, screwdriver) or

"I thought that you would be interested in the activities and performance of David Arthur McClellan in our Biology Summer Science Training Program for High-Ability Secondary School students held this past summer. I am sure that you will be very pleased to hear that David was an outstanding participant even in a group of carefully selected students chosen from all over the country. David performed admirably well in both the classroom and in his research partici-

ipation. His research was on "Induced Pigment Shifts in *Phaeodactylum tricornutum*", under the direction of Dr. Jack Myers and Mr. Jim Mann. I believe that David learned a great deal from his research and became quite adept at the various techniques involved. Because of the fine job that David did on his research, he was selected to continue for the additional three week period of full time research. I hope that David has had an opportunity to talk with you and with the students about his summer's work because I am sure that you and they would find it most interesting.

In our opinion, David has a great deal of native ability coupled with very high performance and we feel that he holds excellent promise for the future. His high performance in this program, in all the more noteworthy because of the limitations imposed by his small town background. However, as I have indicated, David was an outstanding member of this group. We hope that you will encourage David to attend a major university rather than a small college, because in our opinion, he can succeed anywhere. I would be pleased to write letters of recom-

mendation in his behalf when and if they are needed.

We certainly appreciated having David Arthur McClellan as a participant in our summer program and I look forward to having similar nominees from you in the future. Thank you for your cooperation in nominating him.

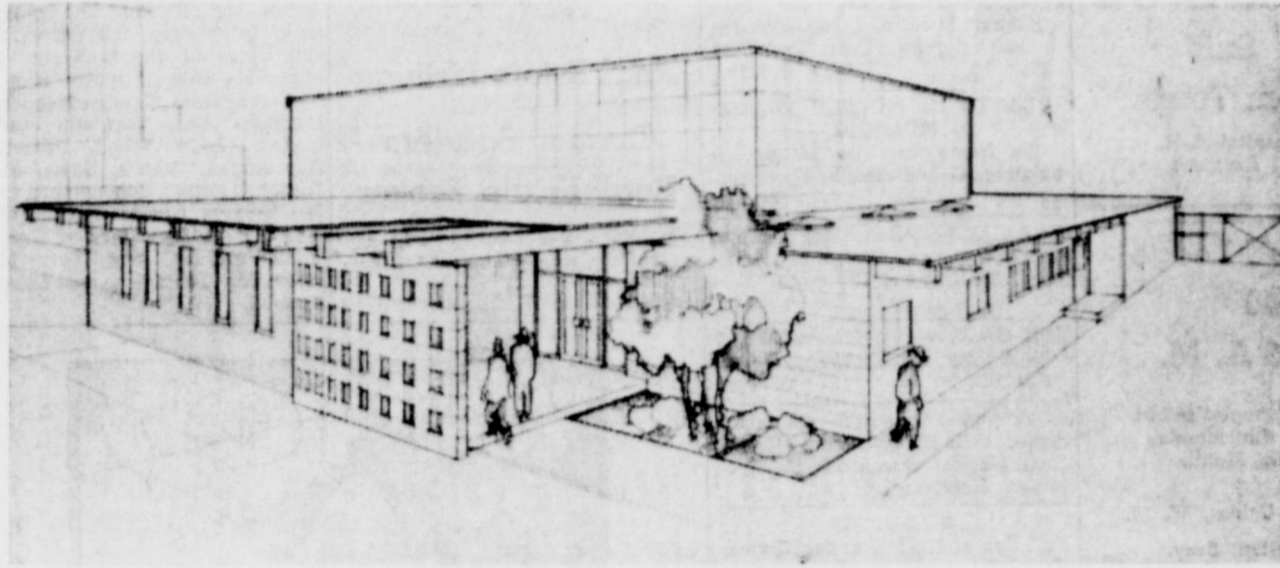

SCIENCE TEACHERS ATTEND CONFERENCE

Eugene Barkowsky and Frank Butcher, science teachers of Spearman High School, attended the thirteenth annual conference for the advancement of science and mathematics teaching, in Austin, October 6th, 7th, and 8th.

The purpose of the conference was to try to give the teachers something which is readily useful for classroom instruction and to compare our methods of science teaching with other schools. During the conference, various demonstrations of lab technique & methods of preparing materials for class work were given. The reason for this was so that students could gain a better understanding of the course. Sessions were given on films of different concepts of science that could be used in a classroom to strengthen discussion and stimulate interest.

Barkowsky and Butcher saw the latest text books on science and witnessed many new teaching devices such as a television attached to a microscope. Many such devices stimulate interest in the science classroom by permitting the student to observe materials which normally may only be discussed or mentioned.

The importance of science and education as a whole cannot be stressed too much; but as one speaker said, "During the first

third of the century, it was the railroad. The second third, the automobile was dominant. But the last third education, of which science is a very important part, will rule.

Both teachers agree that this trip was enjoyable, but certainly a rewarding and stimulating experience which should challenge a teacher to improve and consequently, the conference may become an annual event for teachers of SHS.

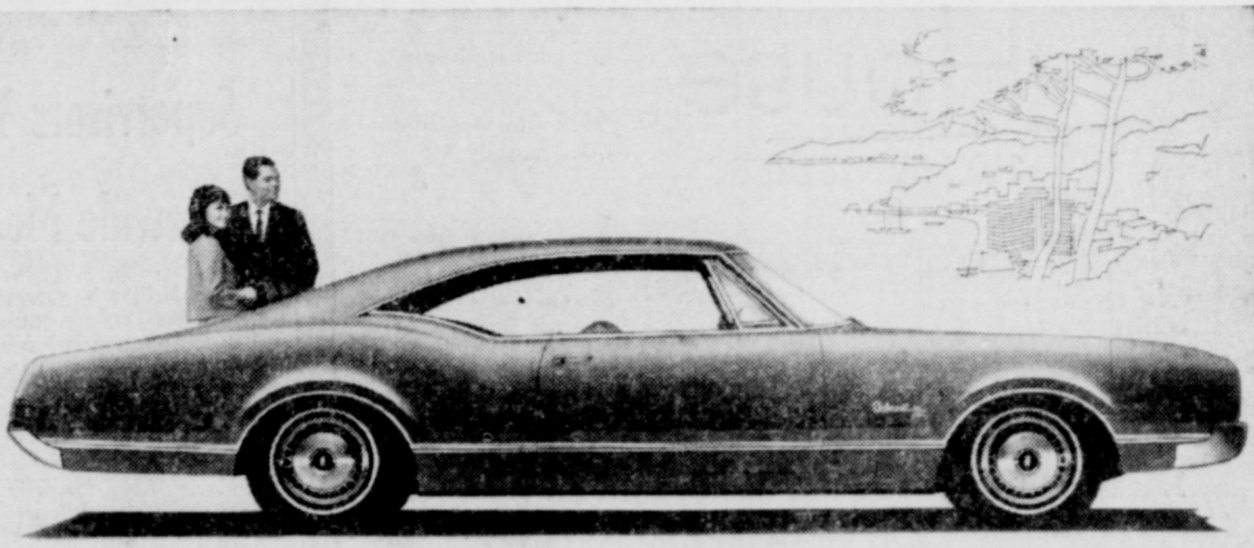

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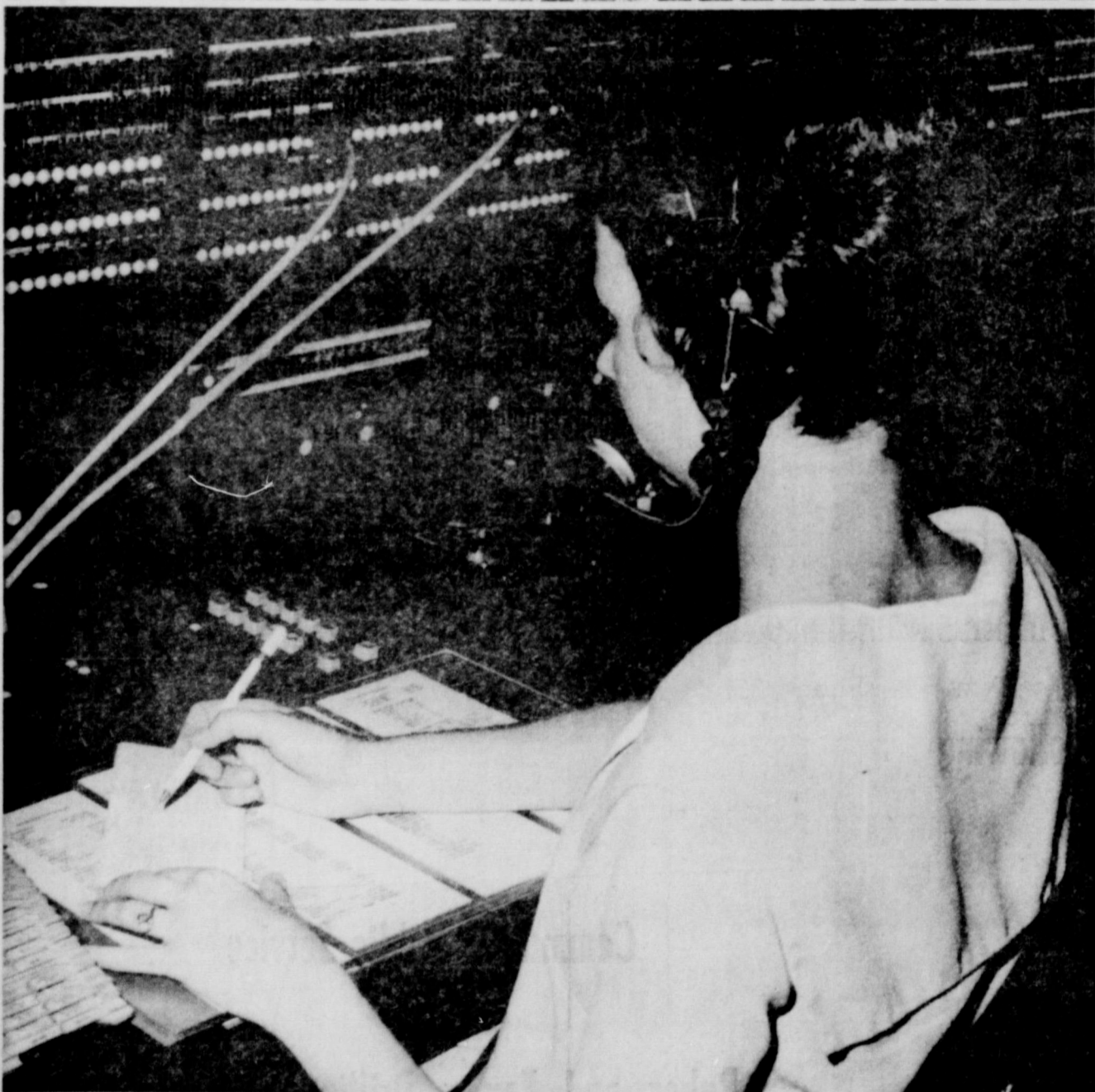
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"Mark Sense" Ticketing

A faster, more efficient method of recording information on long distance telephone calls will be placed in effect this month in General Telephone Company of the Southwest's Perryton long distance center.

Called "mark sense" ticketing, the new procedure is described by General's district manager Milton Caldwell as "a purely automatic operation once it has

passed from the operator's hands". "Although the improvements realized through the new methods are not visibly apparent to the customer, this change represents a much faster, more reliable and efficient means of recording information on long distance calls," Milton Caldwell said.

Using specially treated graphite lead pencils, operators record information such as the area code, the

called number and the calling number, whether the call is station to station, person to person, collect, etc., on elaborately designed tickets which include scores of boxes or "bubbles." "This new method requires use of the area code," Caldwell explained, "and it eliminates the need for giving the name of the town called."

The tickets are shipped daily to General's revenue accounting

center in San Angelo where they are fed into IBM machinery which converts the data into punched cards, then tapes, and finally into printed information to be included in the customer's monthly bill. The function of rating calls is also performed automatically, eliminating the possibility of human error, Caldwell added.

The billing equipment includes an "editing unit" which automatically sorts out tickets which contain erroneous or inadequate information. Rejected tickets are then carefully checked and rechecked to insure that they reflect the correct information.

General Telephone Perryton toll center serves as the "master" long distance office for 11 area communities. The exchanges are: Perryton, Balco, Beaver, Booker, Bryan's Corner, Darrouzett, Follett, Higgins, Lipscomb, Logan & Spearman. A total of 48 traffic people are employed in General's Perryton toll center, including the company's traffic supervisor, Mrs. O'Neal Phillely.

"The average number of long distance calls handled in our Perryton traffic center has increased considerably during the past

few years," Mrs. Phillely stated. "Five years ago we were handling around 2700 long distance calls per average business day, whereas today the average is running close to 4000."

Caldwell pointed out that the influx of calls requires constant study to determine faster, more workable means of handling long distance messages. Operating improvements such as mark sense ticketing also necessitates additional training for supervisors and operators.

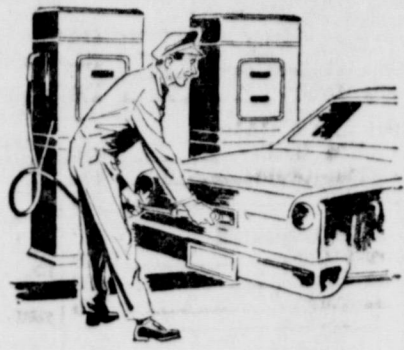
"Our operator force has been preparing for conversion to the mark sense method for several months," Caldwell explained.

Caldwell also explained that using this new method the most efficient way to place a long distance call is to give the operator this information and in this order: Area Code, Called Number, Called Party (if person to person), Wait Till The Operator Asks for Your Number, Give Your Name Only if the Operator Asks For It.

It will no longer be necessary to give the operator the name of the town you are calling if you can furnish the area code.

Must Register For 1967 Vote

The poll tax requirement for voting was held invalid in February of this year by a three judge federal court. It based its ruling on the due process clause of the Federal Constitution. The court said this requirement was equivalent to a charge or penalty imposed on the exercise of a fundamental right, & it indicated that any charge for registration would be illegal. The United States Supreme Court affirmed the decision.

Immediately following the three judge decision the State Legislature was called into special session and it adopted a new registration act. The major change in the law was that registration with the County Tax Collector should be without charge.

Under the law passed in February voters will register annually, as they have previously done, during the period of October 1 through January 31. A temporary registration was allowed in March 1966, but this was a one-time provision only.

You do not have to pay a poll tax now, but you must register. The time to do this is now. To be eligible to vote in 1967 elections, you must go by the County Tax Office and register. Deadline date is January 31.

Everyone from the age of 21 years through 60 must register in order to vote. If you are over 60, you are exempt.

Although no State or National elections of importance are on the agenda now, there will be constitutional amendments, local bond elections school board, city aldermen etc. coming up in 1967, so it is of utmost importance that you register before January 31.

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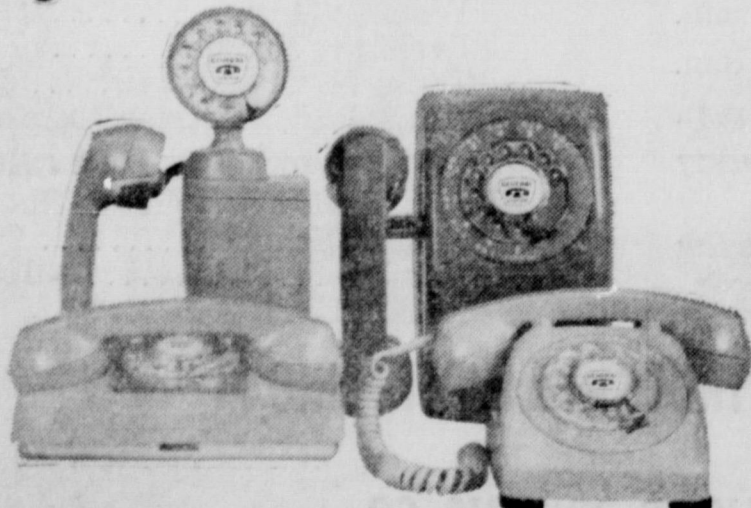
