a post-Three Mile Island emphasis on evaluating systems that are employed when small ruptures causing loss of core fluids occur-as compared to those used when large breaks occur.

The data being collected will be used to study nuclear power plant accidents in standard, pressurized water (light-water) reactors and to evaluate backup emergency core-cooling systems.

The 1980 ZIP Code and Post Office Directory not only contains ZIP Codes for the United States and territories, but also gives information on various classes of mail, service im-

provement programs, new letter size standards, 3-digit ZIP Code maps and delivery statistics. The new directory also lists new streets, apartment complexes and new and discontinued post offices.

By "trading in" the front cover of any previous year's ZIP Code Directory (USPS Publicaition 65) or Directory of Post Offices (USPS Publication 26), mailers will receive \$1.50 off the single copy price of \$7.50. There is a limit of one front cover per single copy purchas-

The Postmaster said mailers who buy at a special case price of \$52.50 receive eight director-

ies for the price of seven-a saving of \$7.50.

"By taking advantage of both the trade in discount and the case price, customers can trade in up to seven directory covers for each case purchased, save an additional \$10.50 and pay as low as \$42.00 for a case of eight," the postmaster explain-

Purchase at your post office,

or to order the 1980 ZIP Code and Post Office Directory by mail, customers simply send a check or money order plus any trade in covers to St. Louis Postal Data Center, P.O. Box 14872, St. Louis, MO 63138. Checks should be made payable to U.S. Postal Service. Mailers should specify the number of copies (at \$7.50) or cases of eight (at \$52.50) desired and to deduct \$1.50 per copy for each trade in cover. No handling or service charge will be added to orders placed by mail.



Family savings pose a chall-enge, but it can be done. During the last decade the

average household managed to save about six percent of their disposable income, but during 1979, the level dropped.

Many families are not saving There are tactics that lead to

savings success, however, for families who want to save in safe, liquid, regulated ways. Some families have made saving a habit.

They pay themselves first -- a portion of every paycheck goes into savings regardless of other

Other families need different tactis to force themselves to

"Coin Play" is one. Coin savers set aside a jar or piggy bank or special drawer. Selected coins -- quarters, dimes -- are diverted into the jars.

Some people empty their pockets at the end of every day and put all change into a jar. Family members may race to

see who can fill a jar the fastest. Sometimes labeling a jar, such as "Summer Vacation Money" or "Colored TV Fund" helps the whole family join in

Here's another idea: change a debit to a credit -- or a debt to

a savings. With this method, when a debt is finished, use the nowfreed money for saving instead of spending. For example, when the refrigerator is paid off, save the amount that had gone for its

monthly payment. "Crash Saving" is another

Pick a time period during which another is spent that isn't absolutely necessary.

Be sure to set limits to the time -- say two months -- an mark it off on a calendar.

During this time, cut out movies, "eating out," babysitters, sales, beer, cigarettes -and feel like a hero for the time involved.

You can learn about yourself during this time, and probably you'll save a great deal.

One advantage to this plan is that you may like the new lifestyle and make savings a permanent habit. Finally, there's the kick-a-

habit savings idea. Save all the money you spend for coffee breaks or cigarettes or desserts or telephone calls, for

In general, remember, it is possible to save -- even in infalationary times -- if saving is your goal.

#### **Crimes increasing** at parks, camp sites

COLLEGE STATION -The ballooning crime rate among campers is so striking that a Texas A&M University park expert warns campers from the city not to leave their street sense at home when venturing into the wilds.

"For some reason, people in a big park seem to think they are completely safe and secure, said Dr. Jim Fletcher, a professor in Texas A&M's Department of Recreation and Parks. They don't put gear away. They don't lock their cars. It's just as essential to take the same precautions in the woods as they would when they're home in the city," he warned.

Thefts in the state and national park systems have ranged from expensive down sleeping bags to four-wheel drive pickup

Fletcher suggests campers always lock their cars and secure personal possessions like stoves, clothing and sleeping bags when away from the camping site.

"American Enterprise", by William Shatner, was the fourth in a series of films on the American Free Enterprise System, produced by Frank Phillips Petroleum Company, that was shown to the Spearman Rotary Club Monday noon, March 3, in the garden room of the Cattleman's Restaurant.

Organization is what makes the American Free Enterprise System work, organization, efficiency, mass production. The beef industry was the first to organize assembly lines. Detroit got its ideas of assembly lines from the beef industry.

The early settlers organized for survival. Shipping meant cooperation leading to corporations, which encouraged invest-

In the cotton industry, it was organized under one roof from raw cotton to cotton cloth and could be shipped to England and sold for less than it could be produced in England.

Markets needed middlemen to bring buyers and sellers together. Capital market brings savings into markets. Railroads made capital markets and escalated the whole economy. They brought about dispersal on a colossal scale. The railroads were schools of organization. The telegraph was the answer. The railroads brought the whole country together for the first time and took the brakes off the economy. Bridges, engine, and industry. Carnegie organization reduced prices, and increased the nail industry and got it systematized and more produc-

Organizers went to work on management also. J.P. Morgan began to organize industry. Merger and expansion led to interlocking, diversified, multiservices corporations.

As organizations get huge they tend to get impersonal and lead to denumanization. An individual can't fight organization. It took organized labor to fight organization. Only in the depression did organized labor become a full partner with government and industry.

The computer is the ultimate weapon of organization.

## Allsup's-A Couple's Success Story

When you stop at Allsup's Convenience Stores in Spearman or Gruver or in many other towns in the Panhandle for a hot link or burrito to tide you over Baker, Jim Benson, Eschol for awhile or to fill up your gas Blankenship, J.L. Brock, Archie tank, or to buy any of the other items they have for sale, did you ever wonder how these busy


stores came into being? The concept for the stores began with Lonnie and Barbara Allsup in Roswell, N.M. Lonnie had been discharged from the Air Force in 1956 after serving in the Korean War and the young couple and their son, Mark, were en route to their hometown of Morton, Texas when a small corner grocery in Roswell attracted their attention. With a \$6,500 bank loan, co-signed by his father, they bought their first store and Lonnie, 23 years old, set about putting into practice some personal business concepts.

First on his list of ideas was offering 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. service, seven days a week. Another idea, opening the front of the store to the customer, was introduced. Working after 11 one night, he and a friend sledge hammered out the front of the building. Barbara recalls "The people in Roswell truly thought Lonnie was nuts back

Lonnie began studying the customer traffic flow through that first store. He moved stock around almost every week, learning that the location of the six high traffic items-cigarettes, candy, soda pop, bread, milk and beer, determined the volume of sales on other items. The \$3,000 a month sales volume grew to \$15,000 during the same period. His early studies of traffic flow resulted in the standardized floor plan that is now used in all Allsup's

By 1960, the Allsups owned and operated 12 stores, the last one opened in Ruidoso, N.M. There were eight in Roswell, 2 in Alamogordo, N.M. and 2 in Ruidoso.

Barbara became involved in the business full-time in 1958, after the birth of the second Allsup child, Todd, now 18,

forced Lonnie to contract ou some of the bookkeeping. He soon found out the value of Barbara's talents.

In 1963, Southland Corp. of Dallas, a major national competitor in the convenience store business made the Allsups an offer they couldn't refuse. They sold their stores, the original name, and signed a five-year area noncompetitive agreement. At 30 years of age they found themselves with \$250,000.

## Changes Since 1976; New Rates Should Be More Equitable

For the first time since the Public Utility Commission of Texas began regulation of Texas telephone com panies. General Telephone Company of the Southwest is asking for rate changes designed to produce about \$58 million in additional annual local revenues. Because this case is being filed on a statewide basis, adhering to statewide rate making principles can quote for an "average" customer. Increases will vary from community to community. Rates for all Genera Telephone customers in Texas will be affected, but there will be no changes in long distance rates. Here is our case:

Phone service is a good buy

You don't need us to tell you prices have gone up. But the price for phone service hasn't gone up as much as you may think. In fact, you may easily spend more on coffee for coffe breaks than you do for a month of basic local service. Contrast that with the prices you pay for shoes and sugar or gasoline and hamburger. Or contrast it with what we pay for poles, wires, cables, etc. We can't sell 1980 service at 1976 prices...and stay in business.

We're facing facts

merica's investor-owned utilities are fighting to stay financially sound and we're in the middle of that fight As part of on-going good manage ment, we constantly work to improve the efficiency of our operations. We've even gone to the length of redesigning truck bodies ourselves because we needed a less expensive. lighter weight, more fuel efficient model and automotive engineers weren't interested in the small (to them) number we'd purchase. We've managed to avoid the rate increase arena for nearly four years through ef forts like these but they aren enough any more. We don't intend to become a financial burden to anyone...and we can face facts. So, let's face this one: it's either a rate increase or some other alternative.

What alternatives?

Downgrade customer service.
 Defer plant and equipment

3. Let our shareowners' investment deteriorate.
4. Ask our employees to give up justified wage increases.

Alternative 1: Downgrade customer

service
You expect phones to work as close to 100 percent of the time as is possible and when phone service is out, you want it fixed. Fast. We agree. And you don't want to wait to get service to begin with, no matter how fast Texas grows. We also agree. deteriorate simply because costs of providing it increase. In fact, from our point of view, service in some spots could stand improving...and we ought to know: we've been in this business

Alternative 2: Defer plant and equipment additions

General Telephone Files For First Statewide Rate

We've already done that ... or as much as we possibly could. Texas has been experiencing unprecedented growth and that's nice. because growth is healthy. The trouble is we have had to spend (and borrow) unprecedented amounts of money (at unprecedented interest e facilities to meet that growth. And the dollars we spent in 1979 and will spend in 1980 don't buy as much as they used to. They don't even buy as much as they did the last time we had increases in 1976. We've had customers tell us, "Look, my service is fine. Let it stay the same until 1999, just leave the rates alone." Sounds great, but it's not that simple. Even if it were possible. we'd still be spending millions each year just to maintain what's out there now. Practically speaking, however, we can't stand still. The rules under which we operate say we must meet all reasonable service requests in a timely manner. Telephone equipment is complex and it can't be put in overnight. With the way Texas has been growing and the way inflation is rampaging, some days it seems as though it will take all the running we can do and all the dollars we have just to stay in the same place. The engineering and construction work we do (and pay for) today determines the quality and quantity of service

Alternative 3: Let our shareowners' investment deteriorate

Everyone loves this answer...ex-cept the shareowners...and they may be you directly, or indirectly, if you have a pension plan, life insurance or own mutual fund shares. Realistically, however, shareowners have to earn a reasonable return on their investment. Otherwise, they don't invest. Would you? It was yesterday's investment money which bought the equipment serving you today and to-day's investment money is needed to buy the equipment to serve you

Alternative 4: Ask our employees to give up justified wage increases

Our employees are skilled and dedicated and we need them. To cut costs by denying them justified in-creases would be counter productive. We must pay competitive wages and benefits to attract and hold employees with the skills and pro-ductivity we need. As Texas grows, we'll need even more. If we lose or can't find quality employees, your service could suffer.

So what's left?

That's pretty obvious: a rate increase. But it won't happen right away. It's not that simple and it isn't automatic. Most businesses, if their costs go up, simply raise their prices or drop the service. We are a regulated utility and even when we aren't receiving enough money for service, we must continue providing it and keep on doing so until we can

prove to the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) that we're in financial need. Only then can we plead our case for a rate increase. What's more, it takes time before we receive authority to increase rates. By then, inflation may have lowered the buying power of the dollar enough so we're right back where we started or worse.

The tax collector wins

We're asking for about \$58 million in additional annual local revenues. half of which will go to increased taxes. Just about half of any increase we ever get goes to increased taxes

About those varied increases

We can't give you an "average" increase for an "average" customer. Increases are going to vary, literally, all over the map of Texas. The chief reason is a shift from city-by-city ratemaking to statewide rate-making. When this shift is completed, you will be paying rates based on the number of telephone numbers you can call without a long distance charge. We think you'll find this system fairer to

COLLEGE STATION - A 2,000 year-old staple of the Inca empire described by Texas A&M University scientists as an 'almost ideal food protein" could provide an ancient answer to modern food shortages.

The grain, quinoa (key-no-ah), is a cereal with a protein rating of about 16 percent, compared to a skimpy 6 percent in most American wheat products. This makes quinoa far superior to most cereal grains.

Quinoa is only under experimental testing in the United States at Texas A&M test plots, but researchers agree quinoa could be adapted to American high technology agricultural production methods, particularly in the dry Texas

A major television network's claim that Israel exploded a nuclear bomb off the coast of South Africa probably clears up the 1979 mystery which erupted when Washington, in effect, accused South Africa of joining the nuclear club.

There evidently was a nuclear test, and it was in that area of the world. But it was an Israeli bomb, not a South African bomb. What will the Carter Administration's response be? Or--did any in the Carter Administration know the facts when a finger was pointed at South Africa?

The possession of nuclear weapons by Israel is no major surprise. There have been reports for years Israel has such weapons--produced from uranium stolen from the United States in part.

Israel is unlikely to use such weapons in an aggressive way. They provide Israel, however, with added security. Potential enemies now know Israel can devastate an aggressor, if it comes to a last stand.

This news could act as a stimulus for peace in the Middle East, if Washington applies pressure evenly, on both Arabs and Israelis, to reach a compromise accord on a Palestinian homeland and other issues. Surely no one wants a nuclear war--in the next Middle East confrontation.

Israel can now afford to be magnanimous, more concilatory. None of her Arab neighbors possess nuclear weapons. India does, and Pakistan is developing them. The world's great powers should apply pressure to both sides, therefore, to see that a general peace agreement in the Mideast is reached before resort is made to such weapons--which would adversely affect the life of all people on earth.





#### **Pamphlets Available For Taxpayers**

AUSTIN--Kenneth E. Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced a statewide program to make citizens more aware of their rights, remedies and responsi-bilities as taxpayers.

"This public education pro-gram is the most comprehen-

sive effort of its kind in the state's history. It will involve the State Property Tax Board, local tax assessors throughout Texas, and the newspaper and broadcast industries," Graeber

The state property tax official said the program consists of two elements. The first involves distribution of a comprehensive 12-page pamphlet titled "Tax-payers' Rights, Remedies and Responsibilities."

"The pamphlet discusses a broad range of tax-related mat-ters, and will help Texans become much more knowledgeable on how the property tax system operates," the SPTB exeuctive director said.

Taxpayers may obtain a free copy by contacting county, city or school tax offices in their "The second element of the

program consists of efforts by the news media to inform all Texans of tax rendition deadlines, and the procedures and requirements to apply for homestead exemptions and productivity values.

"Local tax assessors will also be cooperating in this part of the taxpayer education program," Graeber noted. According to Graeber, the

program is being conducted in March to enable Texans to apply for all tax relief to which they may be entitled before local tax rendition deadlines.

"To qualify for most homestead exemptions and productivity valuation for agricultural land, applications must be made to each jurisdiction before the rendition period ends. Most of the state's local taxing units have rendition deadlines of April 1 or April 30, and failure to make timely application causes loss of the tax relief until the And, while an elderly citizen's next tax year," Graeber added.

He noted that when the new State Property Tax Code is fully implemented in 1982, all jurisdictions will have a rendition deadline of April 1.



#### Foreign Wheat Markets Pushed

The Executive Committee of U.S. WHEAT ASSOCIATES met in Washington, D.C. this week, the first such meeting of the producer market development organizatin since it was formed a month ago with the merger of Great Plains Wheat, Inc. and Western Wheat Associates. Leo Witkowski of Hereford, participated in the Executive Committee meeting as chairman of the Texas Wheat Producers Board, a supporting member of the U.S. WHEAT. According to Witkowski, the primary purpose of the Executive Committee meeting was to review the progress in consoli-dating the two former organizations and to provide initial policy direction to the combined

"The Executive Committee appoved a tentative staffing pattern for U.S. WHEAT AS-SOCIATES, subject to the approval of the President/Chief Executive Officer, a position expected to be filled in late March," Witkowski stated. The Committee also gave preliminary approval to the proposed budget for the new organization for the 1980-81 fiscal year beginning in July reflecting an increased level of market development efforts by producers. The budget will be reviewed and adopted by the full Board of Directors at the next scheduled meeting to be held March 24-26 in Washington,

In a meeting with Secretary of Agriculture Bergland, the farmer-board members reaffirmed U.S. WHEAT'S strong commitment to the development of expanded export markets for wheat and other agricultural commodities. They also expressed concern that, despite verbal commitments by administration officials toward greater emphasis on exports, especially in light of the embargo of grain shipments to the Soviet Union, very little concrete action has been taken by government to strenghten the market development programs

The Texas Wheat leader stated, "U.S. WHEAT urged Secretary Bergland and the National Association of Wheat Growers, to actively seek improvements in the available marketing tools so necessary for the expansion of U.S. grain board. Among the issues being supported by U.S. WHEAT are an increase in both the level of funding and the flexibility for PL 480 and Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) export financing programs, as well as an increase in government financial support for export market development activities to match the increasing investment from

the wheat producers."
Witkowski stated that U.S. WHEAT ASSOCIATES also reaffirmed its commitment to carry forward its petition initiated by Great Plains Wheat witht the support of Western Wheat Associates, against the European Communities' export supsidy program. The validity of the wheat farmers legal complaint against the European Community was earlier accepted by the U.S. Government and action must be taken on the complaint by the end of July.

According to Witkowski, the **Executive Committee concluded** with the call for the rapid expansion of the U.S. WHEAT information program to provide the U.S. wheat farmer and foreign customers with timely information on the wheat situation and the outlook for world trade. This would begin witht the employment of a "Director of Information" to coordinate and expand on the work previously carried out by the two

merged organizations U.S. WHEAT ASSOCIATES is the consolidation of WWA and GPW, a foreign market development organization sup-ported by wheat producers t through their respective state wheat boards and comr in Colorado, Kansas, Idaho, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Okalhoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Washington and Wyoming. In addition to the central office in Washington, D.C. U.S. WHEAT maintains foreign regional offices to promote mar-kets for wheat in Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, and the Middle East.

Texas producers support for-eign market development programs of U.S. WHEAT through the Texas Wheat Producers Board by a ½ cent per bushel self-assessment on their pro-duction delivered to country elevators. Since such work was initiated by the Board in 1971, the value of wheat in Texas has creased from \$70 million to

### **Texas Farmers Asked About Transportation** Issues

PLAINVIEW, TEXAS -- Texas grain farmers have a unique opportunity to be heard on grain transportation issues through a poll announced recently by Pioneer Hi-Bred Interenational, Polling will continue until about March 20th.

The "Pioneer Poll on Grain Tansportation' is being conducted in 16 major agricultural states. According to Jim Lindsey, president of the company's Southwestern Division, the poll is designed to gather farmers' opinions on the current grain transportation situation.

'This is one of the most effective ways I can think of for farmers to reach those who can help solve transportation problems -- shippers, carriers, lawmakers, government agencies. And you can be assured that these people will listen when they're hearing the opinions of 75,000 or more farm-

Prepared by Jefferson Davis Associates, a Cedar Rapids, lowa, research firm and Yankelovich, Skelly and White, Inc., New York, the questionnaire asks farmers to respond to more than 50 statements on grain transportation issues. Subject areas include rural roads and bridges, railroads, barge lines as well as rates and regulations affecting grain carriers. Every questionnaire will be electronically scanned to provide the total result. Findings of this poll should provide the most complete picture yet of the current relationship of transportation and the American farmer, according to Lindsey.

"The best way to make farmer opinions count is to make them heard," Lindsey concluded. "With the growing importance of crop exports to Texas farmers, we all have a big stake in an efficient system of grain gransport. We must have all forms collected by March 31, but I'd like to encourage farmers to make every effort to express their opinions immedia-

In addition to polling Texas farmers, Pioneer will distribute questionnaires in Colorado, Indiana, Illionois, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Mexico. North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

COLLEGE STATION \_ Nearly 95 percent of the eligible spring graduates at Texas A&M University have jobs lined up before leaving the university and a large percentage will com mand top dollars despite pre dictions of recession and increased unemployment, university officials report.

Of the 2,700 potential graduates, most will have degrees in engineering, agriculture and science — all highly prized by

Salaries for Texas A&M students have in recent years been above average in all fields, especially engineering, said Ron Winn, associate director of the university's placement office. Petroleum engineering topped the latest list at \$2,007; che cal engineers averaged \$1,788 and other engineering disciplines ranged from \$1,745 to \$1,483, based on figures voluntarily reported to the university by its 1979 fall graduates.

#### Physical education classes adjust to today's students

COLLEGE STATION -The old-fashioned gym class led by a whistle-toting, military style PE teacher is disappearing from the schoolyards and gyms.

Physical education classes now are being designed for individual activity and structured to help youngsters learn lifelong skills, say physical education experts at Texas A&M University.

With the rising incidence of heart disease and other ailments, schools are realizing they have a responsibility to help children maintain healthy bodies through adulthood by teaching a variety of physical skills, notes Dr. Charles Shea.

On the elementary level, there is less emphasis on competition, he adds. Instead teachers work on motor skills, encouraging children to learn the best way to do a movement or a series of movements. In high school students are being taught things relevant to their world now and later in life, including outdoor recreation activities, ballet, tennis and eques-

On the sixth of March, 1836, Mexican General Santa Anna committed an error which made almost certain the independence of Texas. 

On the 6th the Mexicans attacked in overwhelming force. The Texans and other U.S. defenders turned them back. The Mexicans attacked again and were repulsed a second time. But Santa Anna persisted and his third wave of attackers overran the fort. Only five defenders were taken alive, one of them being David Crockett. Santa Anna ordered them executed.

The cold-blooded and brutal order infuriated Texans and U.S. residents everywhere and six weeks later a revenge-minded force of Texans and others met Santa Anna in the battle of San Jacinto, sweeping his forces from the field to the cry of, "Remember the Alamo," and winning independence for Texas.


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
