Error explained Zone Panel Role Told

This particular news medium has "EGG ON ITS FACE" but it is worth it to emphasize the need for the public hearing of the Municipal Airport Zoning Commission set for Tuesday at 2 p. m. in the city council chambers.

The story in the Hansford Plainsman, Sunday, connected construction at the airport -- a much-discussed item -- with the zoning commission. Actually that is in the hands of the city council.

The Municipal Airport zoning Commission is concerned with air space involving the land for approximately one mile surrounding the new municipal airport. Chiefly, this has to do with the height of construction on these particular parcels of land.

The most simple understanding of this problem comes from picturing height on the surrounding property of the airport as a silhouette. This would appear in the form of a bowl or crater. Immediately surrounding the airport, height, would be limited to just a few feet. As distance of property from the airport proper increases, so does the allowable construction height.

Such a pattern provides a safety gradient or "bowl" to allow aircraft to take off from the airfield and gain altitude safely.

To insure enforcement of such zoning safety, the state aeronautical board requires a five-man zoning commission representing both city and county to be structured in instances where the airport involved is receiving financial grants and aid through the state board.

The problem for Spearman municipal airport is much the same for most across the state. It is a city facility but it is outside the city limits.

Adding further complications, county entities are not granted zoning powers in Texas.

So, an act of the legislature created a "BUBBLE" of authority about such airports involved provided a zoning commission was structured to handle the requirements and their enforcement. This panel is comprised of four appointees and a fifth member elected by the four once they have become an official body.

Therefore, all persons owning property within approximately one mile of the new airport, or concerned by rent, lease or partnership with the use of that land -- or any person who thinks future plans might involve him or her with such property, should be at this public hearing, Tuesday.

To emphasize the need to correct our interpretation printed in the Sunday edition of the "papers" any concerns with building on or using the new airport facility is the concern of the person or persons involved and the city council.

Any construction or possible land use of property within about a mile radius of the new airport is the concern of the Municipal Airport Zoning Commission.

And that body is opening its function to the general public in a hearing beginning at 2 p. m., Tuesday in city council chambers.

Bad check artists few--and caught

Business picked up for the Hansford County Sheriffs department right on Christmas after a quiet pre-holiday season with an alleged rape of a minor child, three different experiences with felony theft by check and one failure to show for arraignment.

Leonard Chabarría, 30, Spearman, is in custody in lieu of 5,000 bond following his arraignment for the alleged sexual assault of a minor. This case will go to the grand jury for action.

Howard Grubbs, 22 of Gruver is free on 2,000 bond after being arraigned for alleged felony by theft by check. According to Hansford County Sheriff R. L. McFarlin, this case will go to the jury at the next session.

Ronald Dorton, 28, Spearman was arraigned for the same offense but made restitution of some 300 which included redeeming the worthless checks and paying court costs.

According to Sheriff McFarlin, the third case handled on felony theft by check involved taking a suspect in custody for the Elkhart, Kans. authorities. He was Johnny Milsap, 29, Morgan City, La.

Carlos Montoya, Spearman, arrested as a suspect in a case of criminal mischief and released on bond, failed to appear for arraignment. He was arrested and remains in custody in lieu of 5,000 bond.

Sheriff McFarlin praised Hansford county residents and their many visitors for the Holiday season for considerate, safe operation of their vehicles and a quiet but joyful behavior in general.

This could possibly be reported as an alleged attack of modesty in light of numerous comments heard from Hansford citizens praising both the sheriff's department and the Spearman police department for the safe and sane holiday season that prevailed here.

N O W ACCOUNTS TO BE OFFERED LOCALLY

Technically it is called "The Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (P.L. 96-221)" and it becomes effective December 31.

But what is that? It means that as of January 1, banking customers will be able to earn interest on checking accounts.

It is a service consumers have sought for several years, but apparently checking with interest, commonly known as NOW Accounts, is a complex concept not wholly supported by banking institutions.

The FIRST STATE BANK of Spearman's Negotiable Order of Withdrawal (NOW) Accounts hold these requirements: to qualify for the 5% interest an account must maintain a minimum balance of \$1,000.00. If the balance falls below this level, interest for the month will be forfeited. If the account balance drops below \$2,000.00, a small maintenance fee of \$4.00 per month will be charged.

Check with any of the officers of the FIRST STATE BANK for more information concerning their "Save With Checking" accounts.

Bank Deposits Up 4 Million

Deposits in the two Hansford County banks at the end of 1979 totaled \$47,402,000. Deposits in First State Bank at the end of the year totaled \$31,255,000 as compared to deposits of \$27,571,000 at the end of 1978. Deposits in Gruver State Bank at the end of 1979 were \$16,147,000 compared to deposits at the end of 1978 at \$16,525,000.

The First State Bank of Spearman loans totaled

\$17,538,000 compared to \$16,487,000 at the end of 1978.

Loans at the Gruver State Bank at the end of 1979 were \$11,684,000 as compared to \$10,277,000 at the end of 1978. Interstate Savings and Loan Association of Perryton with a branch office in Spearman has deposits exceeding \$42.6 million and loans total more than \$44.6 million. In the loan department, more than \$41.3 million is in first mortgage loans.

Total resources of the First State Bank at the end of 1979 were listed as \$35,690,000 as compared to \$31,044,000 at the end of 1978, up over \$4 million. Total resources of the Gruver State Bank at the end of 1979 were listed at \$19,504,000 as compared to those of a year ago of \$18,396,000.

A record wheat crop at fairly good prices, good cattle prices and a continuing strong oil and gas industry accounts for the rise in deposits in the country.

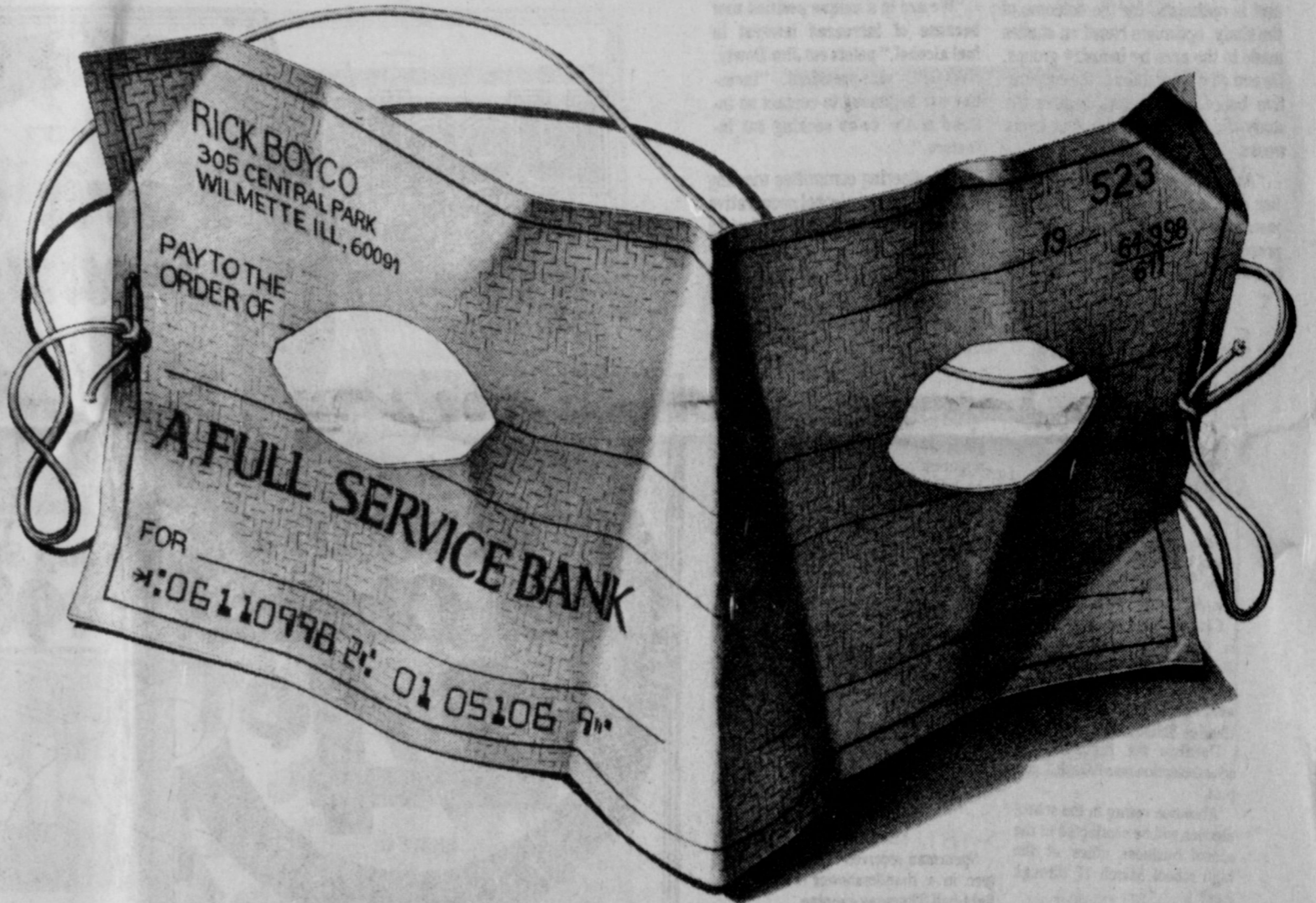

Pathway now clear Lynxettes win bi-dist. game 43-38 for gasohol plant

More than 3 1/2-million bushels of grain have been committed by growers - and more still is coming in - to clear the way for establishment of a farmer-owned fuel alcohol plant on the North Plains, organizers of the alcohol plant announced Friday.

The project has been in development for several months by the Northwest Texas Grain Products Co. cooperative, an organization of several hundred grain growers over nine North Plains counties.

In addition to committing the 3 1/2-million bushels of grain, farmers in the NTGPC have paid in \$175,000 in money to develop and advance the alcohol plant.

The plant, as proposed in planning, will produce 20 million gallons, or more, of fuel alcohol a year. It is of special interest to farmers in providing a new and expanding market for feed grains - grain sorghum, wheat and corn.

Announcement of the success of the growers sign-up drive was announced Friday by Tommy Harbert, Dumas, president of the NWTGPC, who pointed out that memberships in the cooperative will continue to be accepted.

Next step for the project is a feasibility study to determine the practicability of a fuel alcohol plant on the North Plains, and its location. Harbert is optimistic for the outcome of the study, optimism based on studies made in the area by industry groups. He and other members of the cooperative board of directors believe the study will be completed in four to six weeks.

"As a matter of policy, the board has decided to continue accepting members until the study is formally presented to the NWTGPC membership," Harbert adds.

The interest in fuel alcohol has boomed in recent weeks, spurred by the Iranian crisis and by directives from President Jimmy Carter for federal programs to encourage plants for the product.

Gasohol, usually a blend of 10 percent alcohol with 90 percent gasoline, has been recommended as a high performance motor fuel, clean burning and with limited air pollution.

In the North Plains area, Diamond-Shamrock Corp. has declared plans to blend gasohol through its refinery in Moore county and to market the fuel through the area. An associated D-S company, Sigmor Shamrock Service Stations, has been selling the fuel through central and south Texas for several weeks.

Grain residue from production of fuel alcohol - or ethanol - has a practical and high value as a food supplement for humans and for cattle feed, sponsors of the project point out. Carbon dioxide can be another salable by-product, they add.

In other developments last week, the cooperative board met with several investors interested in putting up financing for the plant.

That meeting was held Friday afternoon in Dumas, where the NWTGPC is presently headquartered.

"We are in a unique position now because of increased interest in fuel alcohol," points out Jim Dowty, NWTGPC vice-president. "Investors are beginning to contact us instead of the co-op seeking out investors."

Also a steering committee meeting for a national fuel alcohol cooperative has been scheduled Feb. 8 in Kansas City, Mo.

The committee is composed of representatives from three Texas co-ops and others from Indiana, North Dakota and Kansas.

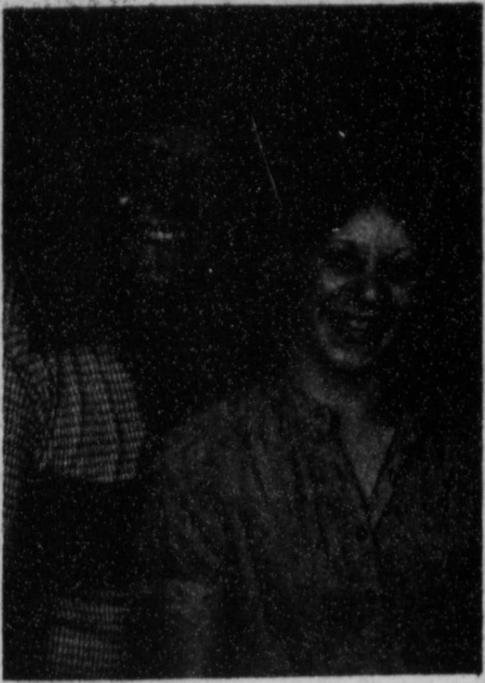

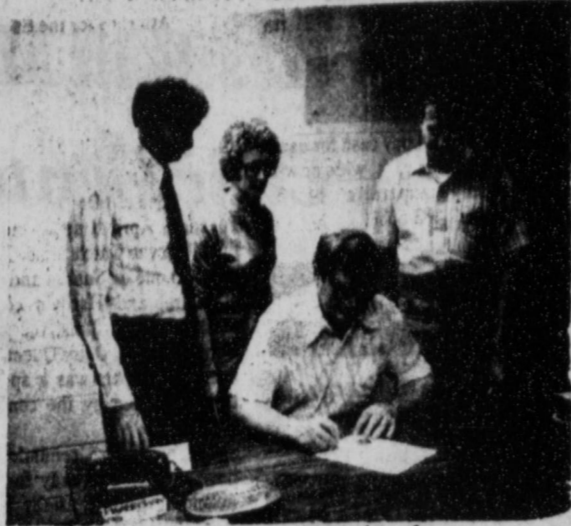

Gasohol plant nears reality

Progress continues to be made in the development of the Northwest Texas Grain Products Coop, a concern which will be devoted to production of grain alcohol and related bi-products according to Marion Garland of Sunray, one of the original organizers of the Coop.

Mr. Garland was in Spearman Monday to make a report on this project on the local radio and through this newspaper.

According to Garland, 2,850,000 bushels of grain (corn, milo, or wheat) have now been committed by over 200 grain growers from Groom to Dalhart and from Dumas to Booker. Co-op directors, who include Dwayne TeBeest of Gruver and R.C. Porter of Spearman, have set a goal of 3 1/2 million bushels as the point at which a feasibility study will be initiated.

Proposed financing of the plant, which is presently projected to cost \$30 million with an annual production capacity of 20 million gallons of alcohol, is an 80%-20% arrangement, wherein an investment bank will provide \$24 million and the farmer-members put up the remaining \$6 million. An investment banking firm with which the coop has been in contact, Stephens, Inc. of Little Rock, Ark. advises that they have commitments of over \$400 million to be invested in alcohol plant construction, subject to a favorable feasibility study by a reputable firm.

recover to recent levels during the two years time required to get the plant into operation, whereas the price of inputs into grain production will undoubtedly rise substantially in that period. Principal of these inputs is fuel, and the principal output of the proposed plant being fuel (alcohol), also, the gain on processed grain will be more than 50-100%. "It looks to me" he said "like this is the only way available to most of us to survive" by tying the price of what we raise to fuel prices, which are going to continue to go up-they always have."

Moving to the mechanics of what is required to become a member of this group, Garland explained that in the pre-construction phase, a member will put up 20 cents per bushel for a minimum 10,000 bu. contract. 5 cents of this (\$500 per 10,000 bu contract) is put up at the time membership application is made, and serves to provide the seed money for organizational expenses and to pay for the feasibility study.

At the time the study is received and presented to the entire membership, a decision will be made by that membership on whether to proceed with pre-engineering and development studies leading to actual ground-breaking for the plant (to be located at the most desirable site according to the feasibility study). If the decision is negative, that is the end of it-but all who put up money make that decision together. If the decision is to go ahead, the present temporary board of directors will resign, and the entire membership will elect a permanent board, and each holder of a 10,000 bu contract will put up an additional (15 cents) (\$1500 per contract) to proceed with pre-engineering and planning studies.

Members of the board, Kenneth Irwin, Thane McCloy, Jimmy Shieldknight, Everett Tracy, and Joel Lee Lackey took their oath of office from Judge Roy Lee McClellan.

This was an organizational meeting and election was held. Jimmy Shieldknight was named chairman, Kenneth Irwin, vice-chairman, and Joel Lee Lackey, secretary. Members discussed going to a workshop on April 18 in Amarillo, to better qualify them for the job for which they were elected. The next scheduled meeting of the board is April 24.

investment carries a high degree of risk-nobody has ever built a purely-fuel-alcohol plant in the United States. "This plant will be under the control of local people," Garland said. "There has been concern to a number of prospective members over the proposed relationship with Grain Products International (G.P.I.) because final control would have been vested in G.P.I. The board of directors shares this concern, and has determined that the coop will under no circumstances enter such an agreement."

"We believe this plant will work, and work well; but it boils down to this-a chance to survive in an economic climate where it is government policy to encourage cheap food because there's always a surplus-and on the other hand, it is government policy to develop alternative fuel sources at almost any price-because there's a shortage, and will be as far ahead as we can see.

"And grain alcohol also has other practical uses-plastics, to name one, cosmetics for another. The prospects are awesome."

"To wrap it up", Garland concluded "an alcohol plant is going to be built in the Panhandle-and farmers are going to build it!"

Changes of Loan Program Due To Embargo

Acting Secretary of Agriculture Jim Williams announced Jan. 8 a series of actions designed to fully offset the potential impact on farm prices and income from the action taken to suspend shipment of agricultural commodities to the Soviet Union.

Effective immediately, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will: increase the wheat loan price to \$2.50; increase the corn loan price to \$2.10 a bushel, with comparable increases in loan prices for the other feed grains; increase the reserve release price to \$3.75 a bushel for wheat-representing 150 percent of new loan price; increase the reserve call price to \$4.63 a bushel for wheat-representing 185% of the new loan price; increase the reserve release price to \$2.63 a bushel for corn-representing 125 percent of the new loan price; increase the reserve call price to \$3.05 a bushel for corn-representing

145 percent of the new loan; make comparable increases in reserve release and call price for the other feed grains; waive first year interest costs for the next 13 million tons of corn (corn only) entering the reserve; increase reserve storage payments from 25 to 26 1/2 cents a bushel for all reserve commodities except oats, which is increased from 19 to 20 cents a bushel.

As the Vice President announced on January 7, the Department will also purchase 4 million tons (150 million bushels) of wheat, including the assumption of the contractual obligation on up to 3.7 million tons (135 million bushels) that will not be shipped to the Soviet Union; offer to assume the contractual obligation on up to 10.0 million tons (395 million bushels) of corn.

A decision on a paid diversion program for 1980 crop grains will be made at a later date.

Williams said the increase in budget outlays for the entire package for fiscal years 1980 and 1981 is estimated at \$2.5 to \$3.0 billion. Most of this increase, around \$2.0 billion, will come in fiscal year 1980.

According to Martin Chandler, director of Hansford County ASCS, the prices based on Hansford County Loan Rate are as follows: the 1979 wheat loan is increased 15 cents, from \$2.32 to \$2.47. 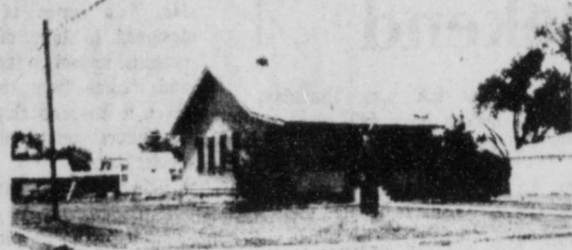

Sales Up in County

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said, Friday, city sales tax rebates for March totalled \$24.1-million—about \$10-million less than Texas cities received in March last year.

—Not so at Spearman! The optional one-percent city sales tax is an excellent indicator of across-the-counter retail sales and the rebate in the city of Spearman for March, 1980, amounts to \$6,259.99.

For March, 1979, rebate to Spearman was \$5,845.38. Payment to date for 1980 amounts to \$46,841.58. Total for the same period in 1979 was \$35,401.30.

Retail sales at Spearman are up 32 percent over 1979!

Similar rebate receipts by the city of Gruver are \$9,419.16 for 1980 to date. For the same period last year, receipts were \$6,381.99—up a healthy 47 percent.

Perryton is the area example of lower monthly receipts reported. Rebates to that city for March, 1980 total \$15,552.35. For the same month in 1979:

\$33,991.11. Yet receipts for all of 1980 thus far amount to \$127,214.39 against \$94,986.15 for 1979.

The increase for the city of Perryton thus far in 1980 is 33 percent.

The story is pretty much the same for the state. Rebate payments from the first of 1980 total \$162.8-million against \$135.2-million for the same period of 1979.

Bullock said because year-to-date payments are up over the same period last year, it is too early to say whether the decreased MONTHLY payments reflect a downward trend in taxable sales or simply seasonal adjustments.

In any event, by the same figures, even MONTHLY sales at Spearman and Gruver are up over March, 1979.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

At the regular meeting of the Spearman City Council, Thursday night, traffic threaded its way through the agenda from Bernice and Northeast Court to Crazy Corners, stopping only at the dollar sign while the panel and the audience took a look at a draft of the budget for the forthcoming fiscal year.

There were some other items, too, attendant to operating city business, among them some replacement machinery for the city's waste water treatment plant. The city had suffered a break in a tubular shaft operating aeration fans along the shaft. From a former supplying firm, delivery date was late and price was considered excessive.

Mayor Ralph Blodgett suggested calling in an area fabricating firm for consultation noting that, if the firm could make the parts, there would be a number of advantages in the future should problems occur. Authorizing an order from the

original firm was delayed until it could be studied locally.

Then, council members moved into the mainstream of city traffic. City Manager Jim Murray reported on the state-federal recommendations following a survey conducted for the city to determine compliance with federal guidelines for city traffic direction and control.

Outcome of the study was recommendation of removal of the traffic light at Davis and Main streets to be placed with stop signs on Davis. After a brief discussion seeking to anticipate problems that might arise from the removal, the council voted without dissent to take down the light and install the stop signs on Davis.

The "yield" sign at Bernice and Northeast Court was a "horse of another color." City Manager Murray reported on conferences and a study with state highway engineers from the Amarillo office with the

outcome a "status quo" situation. The highway department would not agree to either total removal of the yield sign or moving it to a position where the city street traffic would yield to the highway instead of the existing situation.

It should be stated that the state retains control over such devices in their highway system even though it is within a city limits. Highway engineer files show the sign was installed to slow incoming highway traffic both to protect traffic from the intersecting city street and because of the sudden--and to strangers traveling through the city, unexpected-- 90-degree turn in the highway. According to those files, there is a history of tractor-trailer rigs overturning because of the unexpected sharp turn.

It was noted that there is a certain distinction to the yield sign. According to the highway engineers, it is believed this

might be the only location in the entire state where the state highway traffic system yields to a city street.

However, the history of traffic conflict at that point made the highway engineers adamant about any change.

Crazy Corners posed its own special problem for the state engineers -- as it has for local traffic for quite some time. A first look by the state people spawned the idea of making the west bound lane two lanes with one of them a "right turn only" mandatory traffic flow. Then, it was noted that roadway width was not sufficient to make the westbound half of the street into two lanes.

Chief problem with the present traffic flow at Crazy Corners is that some vehicles in the westbound lane make left turns from the extreme right side of the lane. Police Chief on Robinson told the council this is legal if it is a single lane

thoroughfare. According to the chief, right-turning traffic must move as far to the right of the lane as possible -- by traffic statute -- but a left turn may be made from any point within the lane width.

Mayor Blodgett raised the question of taking some space from the eastbound lane to widen the westbound side enough for two lanes. He noted that the flow of eastbound traffic is already fixed at that point and poses no problems compared to westbound.

It was agreed to confer again with state engineers regarding this matter. City Manager Murray did assure that, whatever the final decision, the state had promised to mark traffic lanes clearly at that point.

From traffic, the panel moved to a public "workshop" session on the budget for the next fiscal year. This ended in an executive, or closed, session to discuss personnel and their

salaries. This session, too, was a study period for consensus with no action taken when the council reconvened the public meeting.

Each member took a copy of the budget home for further study. There will be time for questions both by the council and the public before the budget is adopted.

Following the closed session and just prior to adjournment, the panel conducted the discussion period of "other" matters. These are items on which no action can be taken since they were not made a part of the posted agenda in advance but, worthwhile items are marked for the agenda of the next regular session from time to time.
