Mayor Proclaims February As Heart Month

A proclamation designating February as American Heart Month, and pointing out that the heart and blood vessel diseases are responsible for more deaths here than all other diseases and causes combined, was signed yesterday by Mayor D.E. Hackley of Spearman.

In his proclamation, the Mayor called upon local citizens to help speed their Heart Association's research, education and community heart programs through Heart Fund contributions and volunteer service.

The month-long Heart Fund Campaign will reach its high point with the 25 day period ending on Heart Sunday, February

Present when the Mayor signed the proclamation were Marvin S. Chambers, local Heart Fund Chairman and Dr. R.L. Kleeberger, President of the Hansford County Heart Association. Text of the proclamation is as follows:

PROCLA MATION

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has designated February as American Heart Month and called upon heads of all political subdivisions to issue similar proclamations applying to their own jurisdictions:

WHEREAS, the heart and blood vessel diseases are responsi ble for more deaths than all other diseases and causes combined;

WHEREAS, medical research since 1950 has resulted in a 15 per cent decline in the mortality rate from cardiovascular disease among persons aged below

WHEREAS, authorities agree that medical science is on the verge of important breakthroughs to further control heart and blood vessel diseases,

AND WHEREAS, the Number One defense against these diseases is your

HEART FUND

THEREFORE, I, Mayor D.E. Hackley of Spearman, Texas do proclaim that the month of February be observed as Heart Month in this city, and I urge all citizens to help speed their Heart Association's research, education and community heart program through Heart Fund contributions and volunteer service, supporting the 1968 Heart Fund with the full measure of their generosity.



Dayle Schnelle who wrote the following article in his church letter last week:

Often we complain that the newspapers and other news media spend a lot of time and space telling of the crimes and other acts of the youth of America which tend to give a very bad report concerning the youth of today. All of you have read of murder, robbery, and other acts of violence committed by our youth until we feel that this is a true picture of what is happening with the majority of young people. Such a picture is completely in error. We ought to thank God that such acts are still considered "news"! For the normal reports we consid er to be "news" today are the unusual acts that happen. It is still true that good deeds, honesty, love of home and country, and all such things that make up the very best of our American way of life are not "unusual enought" to be considered news Of course, it is unfair that

we do not give all the honor to those to whom honor is due. But let us never forget that most of the youth of America are not involved in acts of crime. Their good lives, good deeds, and sincere desire to be good citizens is so common that we take it pretty much for granted. And when it is like that it is not considered news" !

In the various churches I have served in the past 30 years I have never had reason to doubt that the Church of Jesus Christ would continue to grow and that the King dom would be in good hands as the youth of the church grew into places of responsibility and leadership.

The city of Spearman has cause to be proud of its youth. I have known many young people in various parts of our nation but I have never known a finer group than

Mrs. Hugh Banks Impressed With Mayo Clinic

Mrs. Hugh Banks was in Rochester, Minnesota most of the month of January with her mother, Mrs. W.R. Steinert. Mrs. Banks left Jan. 6 and returned the 28th after being with her mother during surgery and radium treatments. Mrs. Steinert lives in Sutherland, Iowa.

Mrs. Steinert had emergency surgery in the Methodist Hospital in Rochester, returned home for $1\frac{1}{2}$ weeks, then went to the Mayo Clinic for one month of the treatments. While spending this time with her mother, Mrs. Banks learned a great deal about the very famous Mayo Clinic. Tours are conducted each day beginning at 10 a.m. On the day Mrs. Banks took the tour, they announced at its beginning that 1,000 patients had already gone through the clinic for check-ups. The tour included a film on the

history of the clinic. The clinic, which is staff-ed with 1200 doctors, can be seen for many miles. The huge new building is made from marble shipped in from Italy and covers the space of a huge business block. It is now 16 stories high but build ing will continue until it is 69 stories. The original clinic is just

across the street from the new one and the two are connected by an underground walking subway. The subway also connects the clinic with two hotels, the radiation center and the Methodist Hospital. For the convenience of patients and their families, there are all kinds of shops in the subway, including dress shops, barber shops and beauty par lors.

Mrs. Banks and her parents returned home very impressed with the kindness and understanding of the clinic staff. The nurses and doctors went to great extremes on behalf of Mr. and Mrs. Steinert and Mrs. Banks as they do with each and everyone of their patients. Literature may be obtained from the clinic on its history and activities.
