state has acquired the largest and most significant Caddo Indian village archaeological
site in The site, according to Armstrong, has been of
prime interest to state archaeologists because of prime interest to state archaeologists because of
systematit looting and destruciton while it was in
private hands. He said it will now be protected systematic loos.
private hands sesid it will now be protected
and studied in an orderly, scientific manner under state ownership.
Under state law the site, including all of the in Bowie County, will be under the supervision of both the General Land Office and the Texas Antiquiteis Committee which manages archaeo-
logically valuable discoveries on public lands Armstrong said the 64.5 -acre tract containing the Caddo mounds was traded for six small,
unmanageable tracts owned by the state which unmanageable tracts owned by the state which
had equal farming value. The newly acquired acreage will still be leased
for farming, but the lessee will agree not to
disturb the mounds and will protect them disturb the mounds and will protect them from
treasure hunters. Eventualy careful excavation of the mounds and village site may reveal a great
deal more about these earry Texas residents than we now know, Arstrong said.
"I am particulaly pleased that we were able to
accomplist this
se trede," Armstrong said, "becacase the tracts we traded off were not financially
advantageous to the state. but the Caddo site
represents some of our richest and oldest Teras represents some of our richest and oldest Texas
heritage."

Farmers, Ranchers Suffering From Old Ailment

| COLLEGE STATION.- Farmers and ranchers are suffering from an old and persistent ailment--the cost-price squeeze. <br> Net agricultural income in Texas is expected to decline to about $\$ 1$ billion this year despite higher cash receipts, points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist in marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A\&M University System. That would put it at the 1978 level. <br> Cotton growers, cow-calf operators, sheepmen and dairy farmers will likely fair somecorn and soybean farmers. swine producers and poultrymen, speculates the economist. <br> Anderson foresees production costs this year jumping up around 12 percent, with fuel, fertilizer and interest expenses leaping much higher. Although this rise trail last year's big se only 4 to 6 percent. With the cost of pumping water skyrocketing, Texas farmers will be especially hard hit since production from from irrigated farms represents about 60 percent of the state's total crop sales. | While money is generally available for farmers to borrow, the greatest concern is the cost of that money and the income that it might generate, says Anderson. With the current cost-price squeeze, farmers and ranchers will be hard-pressed to repay high-cost loans. <br> All this is putting a growing number of agricultural operattors in financial stress, particularly young farmers and those depending heavily on credit capital to run their farming business. <br> It's also changing the financial potential of operators using a lot of credit compared with more conservative farmers that depend less on credit and more on debt-free capital. When the rate of inflation exceeds the cost of money, it generally pays to borrow money to expand your operation. <br> Inflation boosts the net worth of assets which helps support weak cash flow statements. But interest rates higher than inflation shifts the financial situation in favor of the operator with a large proportion of equity in his business and little debt. <br> The cost-price squeeze places a premium on financial manage- | ment skills of farmers, contends the economist. Some operators will reduce their dependence upon credit capital to minimize financial risk by reducing re- placement livestock and machinery purchases. Farm expansion will also slow down and marginal cropland may revert to grassland for grazing livestock. High cost of money tends to <br> High cost of monesh leasing agreements and increases cropshare renting arrangements, adds Andersoc. However, prolonged inflation strongly favors landowners relative to tenant operators. Farming systems using the least amount of inputs for maximum returns and minimum tillage practices gain more rapid acceptance. <br> Pressures from the cost-price squeeze also encourage forward pricing. More producers decide upon delivery. Hedging in the futures market is an alternative for some individuals who understand this forward pricing strategy. It is easier to finance an operation when assured a reasonable price for at least a part of the expected crop or livestock production. High money costs also encourage farmers to sell at | harvest time to avoid storage and interest costs. <br> A possible "plus" from tight and expensive credit is that producers take a stronger interest in marketing, notes the economist. Year-round marketing strategies become essential, tendency to shift some of the financing burden to the marketing agency. Emphasis is on a total production--marketing system that is cost-effective. <br> With the overall supply-demand relationship for farm commodities affecting farm prices regardless of production costs, producers will need to look at different enterprises in the years ahead, suggests Anderson. With reasonable efficiency, diversification of enterprises may substantially reduce the possibility of financial disaster resulting from long periods of low prices and income for a given enterprise. The old saying, "Don't put all your eggs in one basket," is still worthy of consideration. <br> Soviet says Olympic boycotters can still attend. |
