Whatever the tale, and there are those who believe several different versions, a great number of people enjoy celebrating the anniversary of the death of St. Patrick, in the middle of this month. Irishmen take pride in the occasion, and on some occasions have even brought pieces of the "ould sod" from Ireland to observe the occasion.

No Paid Diversion for 1980 Wheat, Feed Grain Crops

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29-Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland today announced the U.S. Department of Agriculture will not institute a paid land division program for the 1980 crops of wheat, corn and other feed

He said the decision was based on prospects for continued growth in the world consumption requirement for these crops. "Our grain exports will be at record levels this year and will continue to grow in the future." Bergland said.

"While U.S. producers enjoyed record large production in 1979/80, world production of grain actually declined. This has boosted demand for U.S. crops," Bergland said. "According to our estimates, we are expecting U.S. feed grain exports to reach a record 68 million tons in this marketing year and U.S. wheat exports to total 36 million tons--also a record amount."

"Obviously, we cannot make any precise estimates of what 1980 world feed grain production will be but we know world grain demand will continue to grow. As long as we have adequate supplies, we can expect our exports to continue to increase. World grain stocks are declining this year and prices are higher than a year ago," Bergland said. "Stocks are likely to decline again in 1980/



mies. The job has become complex. The biggest problem of big government is to be able to respond to real needs.





The flaw in the concept, aimed mostly at items littered, is that nothing which degrades actually "goes away," not in weeks or ever. Natural food products, for example, merely revert to some other form in the ecological cycle. If beverage containers, for example, were made to degrade, they would only break down into smaller pieces over a period of time. But no cans or bottles ever return to their original raw material state. The number of pieces to be picked up would simply multiply.

Beverages, of course, rerials are used to make containers for both short and long shelf-life products. Therefore, it would be difficult, if not impossible, to set a particular time for a given container to begin to

There's a scripture that really hit me the other day, I Corinthinas 10:30-31, "If I partake with thankfulness, why am I denounced because of that for which I give thanks? So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God." If you have something in your life that God can't give glory to, if you are getting ready to say something and you don't think that God will get glory from it, just remember you are in His sight.

That may be hard on friendship but if they are true friends they will be back.

We go all over the world preaching the gospel and yet there are people right here in Spearman who have never realheard the Word. It is not because it was not put forth. People hear the Word and yet they miss it because of the example of others they are associating with. It is sad that we can be so close and yet be so far away from one another. We can be surrounded by people and be lonely. We put our hearts in the same attitude as athletics, be strong and never falter. You're suppose to have faults. But God says, "Confess your faults to one another and pray for one another that you may be healed." In America, we feel that if we are weak we are admitting that there's something wrong with us. God wants us to come before

Him just as we are. If we have a need, it is no problem for God. That it what God is there for. We are not saved to go to heaven and we are not saved from hell. You accept Jesus Christ as your Saviour, to meet the needs of humankinds on earth, and heaven is just one of the fringe benefits for being a born again child of the King. The first high-power rifle silhouette shoot of the year at Perryton Rifle Club Lake Fryer gave Tom Reed a chance to show off his hawk-eye. 

Social security

annual reports

People receiving social security benefits who earned more than the annual exempt amount in wages on self-employment during 1979, have until April 15, 1980, to file an annual report of their earnings, Howard Weatherly, social security manager in Pampa, said recently.

The 1979 annual exempt amount of \$3,480 for people under 65 all of the year and \$4,500 for people 65 or over. In general, a person has \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 of annual earnings over the exempt amount.

The annual report is used by the social security administration to determine whether the person received the correct amount of benefits during 1979. If too much or too little was Disas er Programpaid, any adjustment necessary is made after the annual report

is received. A special monthly test is used during a person's first year of retirement. Under this test, a person can receive a benefit for a month in which he or she did little or no work regardless of total annual earnings. This monthly test can be used only in the person's first year of retire-

Most people who need to file a report should have received one in the mail. If a person did not receive a form, or lost or misplaced the one he or she received, additional copies of the annual report form can be obtained at the Pampa social security office, located at 125 South Gillespie. The telephone number is 669-3381.

The people at the office will be glad to answer any questions. They also have a leaflet, 'If you work after you retire,' which contains more information about the annual earnings

WASHINGTON, D. C. --The biggest upset of the recent winter Olympics was unquestionably the U.S. team's 4-3 defeat of Russia's entry. Russia's hockey team was so heavily favored the pre-Olympic Games question was whether any team could make the score close.
