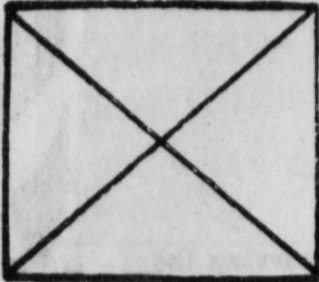

John P. Armes announces candidacy

Mr. John P. Armes, of Gruver, has authorized the Spearman Reporter to announce his candidacy for Commissioner of Precinct #3, Hansford County, in the Democratic primary.

Mr. Armes is a farmer and rancher and has lived in Hansford County for the past 24 years. He has lived in Precinct #3 for 20 years.

Mr. Armes is married to the former Jean Crable and has two daughters - Mrs. David Fletcher, of Gruver, and Darla, a student in Gruver High School; two sons - David who is married to the former Kelly Harper, of Spearman and Justin. He also has two step children - Mrs. Connie Clother, and Steve Crable.

Mr. and Mrs. Armes are members of the United Methodist Church of Gruver. He is finishing his sixth year on the Board of Trustees, Gruver School District, but is retiring April 5th. He has been on the Board of the Hansford County Stock Show for approximately 8 years. He is also on the Board of Directors of the Equity Elevator.

Mr. Armes has been particularly interested in the youth of the county and has always participated in and been con-

cerned with their activities. He has always given generously of his time and means to help any worthwhile organization.

In announcing his candidacy, Mr. Armes stated that he is aware of the extreme responsibility of the County Governing body. He has been a tax payer for many years and pledges himself to keep local taxes as low as possible, consistent with adequate management. He is aware of the need to pay salaries to attract and hold efficient employees and officials. He further states that he is concerned with the responsibility and operation of the hospital.

Mr. Armes is knowledgeable concerning the new taxing assessment requirements and is aware of the confusion during this transition period. He would expect to cooperate with the new tax assessment board and made every effort to keep the taxes fair and equitable.

It is Mr. Armes' intention to contact as many voters as possible between now and the Democratic Primary. He will sincerely appreciate any effort and influence by the voters on his behalf.

Notice Of Emergency Meeting

A public information forum on the subject of issuing certificates of obligation to construct a new fire station and a new airport has been scheduled for 8 p.m., Thursday at the Municipal Fire Station, Spearman, with the urgent appeal that all concerned citizens attend.

The meeting was scheduled under the emergency meeting provisions requiring public notice of such a conclave.

Some civic leaders feel much of the misunderstanding and opposition to the certificates of obligation results from a lack of adequate, clear communication.

To be discussed at the meeting is the virtual underwriting of the certificates by the city's existing industrial development group. By the time of the meeting Thursday night, this agreement could be officially set in writing, a move growing out of the regular city meeting, Tuesday night, but mentioned here in the event that meeting is not concluded in time to make the press deadline.

"It is important that all the people understand this business of the certificates of obligation," City Manager Jim Murray emphasized. "With such understanding, I doubt there will be a call for a referendum. Such a delay would add considerably to the contractual costs due to inflation."

In the opinion of all involved with the issue, the meeting Thursday night should be the scene of deciding factors.

Lynx, Lynxettes Honored At Annual Athletic Banquet

Monday was the Night of the Athlete.

The occasion was the annual athletic awards banquet.

The theme-set by the cheerleaders--was "Oceans of Athletes"--carried out all through the filled banquet hall.

Guest speaker was John McGuire, athletic director for the Amarillo school system.

As diners did justice to the catered meal the program proceeded through the invocation by Cheerleader Jane Flowers, a welcome by Cheerleader Valerie Hagerman and presentations by all seven of the cheerleaders which included a presentation recognition to Worley Smith who was serving his third year as Master of Ceremonies for the affair.

This brought the program to the point of suspense: the awards.

Coach Ralph Newton led off the exciting moments with recognitions and awards in girls basketball, including recognition of Coach Crocker for his work with the distaff cagers.

Newton's recognitions included Connie Shields, Linda Wilson, Kenda Burke and Mary Ann Martin for their performance on the all-district team, Kenda Burke for an all-regional team performance and Connie Shields for play in two all star games -- one of them coming up in May pitting Texans against Kansas at Liberal.

Kenda Burke was named basketball Lynxette and Nancy Wilson received the Fighting Heart trophy.

Next was Coach Larry Morris -- recognizing the help of Coaches Jenkins and Collinsworth -- to cover highlights of the boys basketball season and make awards.

Highlights included the trip to Reese Air Force Base and district wins with the low point recalled at the Canadian tournament against Miami.

Steve Shields was named most valuable player and Coach Morris noted the six-foot, three-inch court star would be back to play next year.

Steve Kendall received the Fighting Heart award.

Coach E. C. Jenkins recognized Lynxette girls golfer of the year, Betsy Jones.

Coach Morris named Greg Hazlewood outstanding boys golfer.

Coach Shiela Watley noted that only six girls and five boys came out for tennis but lauded them all for their performances.

She named Kyle Beedy and Carey Body for outstanding achievements on the tennis courts.

Net stars, in turn, recognized Coach Watley with a token presentation for the time and effort she had expended on their behalf as well as that of the school in the area of tennis competition.

Coach Kenneth Friemel noted it was truly tough to name an outstanding performer for the rodeo squad since it consisted of only two persons. Halley Reed was named the outstanding star in this field.

While recognizing team captains Sherry Greene and Kenda Burke -- named because there were no seniors for leadership in girls track -- Coach Newton named Jan Davis girls track Lynxette of the year. He noted that, as a freshman performer, she had set a 57.9 time for the 400 meter dash qualifying for state finals. He also noted the all-time record time was 55.

In boys track, Andrew Francis was named Lynx of the Year by Coach James Collinsworth.

This brought the program to the point of the football awards and suspense was keen. As they were named by Head Coach Jimmy Duncan, the audience, by its sincere applause noted its approval of every choice.

David West received the coveted purple helmet plaque for outstanding grade offense; Phil Paul for outstanding grade defense; Ronnie Clark for most improved player and Dayton Edwards the Fighting Heart.

Coach Duncan noted that -- this year -- seven Purple Pride awards had been created and these went to Cheerleaders Valerie Hagerman, Jane Flowers, Stacey Cook, Eadie Clements, Mary Ann Martin, Johnnie Eaton and Lea Ann Gibner.

Kyle Beedy received the prestigious Roger Jones Iron Man award.

The awards suspense over, the audience was treated to an interest of a different vein by the speaker of the evening.

Amarillo Athletic Director John McGuire, introduced by Coach Duncan, harked back to a day when he was "The Coach" without assistants and without speciality.

McGuire joined the Amarillo system as a high school coach in the Fifties and moved up through the years to his present position.

A native of Fayetteville, Ark., he first held coaching positions in Missouri.

McGuire said he felt, as The Coach, his best record was established in basketball. He most enjoyed coaching track. He made the point that, in any game upon any court or field, titles might have been won by "ifs." "If" he could subtract five specific plays from any given game he ever coached, his team would have won.

Since by the rules of any game, this is not possible, he advised the next best approach: to execute every play as though

it was the "if" play and make it count since it could not be subtracted from the record.

He told his audience that athletics is a vital part of the educational program of any school system. He noted a participant does not have to star, win districts, regionals or state -- or any of the awards tendered such as those Monday night, to get the lessons that are to be learned through an athletic program.

Chief of these was the ability to cope with the world and its people and he lauded Spearman for having such a program that its athletes, stars or no, were well equipped to face the world.

The theme of the banquet, "Oceans of Athletes" was carried out from wall masks depicting clever bits of marine life to the place mats that were flirtatious lady whales of varied colors, done by the cheerleaders.

Dining and ceremonies of the evening were under a canopy of vertical ribbons of many colors suspended from the ceiling of the cafeteria which was the banquet hall for the evening's event.

YMCA-Rotary Auction Sunday

For centuries man has speculated, debated, feared or scorned the legendary effect the moon has on his behavior without any absolute conclusions. Thursday night, some 20 Spearman merchants are going to conduct their own experiment offering for two hours only -- 7 to 9 p.m. -- bargains that may not appear again, ever, in the merchandising world. They have dubbed the promotion a "Moonlight Madness Sale."

Truly, however, man's mad-

ness -- or "lunacy" -- is not the issue.

The ability of buyers to recognize that merchants have reduced items to be featured for that two hours, Thursday night, is being put to the test.

As one local merchant said as he submitted copy for the publicity on the event:

"I sell tons of that stuff each year at an established price far above the special Moonlight Madness promotional price I am listing. No matter how much I sell during that two

hours, Thursday night, I feel there are going to be many hating themselves for not making note of the ridiculous figure I am using."

In essence, some of the bargains are offered at up to 100 percent discount -- as in the case of "buy one, get one free!" Other actual discounts range up to 50 percent. Some items will probably go below their cost to the merchant.

Why? Because it is important to every merchant in business in

the community to know how well area shoppers recognize value as a key to future buying and merchandising of products.

The "Moonlight Madness" venture is not a promotion of the advertising media of the community. It was planned and conceived by businesses working in concert with the Spearman Chamber of Commerce. This newspaper is just a medium for exposing the public to the specials.

Termite Swarming Season

Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites. This is the time when winged forms appear and swarm.

If winged termites are seen outdoors, usually there is no problem, since this is a natural occurrence. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home points out Layton Barton, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Termites can cause extensive damage to wooden parts of your home, so take some precautions, advises Barton.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the springtime and can cause some structural damage to wood. However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures. Termites have a broad waist-ants have a narrow, constricted waist; termite wings are the same size and shape-winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads)-ants have elbowed antennae.

Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, old lumber and other sources of termite food. These should be removed. If soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home. Anywhere that wood meets dirt (siding, wooden steps) is a potential spot for termite entry into the home.

Termites also have the ability to build mud tunnels over non-wooden structures to reach a food source, explains Barton. These tunnels (about 1/4-inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete surfaces. On a slab home, these may be seen on foundation concrete between soil and brick. On homes built above the ground, these tunnels can be found on piers or pipes that go from soil to structure. The bath trap in homes built on a slab is another source of

entry. Plumbing in this situation has contact with soil under the slab, and termite tunnels may be found in this area.

Although a thorough inspection is best done by a professional, a homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found, contact a local pest control company. This is one insect pest that should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer," emphasizes Barton. Commercial pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experience to effectively rid a home of termites.

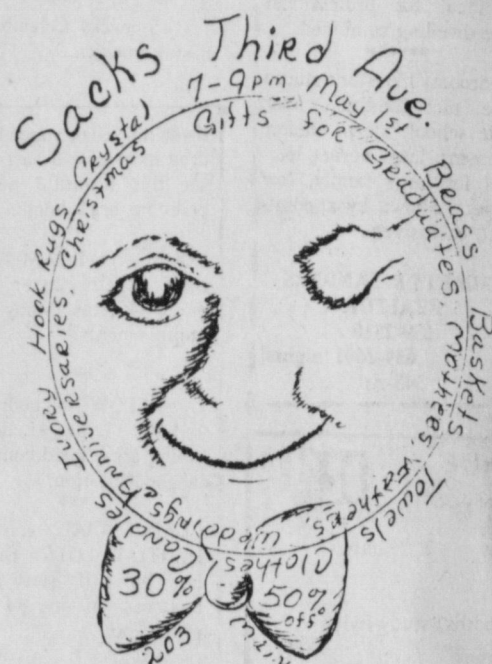

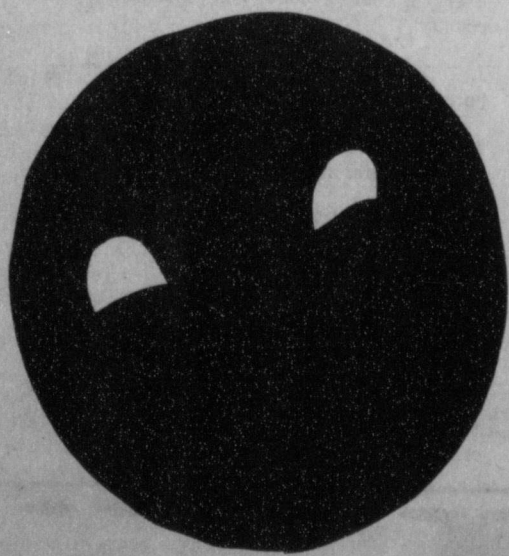

School years are nutritionally important for the child. He is exposed to new food patterns when he begins eating meals away from home.

Group acceptance becomes increasingly important, and food preferences may be influenced by the group to which a child belongs.

An adequate diet is needed throughout the school years to provide building materials for growth and energy for vigorous physical activity. Nutrients, especially protein, are needed to help maintain resistance to infection.

The child is in contact with more persons and chances of exposure to infection are greater. It is also important that the child develop adequate stores of nutrients for the growth and stresses of adolescence.

Many school children are in a hurry and meals may become rushed or irregular. Breakfast, especially, is often skipped or, if eaten, it may be inadequate.

Breakfast really means "breaking a fast" as the body has been without food for 12 hours or more. It is probably the most important meal of the day.

Studies indicate that children who eat breakfast make sharper decisions, become less tired and work and play longer than children who omit breakfast.

A good breakfast should contain a source of vitamin C, a protein food, milk and sufficient other food to supply energy.

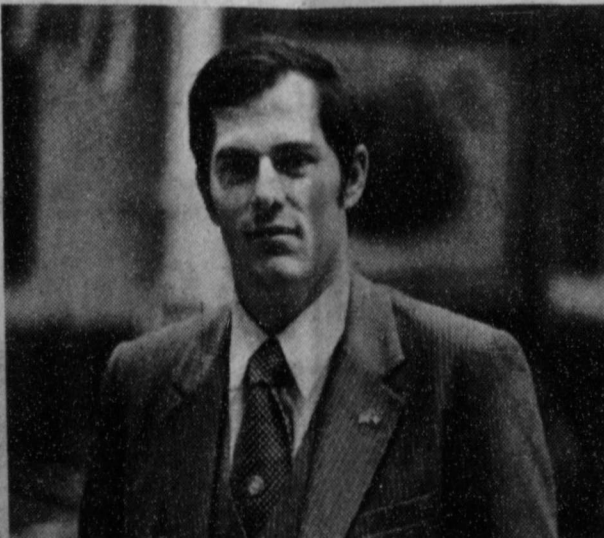

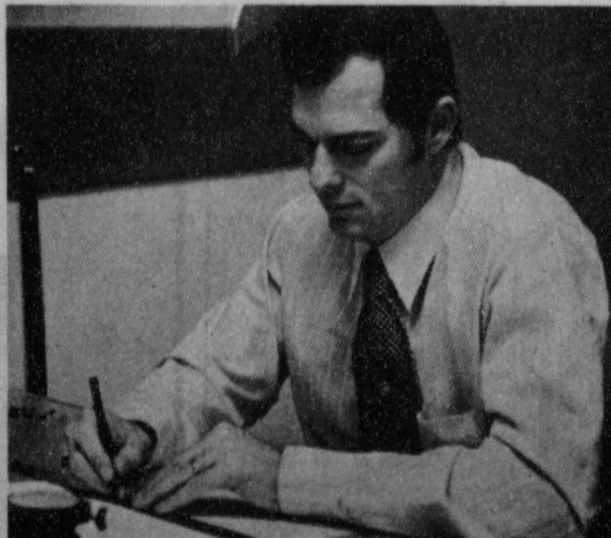

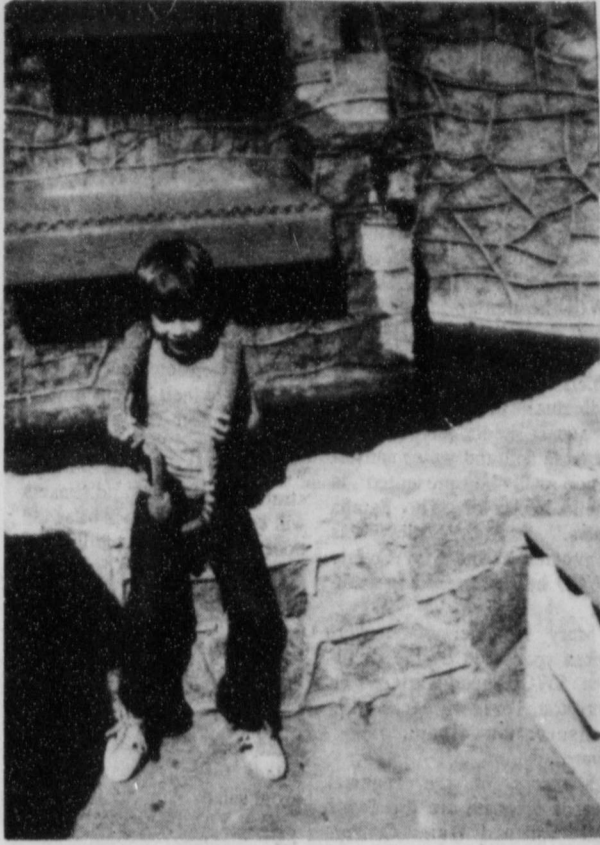

Crop & Livestock Reports Needed

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry-agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for advising farmers and

ranchers. Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics, and Cooperative Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.



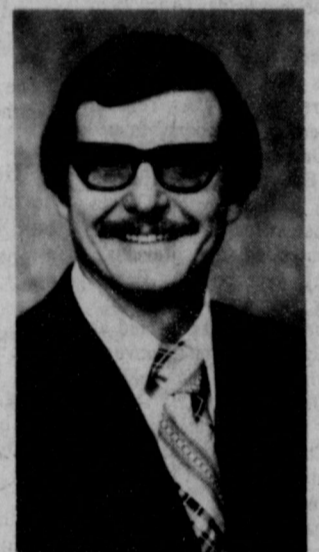

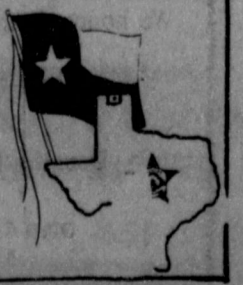

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that IRVING P. KRICK, INC. OF TEXAS, 748 Vella Road, Palm Springs, California 92262, holder of License No. 80-2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of appropriate atmospheric cloud forms or precipitation forms which occur in the troposphere, for and on behalf of Hitch Agri-Business, Inc., P.O. Box 1308, Guyton, Oklahoma 73942. An application will be filed with the Texas Department of Water Resources to conduct a program of weather modification to increase useful precipitation by means of a ground-based silver iodide dispenser network.

- The area in which the dispenser network will be operated includes the Texas Counties of Dallam, Hansford, Moore, Ochiltree, and Sherman.
- The target area includes that portion of Texas County, Oklahoma that is within the rectangular area bounded on the east by a 12-mile north-south line which extends from the State line through Hitchland, Oklahoma to State-highway, No. 3 then to a point seven miles west along the highway, then 12 miles due south to the State line, then seven miles east along the State line to the origin.
- The area adjacent to the target area which may be subject to the effects of the operation are within the State of Oklahoma and in general within 15 to 20 miles of the target area. The maximum intentional effect is in the target, but some downwind effect may occur in Oklahoma mostly to the immediate northeast of the target. There would be no significant intentional effect in Texas from the operation of these dispensers.
- The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are silver iodide electric arc ground-based dispensers that have an output in the range of 1/2 to 2 grams per hour per dispenser.
- The person who will be in charge of the operation is Mr. Donald Chase.
- The period of the operation is expected to begin June 6, 1980 and to end June 6, 1984.
- A Texas Weather Modification License was issued to Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas on April 20, 1972 and has been renewed each year through 1980.

Young readers will take part in activities built around Sports Splash," the theme selected for 1980. The nearly universal interest in sports that range from solitary activities like jogging to team sports like baseball and football gives them appeal for most young readers.

And libraries have books about sports that range from books on how to play the games through biographies of famous players to novels and stories with sports themes.

Most important of all, young Texans who participate will sample the fun of recreational reading. Today's public libraries include a wide range of books and other printed materials for young readers. Summertime is vacation time, but

skills honed by vacation time reading will be sharp for the year ahead.

"One of the most serious problems we face today is the deterioration of reading ability among young people," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library.

"We know, however, that people of all ages who develop the habit of reading for recreation become good readers. Reading is a recreational activity with both immediate and long-term benefits."

In recent years school libraries and learning resource centers have undergone major improvements. As a result many youngsters have developed sophisticated skills in using libraries. The Reading Club encourages them to use these skills and the library materials they find for recreational purposes.

Special activities that encourage regular visits to the library have been planned by James L. and Carol H. Thomas of Den-

ton. He teaches in the North Texas State University School of Library and Information Sciences, and she recently completed a doctorate in special education at the University of Virginia. They are the parents of two sons.

Lee Speaks To Club

Johnny Lee, director of the Palo Duro River Authority, spoke to the Spearman Rotary Club Monday noon in the Garden Room of the Cattleman's Restaurant about imported water. He said that others in the Panhandle are looking to us for us to get our imported water from the Missouri River at St. Joseph, Missouri, which is 400 miles away.

The Corps of Engineers has recently completed a study of the Palo Duro project and the state has completed its second report. They discovered 210 species of birds in the area and fifty-nine species of reptiles and amphibians. Among the endangered species in the area that could possibly slow-up the process are the black footed ferret, the falcon, and the bald eagle. The Corps of Engineers might suspend the project for a few years because according to their report we wouldn't really need to import water until the year 2009. The state report says that we shall need it long before that.

We can get revenue bonds through the state at 6% interest and from the Corps of Engineers for 7 1/2% interest.

Mr. Lee said that it would be at least ten years before water is available for sale to anyone.

This year's water depletion was only two percent and there was a little of recharge on the Palo Duro.

When the dam is built it will cover about 10,000 acres and it will take about two years to

build.

That tragedy is compounded by the fact that eight American servicemen lost their lives.

Had the mission succeeded there would be shouts of jubilation resounding throughout the nation.

It was a perilous, calculated gamble, and I admire the President's strength of character in attempting it.

did not consult with the Congress prior to the operation under provisions of the War Powers Act of 1973. I would brand such protests as a failure to accept reality. As I understand the act it permits the President to act unilaterally, pursuant to his constitutional responsibility to carry out the foreign policy of the United States, in certain situations. I believe this situation fits those provisions of the act. It was a covert action that required the strictest secrecy. The record of Congress in keeping secrets has been less than exemplary.

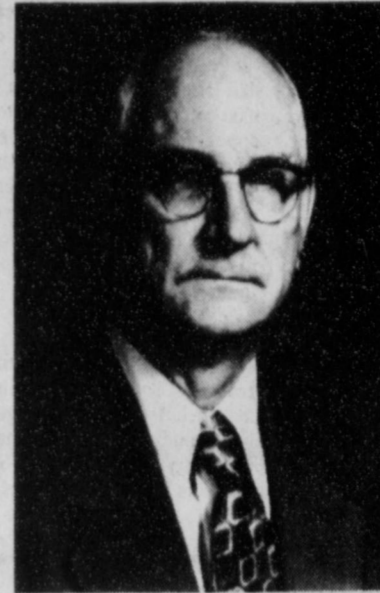

Good Progress On Census Follow-Up

Census District Manager, William E. Soule, reports good progress in this area of the follow-up phase of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. Census takers are following-up on missing census questionnaires by visiting addresses from which householders have

not yet mailed theirs back, as well as telephoning most households from which questionnaires were returned inadequately filled out.

The manager asks householders to welcome these census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in supplying the required census information. But you should always ask to see their official credential before admitting them to your home. It is a red, white, and blue ID card bearing the U.S. Department of Commerce seal.

The manager stressed that, because the count of the Nation's population was to be for one day, April 1, everyone who was in the household on that day should be listed on the questionnaire, but not anyone who has moved in since.

"The information given the Census Bureau cannot be used to identify anyone in any way at all," the manager said. "Facts about individuals are lumped together to arrive at statistical totals, averages, and percentages, figures in which no one can be identified."

Census Bureau Mopping Up

Census takers are making their rounds in this area, calling at households which have not mailed back their 1980 census questionnaires. They are making telephone calls at most households which have mailed back incompletely filled out questionnaires.

William R. Soule, Manager of the district office, says the round-up should be completed in the next few weeks.

"You can easily tell if someone who knocks on your door is a census taker," the manager advises. "We all wear red, white, and blue identification cards with the U.S. Department of Commerce seal and 'Census Enumerator, Official Credential' printed on them, and each bears the wearer's signature.

Census takers also carry large portfolios boldly lettered 'U.S. Census - 1980' against a red, white, and blue background. The portfolios contain maps, questionnaires, and other supplies."

Householders should promptly report to the police anyone who claims to be a census taker but cannot produce this identification.

Note: Washington D.C. reports a national average of 85% for completed, returned questionnaires. Our District Office has an 86.1% average.

City Council Meet, Public Forum Set on New Airport

Spearman shares one thing in common with every other city, large or small in the world:

It lies at the bottom of a vast sea of air.

--This fact was not evident until man began to fly. Now, with argosies of the air, great and small, Spearman is only a few hours from any other point on earth--any other city at the bottom of this vast sea of air.

So, every city needs to establish itself by facilities and operation as such a port.

To this end, civic leaders have proposed to build such a facility through the issuance of certificates of obligation.

Advantages are communication (mail), time-savings (business or pleasure), outreach in medical emergency and flying for pleasure. All these are for "home folks."

Argonauts of the air from other places bring loved ones, new industry -- and particularly, new money. Local payrolls are important but the money is only recirculated. Air passengers halting for business, visits or fuel only, unload new money to join the circulation.

New business and industry considering a site today, looks at two things: schools and airport facilities.

Spearman has schools. Spearman needs an airport.

We have one? Not so. It is being phased out for danger and lack of adequate facilities by the government

agency that rules on such things. Certainly, no one questions the concern with safety. The concern that Spearman have an airport has been questioned. Hopefully, these will be answered at the specially called public meeting Thursday night.

Reasons of speed, profit and pleasure have been cited. Do not count the latter an extravagance. Sporting schedules are set. Putting greens are filled. There is hardly a place to shoot for sport or pleasure anymore. For the young people of this era, vast reaches of sky offer a place to spread wings literally. They will do it even if they have to leave the home place.

For you who have longed to reach a loved one in the terminal throes of illness; or wished you could be the first on the spot to consummate a profitable business deal -- or if you have wanted a new business for your home community for profit and for a future for young people growing up here. . .

--Then an airport is your concern.

Building such a facility with certificates of obligation rather than a bond issue had money savings only for motivation.

Hiring a bond consulting firm, garnering a bond rating out of New York and conducting an election amounts to an exorbitant expense.

When it is over, there is no guarantee who will purchase the bonds.

With certificates of obligation, the contractor can retain them or dispose of them. Such disposal would see them absorbed locally.

Most of the opposition has been because people feel they had no voice in the matter. Conversely, civic leaders feel they did because they elected them to office delegating trust to act as seemed best in the interests of the city and its people.

Still, the people do have opportunity for voice. It takes only five per cent of the qualified voters -- in this case some 82 people -- to petition for a referendum.

If a referendum comes, construction would be delayed. Current contractual figures are not guaranteed because of inflation. Should a referendum favor an airport -- and the fire station, which is tied to the issuance of certificates of obligation (see separate story) -- it would certainly be a higher cost. It would also penalize us in other areas, too, according to City Manager Jim Murray.

"In the past, our projects have drawn a dearth of contractors. On this project, we have drawn seven," Murray

stated. "One advantage to this is that more competition creates lower costs to the city.

"Too, we have finally created an image of a progressive people and attracted Amarillo contractors north of the river. We could lose this advantage and create higher costs for other contract projects in the future."

Another fact lying almost unmentioned is that the industrial development group supplying land for the airport has virtually underwritten the certificates of obligation as important to the further development of the industrial complex. Such an agreement in writing may be executed at the Tuesday night city meeting which had not been when this was written.

Fire Station Is In Discussion

Questions and confusion regarding construction of a new fire station have almost been lost in the voiced discussion of financing the new airport with certificates of obligation.

However, since the greatest opposition comes from lack of a voice by the people and since certificates of obligation would also finance the fire station, the issue being highlighted this week involves both.

Aside from the ongoing discussion of financing, in the case of the fire station, other questions have arisen. To get the answers the REPORTER went to City Manager Jim Murray.

"The proposed location was made because the city owns property there and it represents a savings as well as convenience," Murray answered one question.

To another, he said: The new fire station will not be a turn-key job. It will be

complete and functional so far as the total building and the apparatus room is concerned. The remainder of the interior, rest rooms, and other rooms and facilities will be finished by volunteer labor -- chiefly from fire and ambulance personnel."

Murray went on to explain that the cost of having a contractor complete the interior averages \$37 per square foot. In the case of the fire station, this would amount to \$51,800. He noted that while many items and materials have been given to the new fire facility, there would be some cost but nowhere near \$50,000.

Along with construction of the airport, the building of the new fire station is subject of a Tuesday night city council meeting and a Thursday night public forum to discuss and communicate in an effort to bring understanding to the issues at hand regarding such construction proposals.

Neighbor Bob Williams has an oil well on some property he has in Kansas and for several years it has paid him a welcome monthly royalty check that lately has been running \$664.56.

Bob called about breakfast time one morning this week, well tired. His check for March had come with a notation: "Please note that the new 'windfall profit tax' has been withheld from this check . . ."

The windfall profit tax went into effect March 1. Bob's check for March was \$432.69. The "WFPT Tax Deducted" was \$231.78.

Bob talked to the oil company, a major, that has the well on his place and got the formula for the tax. It didn't help much, only now he understands what is happening.

To arrive at the tax, the federal government first exempts the price that oil was selling for on Dec. 31, 1978 -- in Bob's case, \$13 a barrel. The windfall tax takes 60 percent of the amount above the \$13 that oil is selling for now.

The market today is about \$40 a barrel, a gain of some \$27 per barrel. This translates to \$16.20 a barrel for the Internal Revenue Service, \$10.80 for the oil seller.

If the well had been owned by an independent oil company, the windfall tax would have been only 30 percent of the price gain since Dec. 31, 1978. If the well had just been drilled, was "new" oil, the tax also would be 30 percent of the gain in market price.

Bob's well is owned by a major oil company and it is "old" oil. The fact that he qualifies for the highest tax all around doesn't help friend Williams' outlook, which already was frayed by the \$231.78. Bob tends to be a little short fussed about Jimmy Carter anyway.

The oil companies, of course, will put the windfall tax they pay back into the price of oil and gasoline which means that the consumer will pay it, in the nature of an excise tax. But the royalty owner has no product from which to recover -- and he also is a consumer.

This thing of having a well pumping on your acres isn't what it once was. But then, more and more, what is?

Dumas Rotary Sponsoring Races


