

First Baptist Church Celebrating

in a series of articles reflecting the past 60 years of the First Baptist Church. The church is celebrating its 60th anniversary during June. Articles bringing the history up to date will appear in later issues.

The toll of many passing years has greatly obscured the beginning of the institution we now know as the First Baptist Church of Spearman.

However, from early records, we can assume that if history had followed its logical course, the Church would have been the First Baptist Church of Hansford, a town which had been established in 1887 about six miles west of the present city of

However, the officials of the Santa Fe railroad tipped the scales by routing a railway cast of Hansford in 1919. The

residents of Hansford moved their homes and business buildings to the new site to form the city named Spearman in honor of Thomas E. Spearman, a Santa Fe official.

Spearman had sought out one nother and decided that the time was right to form a church.

By 1920 the Baptists living in

On March 14, 1920 the First Baptist Church, Spearman came into being with eleven members. These charter members were: Mr. and Mrs. H. E. James, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Burrow, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Barbour, Herman Barbour, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Black, Mrs. Eva Wilbanks, and Henry Waldrop. The Church was organized under the declaration and covenant of Pendleton's Church Manual, and a petition was esented to the Trans-Canad-Association for member-

ship. The first trustees named were A. E. James, E. H. Barbour, W. A. Burrow, and A.

On July 4, 1920, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Barran and Bernice Barran were received as members; followed on July 25 by Mrs. Fred Brandt, Mrs. R. L. McClellan, Miss Ethel Deakin, Albert Burrow, and Mrs. Tom Burgess, the Church's first candidate for baptism. The last

Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Raney, Lura Bell Raney, and a Mrs. Turner. Thus the church concluded its first year with twenty three

In this same year, the Townsite company gave the Church three lots with the provision that a building be put on them within two years. Accordingly,

Research News Report

Bushland--Many wheat fields have thin stands in the Southern Great Plains, especially in western parts of the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles. Recent rains put new life in these fields and the potential for a worthwhile crop is good. Ten to 20 bushel-per-acre yields are a possibility in some fields.

Dr. Frank Petr, Texas Agri-

cultural Extension Service Agronomist at Amarillo, warns that rains which started wheat growing also germinated a crop of weeds in the spots not occupied by wheat. Petr says 'The weeds do not look like much now, but they will cause serious problems at harvest." "In fact, if rain delays harvest, many fields will be too weedy to cut," he continued. Large weeds are hard on combines and green parts of weeds make grain difficult to store. Weeds slow down combines and it takes more time to cut weedy fields than weed-free fields. This delay increases harvesting cost and chances of loss from

Dr. Allen Wiese, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Weed Researcher at Bushland. says a few farmers are aware of the problem. "In fact I get the following question on the phone a dozen times a day" he said. "When should I spray my thin

wheat that is full of weeds?" The answer is the same for kochia, Russian thistle, pigweed and field bindweed according to the researcher. As soon as the grain gets into soft dough, spray 1 pound per acre of an ester formulation of 2,4-D. This year soft dough will come about the middle of June because most fields are a little

Wiese stresses that getting the spray on immediately at soft dough is critical because it takes two weeks for 2,4-D to knock down large weeds. If spraying is delayed, weeds will not be dead when wheat is ready to harvest.

Presently 2,4-D is the only herbicide labeled for the job of killing weeds in small grain just prior to harvest. Using other products could cause illegal residues on the grain. Straw from treated fields should not be used for forage according to the researcher.

Dr. Petr says "Many people are considering using a no-tillage system in a rotation of wheat to sorghum." "Killing weeds in wheat fields before harvest is the first step in the program," he explained. Big weeds in the field after harvest can not be killed with herbicides and plowing would be neces-sary. Killing weeds before harvest will prevent this operat

ion. After harvest of a clean field, one pound per acre of 2,4-D sprayed with three pounds per acre active ingredient of atrazine will eliminate weeds as well as plowing until sorghum planting in 1981, according to Petr.

Wiese pointed out that proper use of 2,4-D to kill weeds growing in wheat fields will pay big dividends. "In many cases it will make the difference between harvesting a good crop or not harvesting at all," he

Inflation has its gripon every citizen of the United States. What is the reason the nation finds itself confronted by galloping inflation? The nation has no earning power due to a cheap raw material policy.

Money can be introduced into the economy by any one of three ways. It can be printed with nothing of value in reserve. It can be borrowed. Borrowed money must be repaid with interest. It can be earned. Only earned money is not inflationary

Since 1977 agriculture commodities have been printed at levels below production costs thereby denying agriculture producers a profit. Without a profit farmers have not purchasing power. There is no money to buy the services and manufactured goods of urban America. Each time a farmer plants a seed the possibility exists for new earned income to enter the national treasury. This new wealth, free and God-given, becomes available for all segments of the economy and owes no interest. Money that is neither printed nor owed guarantees economic prosperity for all resulting in a general decline in the inflation rate. A simple comparison is that of the hand water pump. The pump has to be primed before the water begins to flow. Agriculture commodities comprise 70% of the nation's earning power. When denied a profit, the nation is denied the free wealth necessary to prime the national

In the 1920's and again in 1976 women led the way to Washington to proclaim to Congress that an economic depression would follow the agricultural depression. The same conditions exist today that prefaced the Crash of '29.

A recent commencement speaker in Lubbock, Texas, theorized that personal freedom is directly dependent on economic freedom. The loss of our nation's earning power is surely to cost us our personal freedom. Sincerely.

WTSU Scholarships Available

The Politicial Science Department at West Texas State University has received a grant from the Texas Bureau for Economic Understanding to conduct a special summer pro-gram which will deal with the free enterprise system, announced Dr. Roy E. Thoman, Director of TBEU Summer Scholarship Program.

This 6-hour, graduate level program, designed mainly for social studies teachers, will be offered during the 1980 second summer term. There are approximately 30 scholarships to award. 

the first of several structures that was to house the congregation was purchased for \$250 and erected. This was a crude. tar paper building called "The Shack" by the members. This building eventually fell into such disrepair that it was torn down and the material in it was incorporated into another building called "The Tabernacle." which in turn was destroyed by windstorm. Following this, the Church met first with the Presbyterians and then in the school auditorium until a basement structure was completed in 1927. This structure was conceived to be the foundation of a subsequent building, but was found to be of inadequate size. Evangelist B. B. Crimm aroused some ire among the congregation when, during a revival, he referred to their basement sanctuary as "a hole in the ground." The basement was used until 1947, when the

constructed. Until 1928, the Church had no

present main building was

regular pastor, but was served from time to time by Bro. Tubbs and Bro. Younger. In 1923 the Church called its first pastor, Bro. W. E. Hand, who agreed to serve half time at a salary of \$75 a month.

> In 1926, Rev. A. W. Fetchner accepted the pastorate and served for about six months.

Bro. J. H. Richards came to Spearman in 1927 to hold a revival and was subsequently called as pastor. During his first year as pastor, the basement was completed and the Baptist moved into their own Church. Under his guidance the Church grew from 42 to 300

The Church called Bro. A. F. Loftin as pastor, June 1, 1933 and he remained for five years. Something of the hardships of the times is indicated in the church minutes that note that Bro. Loftin's salary was raised from \$64 to \$80 per month. The Church was most fortunate to have the Loftins return to Spearman upon his retirement. He made many contributions to A ground breaking ceremony the life of the Church until his

death in 19. Mrs. Loftin is still very faithful in teaching the Fidelis Sunday School Class.

Bro. Matthew Doyle assumed pastoral duties on August 1, 1938. By this time the Church was aware of a keen need to launch a building program and by February, 1943 the records show that \$2,375 had been raised and \$1,100 in bonds had been purchased.

The actual building program

remained to be carried out under the leadership of Bro. Sam Malone who accepted the Church's call December 10, 1944. On January 14, 1945 W. M. Glover, Carl E. Hutchison and Ed Hutton were appointed to draw up building plans. A finance committee composed of Rex Sanders, Joe Hatton, Fred Hoskins, Wesley Garnett, Everett Vanderburg, Ray Moore, C. A. Castleman and T. R. Shirley was named. Church purchased the three lots joining the older property and the architectural firm of Riten-

berry and Son was contracted.

was held in the fall of 1945. By

1947 all the brick work was completed, and August 1, 1947 a homecoming and corner stone laying service was held. Finally in May 1948, the congregation moved from the old basement building into its new quarters. The first service held was the Baccalaureate for the graduating class of 1948.

Following this very fruitful ministry, Bro. Malone resigned September 1, 1948, Bro. A. F. Loftin was invited to serve as interim pastor. Bro. Ray Stevens was profer-

red a call September 19, 1948 and served as pastor for two years. During this time the entire indebtedness of the church was retired, and a note burning ceremony was held November 26, 1950 during Bro. Stevens' last service here. Bro. Stevens resigned to re-enter military service as a Chaplain. He sacrificed his life several months later in an attempt to save a soldier from drowning.

The next pastor to come to the Church was W. B. Greene and he served from January 21, 1951 to November 28, 1951.

Bro. O. L. Bryant was extended a call January 20, 1952. Under his leadership, the church prospered and experienced a growth that led to the construction of the two story air conditioned educational unit now in use. This building was occupied October 4, 1959. Bro. Bryant resigned May 1961 and moved to a church in Houston

where he is still serving. Bro. Luther Berry moved on the field as pastor August, 1961. He resigned November 1966 to move to his present work in Derby, Kansas.

The Church called Bro. B. T. Shoemake March, 1967. The early roster of deacons is

somewhat uncertain but the following men apparently served at various times up to 1943: Charles Collard, 1922; Harvey Wilcox, 1923; Fred Hoskins, 1926; Otis Parker, 1926; Melvin Jackson, 1927; Dwight Holland, 1928; Ed Read, 1928; Edd Howerton, 1928; L. W. Austin, 1930; Carl Hutchison, 1934; C. A. Castleman, 1934. At one time, only Carl Hutchison, Fred
