The winning escort couple was Melanie Hutton and John Sterling.

Presentation of the escorts was first on the program, Saturday night, and it was a tough act to follow. Each member of the escort couples had his or her own personality and way of expressing it while in pairs each couple had a charisma of its own that made decisions difficult.

Interludes between the "count-down" appearances of the Miss Hansford County candidates were filled with appearances of the entire company of escort couples and the songs of Mistress of Ceremonies Debra Clawson.

As a chorus, the escorts sang "Ma, He's Making Eyes At Me" and their next appearance was with Miss Clawson singing "Happiness Is."

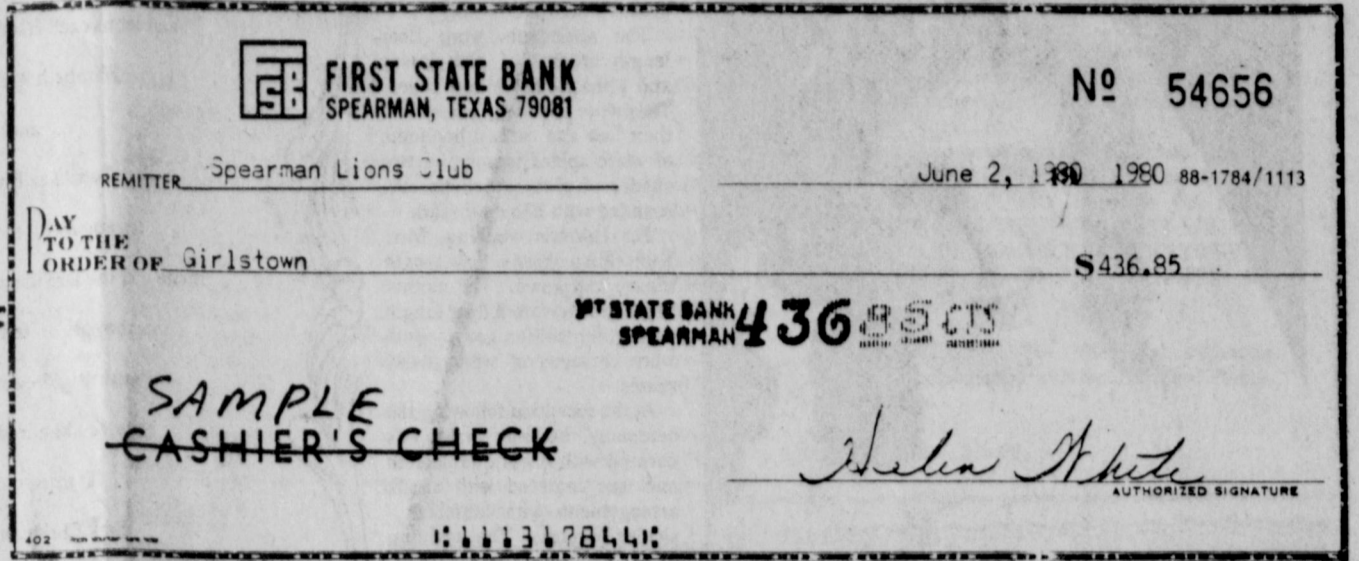
The entire company of Miss Hansford County candidates appeared first in sports attire then in formal wear. Five were selected as finalists and from that number came the queen and the runners-up.

The record crowd filled the high school auditorium with very few seats vacant. At one point the mistress of ceremonies noted the event had come a long way from the first one when Miss Hansford County was crowned on horseback at the rodeo grounds.

Just prior to announcing both the escort and the pageant winners, Miss Hansford County, 1979 was introduced and shared the experiences of her reign with the audience. She is Jennifer McLain and at one point, she exhibited the poise and aplomb expected of a queen when the escort winners were brought on stage. The four-year olds were, like all winners, in a state of shock and Miss McLain moved out on stage to them and guided them through the ceremonial routine winners must master.

Float of Baker-Taylor Women Wins

The 1980 Hansford Roundup parade moved in bright sunshine, led by J. D. Wilbanks' steam machine just behind the advance police escort and these were followed by a potpourri of floats, antique cars and a variety of units built around that marvel of the ages, the Wheel.

Record crowds of young and old lined the parade route then gravitated to either one of two locations for the most part.

The "Old Folks" -- set up at Joe Trayler Ford on Main Street -- had registered 51 people when they started serving a buffet luncheon. Mrs. Jessie Tompkins, 94, was the oldest registered at that point. At the time of the Reporter's visit, she had moved on to the senior citizen center but eating with the Old Folks was Gwenfred Lackey, 85, who is the oldest living person born in Hansford County and still living in Hansford County.

The oldsters were neither embarrassed by their Old Folks sobriquet nor less spry for having qualified for it. They had a cool spacious location for their buffet lunch and a ringside seat to the "goings on" on the courthouse lawn just across the street that was out of wind and sun.

While a barbeque lunch was served and eaten in the shady places of the courthouse lawn, a variety show was taking place. This displayed a variety of talent while the area was fringed by the antique cars, Wilbanks' steam engine and related activities by the Fire Department and by members of the National Guard who took youngsters for a ride in the great, rumbling, olive drab tank.

As a part of the "feed" on the courthouse lawn, Saturday, local Lions sold ice cream for the benefit of Girls Town of Borger which recently experienced a destructive fire.

Result of the "big dipping" was a hefty check for \$436.85 for Girls Town.

No competition was listed for the antique cars but there were some fine specimens including an ancient Chevrolet "C" cab pickup. There were two "Chevy" touring cars, a '28 Model A Ford coupe, a '28 "A" four-door sedan with the expandable equipment trunk open and carrying another antique storage trunk, a '29 "A" cabriolet and a '30 "A" roadster with weld fenders.

Not so old but certainly of great interest for a number of reasons was a '38 Pontiac coupe. First interest created by this unit was that it was in original condition with some

sprucing up rather than a restoration project. Under the "turtle" was the remnants of a red rubber inner tube that made a certain age group of men recall rubber guns and ni -- oops! -- afro-American shooters. The proud owner of this vehicle said the inner tube was still in the left rear tire when he had the first flat after acquiring the car.

In the pre World War II era, Pontiac was forthrightly termed the General Motors experimental car and this 1938 model was the first of current production vehicles to have the gear shift lever on the steering post. Some experimental models of makes demised in the 30s had such a set-up in the early days of automobilia but, the '38 Pontiac was a high-production first in the "most-on-the-post" era.

Baker-Taylor women took first prize for their float, "Happiness is a Rainbow." First Baptist Church youth with their entry, "Happiness is the Lord" garnered a second place trophy while the Gladiola Flower Club was the third place winner with "Happiness is a Family."

There was only one wagon entry but it was superb, the pride of J. W. and Dorothy Jines.

In division one of the bicycle competition, April Wilkerson was first; Dederid Pearson, second and David Coates, third.

In division two, Cindy Melton was first; Sharon Thomas, second and Clara Gonzolas, third.

Billy Watts had the winning mount in the horse showing competition followed by the cayuse of Steven Tindell in second and Clint Schnell in third.

The Old Fiddlers Contest was a joy to those who thought "Old Rosin' the Bow" was dying out. There were young men a'comin' but the veterans held sway. In the competition for those 65 years and over, C. E. "Shorty" Loter of Wheeler was first followed by Joe Storey, Perryton and James Sparks of Spearman. For those under 65 years, Spearman's Smokey Mayfield copped a first followed by David Norris, Hartley; R. C. Burkhalter, Perryton; Ray David, Clarendon and Roger Gibson, Perryton in that order of judging.

Both the directors of the Hansford Roundup celebration this year and the visitors who enjoyed it, declared it the biggest and best yet to date.

"Miss Hansford County" and the winning escorts are covered in a separate story.

First Baptist Church Celebrating Anniversary

Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles reflecting the past 60 years of the First Baptist Church. The church is celebrating its 60th anniversary during June. Articles bringing the history up to date will appear in later issues.

The toll of many passing years has greatly obscured the beginning of the institution we now know as the First Baptist Church of Spearman.

However, from early records, we can assume that if history had followed its logical course, the Church would have been the First Baptist Church of Hansford, a town which had been established in 1887 about six miles west of the present city of Spearman.

However, the officials of the Santa Fe railroad tipped the scales by routing a railway east of Hansford in 1919. The

residents of Hansford moved their homes and business buildings to the new site to form the city named Spearman in honor of Thomas E. Spearman, a Santa Fe official.

By 1920 the Baptists living in Spearman had sought out one another and decided that the time was right to form a church.

On March 14, 1920 the First Baptist Church, Spearman came into being with eleven

members. These charter members were: Mr. and Mrs. H. E. James, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Burrow, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Barbour, Herman Barbour, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Black, Mrs. Eva Wilbanks, and Henry Waldrop. The Church was organized under the declaration and covenant of Pendleton's Church Manual, and a petition was presented to the Trans-Canadian Association for member-

ship. The first trustees named were A. E. James, E. H. Barbour, W. A. Burrow, and A. M. Black.

On July 4, 1920, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Barran and Bernice Barran were received as members; followed on July 25 by Mrs. Fred Brandt, Mrs. R. L. McClellan, Miss Ethel Deakin, Albert Burrow, and Mrs. Tom Burgess, the Church's first candidate for baptism. The last

members to join in 1920 were Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Raney, Lura Bell Raney, and a Mrs. Turner. Thus the church concluded its first year with twenty three members.

In this same year, the Town-site company gave the Church three lots with the provision that a building be put on them within two years. Accordingly,

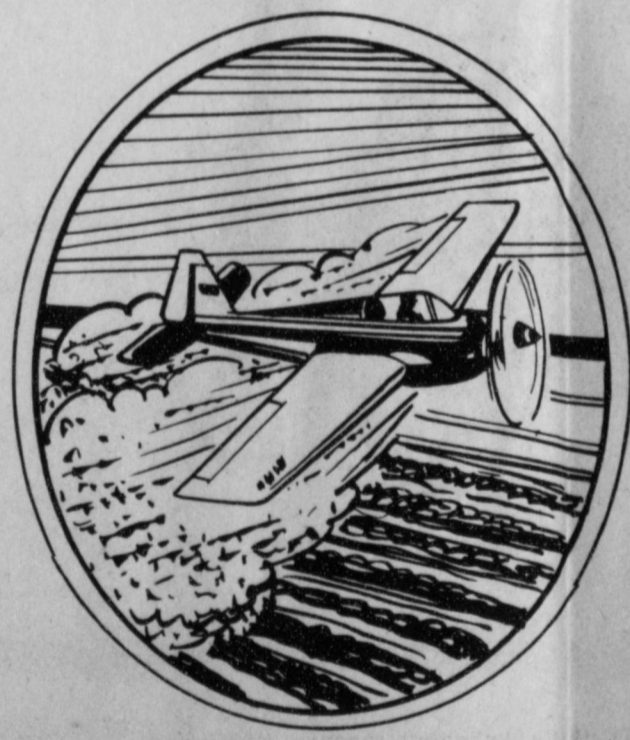

Myrna Biggers gave an interesting program on the latest household hints. Roll call was also answered with favorite hints.

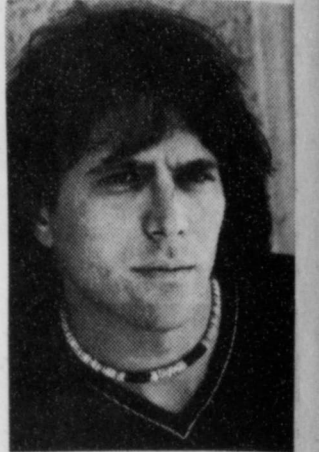

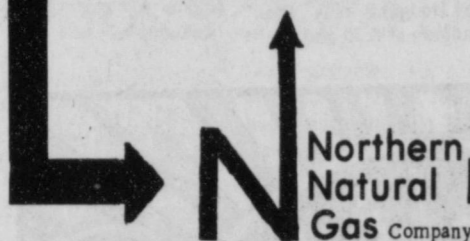

Research News Report

Bushland—Many wheat fields have thin stands in the Southern Great Plains, especially in western parts of the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles. Recent rains put new life in these fields and the potential for a worthwhile crop is good. Ten to 20 bushel-per-acre yields are a possibility in some fields.

Dr. Frank Petr, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Agronomist at Amarillo, warns that rains which started wheat growing also germinated a crop of weeds in the spots not occupied by wheat. Petr says "The weeds do not look like much now, but they will cause serious problems at harvest."

Wiese pointed out that proper use of 2,4-D to kill weeds growing in wheat fields will pay big dividends. "In many cases it will make the difference between harvesting a good crop or not harvesting at all," he said.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Inflation has its grip on every citizen of the United States. What is the reason the nation finds itself confronted by galloping inflation? The nation has no earning power due to a cheap raw material policy.

Money can be introduced into the economy by any one of three ways. It can be printed with nothing of value in reserve. It can be borrowed. Borrowed money must be repaid with interest. It can be earned. Only earned money is not inflationary money.

Since 1977 agriculture commodities have been printed at levels below production costs thereby denying agriculture producers a profit. Without a profit farmers have not purchasing power. There is no money to buy the services and manufactured goods of urban America. Each time a farmer plants a seed the possibility exists for new earned income to enter the national treasury. This new wealth, free and God-given, becomes available for all segments of the economy and owes no interest. Money that is neither printed nor owed guarantees economic prosperity for all resulting in a general decline in the inflation rate. A simple comparison is that of the hand water pump. The pump has to be primed before the water begins to flow. Agriculture commodities comprise 70% of the nation's earning power. When denied a profit, the nation is denied the free wealth necessary to prime the national economy.

In the 1920's and again in 1976 women led the way to Washington to proclaim to Congress that an economic depression would follow the agricultural depression. The same conditions exist today that prefaced the Crash of '29.

A recent commencement speaker in Lubbock, Texas, theorized that personal freedom is directly dependent on economic freedom. The loss of our nation's earning power is surely to cost us our personal freedom.

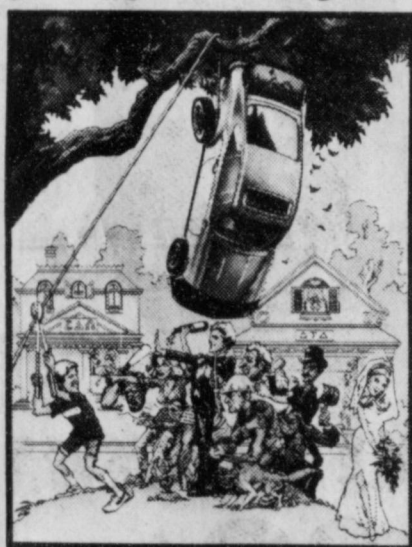

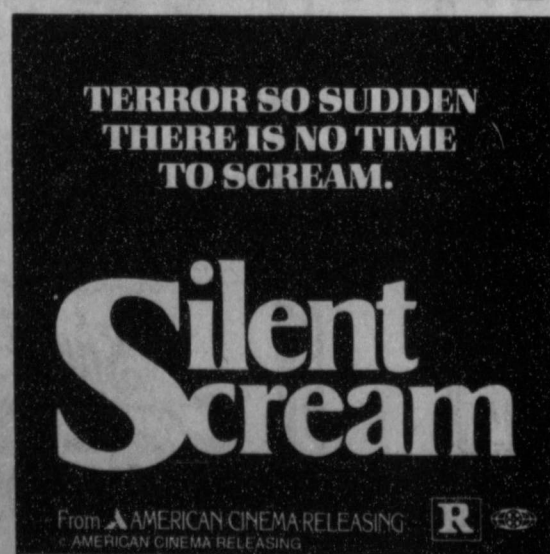

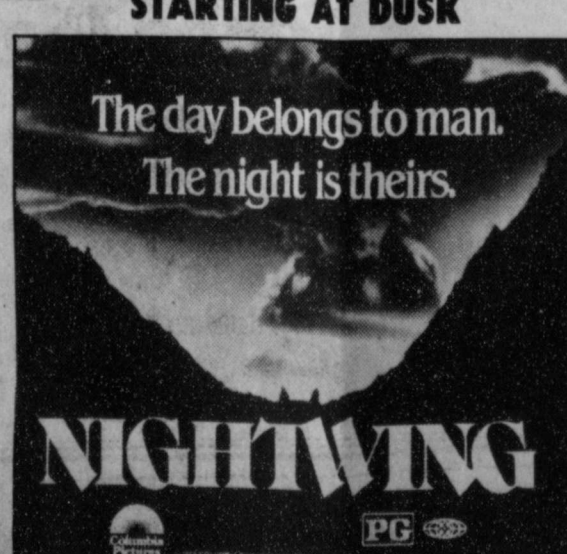
