December 13 (FHTNC)--Navy Electrician's Mate 3rd Class William D. Byrd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Preston H. Byrd of 508 S. Bernice, Spearman, Texas, recently visited Mombasa, Kenya.

He is a crewmember aboard the frigate USS Stein. His ship is homeported in San Diego and currently operating as a unit of the U.S. 7th Fleet in the Indian Ocean.

He and his shipmates visited Mombasa during a five-day port call. During the remainder of the cruise, the Stein is scheduled to participate in training exercises with other 7th Fleet units and with ships of allied nations. Additional port visits are scheduled in African and Middle Eastern countries.

The Stein is a 438-foot long "Knox" class frigate with a crew of 283. Equipped with guns, missiles and rockets, she can operate independently or as part of a naval task force. She is also outfitted with a landing platform and normally carries a light helicopter for long range detection and attack of submarines.

A 1975 graduate of Spearman High School, Byrd joined the Navy in August 1975.

A special city council meeting was held Friday afternoon, December 21 to discuss the fallen building of White Auto on Main Street. After the open meeting discussion of the demolition of the building, the council went into executive session, with results of this session to be released at a later date.

Vocational Agriculture Coming to Panhandle State

The Oklahoma Panhandle is referred to as the "World's Greatest Agriculture Laboratory for Students" because of the large feedlots, major meat packing plants, irrigation, and leading counties in the harvest of wheat, grain sorghum, and corn.

Panhandle State presently operates the University farm, composed of a 960-acre tract of land and a 1200 acre range unit, which is maintained and operated primarily as a livestock and farming laboratory. A major portion of the farmland is irrigated, four wells being located on the premises. Various grain and forage crops are produced and used to maintain rather extensive purebred herds of Hereford and Angus beef cattle; Holstein and other dairy cattle; Duroc and Yorkshire swine; and flocks of Hampshire, Columbia, and Suffolk sheep. A registered herd of Quarter Horses is also maintained for instruction and in artificial breeding. The animals themselves are used extensively in various ways in laboratory work. Meat produced in large quantities is used in laboratory work and is consumed in the university cafeteria.

New and approved practices of crop and livestock production and management are employed. Argonomy of animal science majors who accept student employment on the farm have an opportunity to acquire practical experience in the various phases of agriculture.

The Panhandle Agricultural Research Station is devoted specifically to the solution of agricultural problems peculiar to the high-plains area. The work of the research station is essentially a public service designed to save the farmer and rancher the expense of private experimentation in the field, range, and feedlot. The Panhandle Agricultural Research Station is a cooperative effort involving Panhandle State University and Oklahoma State University. It is an integral part of the Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station and is one of the many field laboratories.

Panhandle State sponsors outstanding livestock and meats judging teams, conducts the state's oldest performance tested bull station, conducts feedlot research projects for area feedlot and chemical companies, and the only Crop Hail research

A Bachelor of Science degree in Vocation Agriculture Education has been conditionally approved by the Board of Regents of Higher Education for Panhandle State University. The state regents will make a final decision in June so the program can start the fall term of 1980. The OSU-A&M Regents had previously approved Panhandle State's request in April, 1979.

"When the new plan is fully implemented, Panhandle State University will become the second institution of higher education in the state to offer certification for high school vocational agricultural instructors," according to Panhandle State president Dr. Tom Palmer.

Oklahoma State University offers the only other degree plan in the state leading to high school vocational agriculture certification.

"Oklahoma and much of the rest of the nation are currently experiencing a shortage of qualified secondary agriculture instructors," said Milt England, Professor and Head of Animal Science. He says almost 2,000 Oklahoma high school students interested in enrolling in vocational agriculture were unable to do so last year because of inadequate supplies of qualified instructors.

Panhandle State's "close relationship with the five state area high school agriculture in the past" should insure a successful agricultural education program for the area, he adds.

"The 278-mile distance from OSU discourages many students who are interested in agricultural education. This will also be an asset to out-of-state students because Kansas State, Colorado State, New Mexico State, and Texas A&M offer their vocational agriculture program and they are as far or further than OSU," England explains. For many, Panhandle State is more conveniently located than over university vocational agriculture programs.

Palmer says he believes the new Panhandle State plan, which leads to a bachelor of science degree, will also enhance graduate programs at OSU since some of those who receive undergraduate degrees at Panhandle State would transfer to Stillwater to earn graduate degrees.

on Grain Sorghum in the United States.

The agriculture department offers a degree in Animal Science with five options; Production, Feedlot Management, Nutrition, Meats, Breeding, and Business, and a degree in Agronomy with five options; Soil Science, Crop Science, Business, General Agronomy, and Crop Insurance. The agriculture department also takes advantage of the area feedlots and meat packing plants with their classes. In addition, a B.S. degree is offered in Agri-Business and a two-year certificate offered in Farm and Ranch Management.

Panhandle State University is governed by the Board of Regents for Oklahoma State University and Agricultural and Mechanical Colleges.

The Politics of Education, Three semester hours credit, Monday, 4:45-7:10 p.m., 127 Hamilton Hall. Activities of schools as they relate to the political environment; e.g., voter behavior, change strategies, community power structures.

Income tax packages mailed

Approximately 156,785 Federal tax packages are on their way to Panhandle taxpayers this week. The IRS sends taxpayers either a 1040 or 1040A package, depending on the form the taxpayer filed last year. Taxpayers who need to file a different form this year because of a change in tax status, can pick up the proper form and schedules from their local IRS office, or from one of many post offices which stock them. Extra forms are also available by using the order blank in the back of the tax package.

Whether taxpayers use the form the IRS sends them, or order a different one, the IRS encourages use of both the peel-off label and pre-addressed, coded, return envelope provided in the originally mailed tax package. If used, both the label and envelope speed up processing the return, lessen the chance of making mistakes, and produce a faster refund for the taxpayer.

The peel-off label, which should be placed at the top of the return, contains the name, address and Social Security number of the taxpayer and, like the return envelope, is specially-coded to speed up the sorting process.

If there is a mistake on the label, or if the envelope is marked with the incorrect form number, the IRS said the taxpayer should simply make necessary changes in ink.

The step-by-step and more spacious format of the tax forms, retained from last year, should make it possible for most taxpayers to complete their returns with the aid of their instructions, according to the IRS. The instructions take the taxpayer through each step of return completion and are number-coded to correspond to the lines on the return.

Taxpayers who need additional information before deciding what credits, dependents, or deductions they should claim can order any of some 70 specialized IRS publications by using the same order blank used to order forms. These publications are also available from most IRS offices.

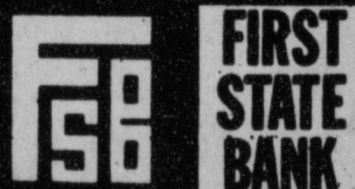

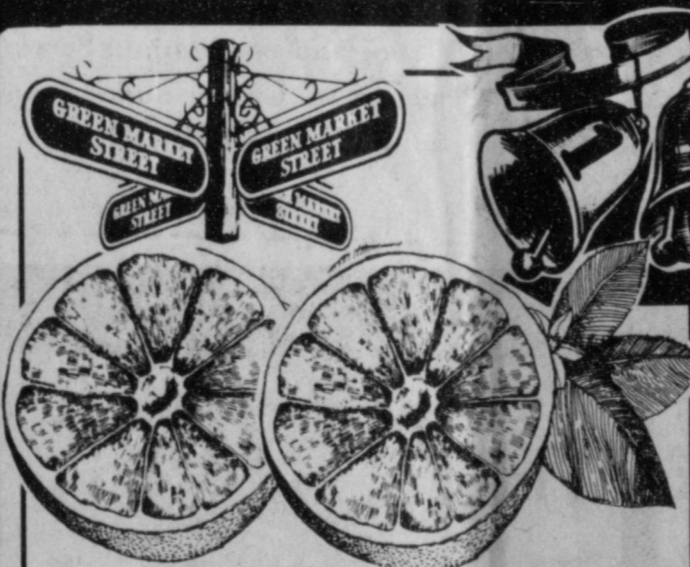

Center. Edna Hays is the director's assistant and telephone reassurance worker. Darla Moyer is the youth assistant and custodial coordinator.

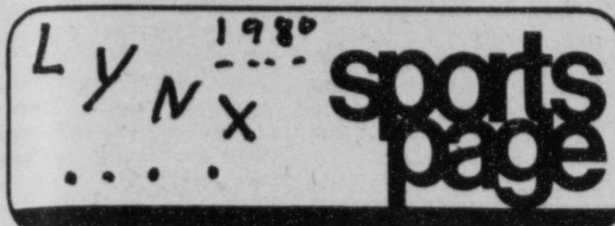

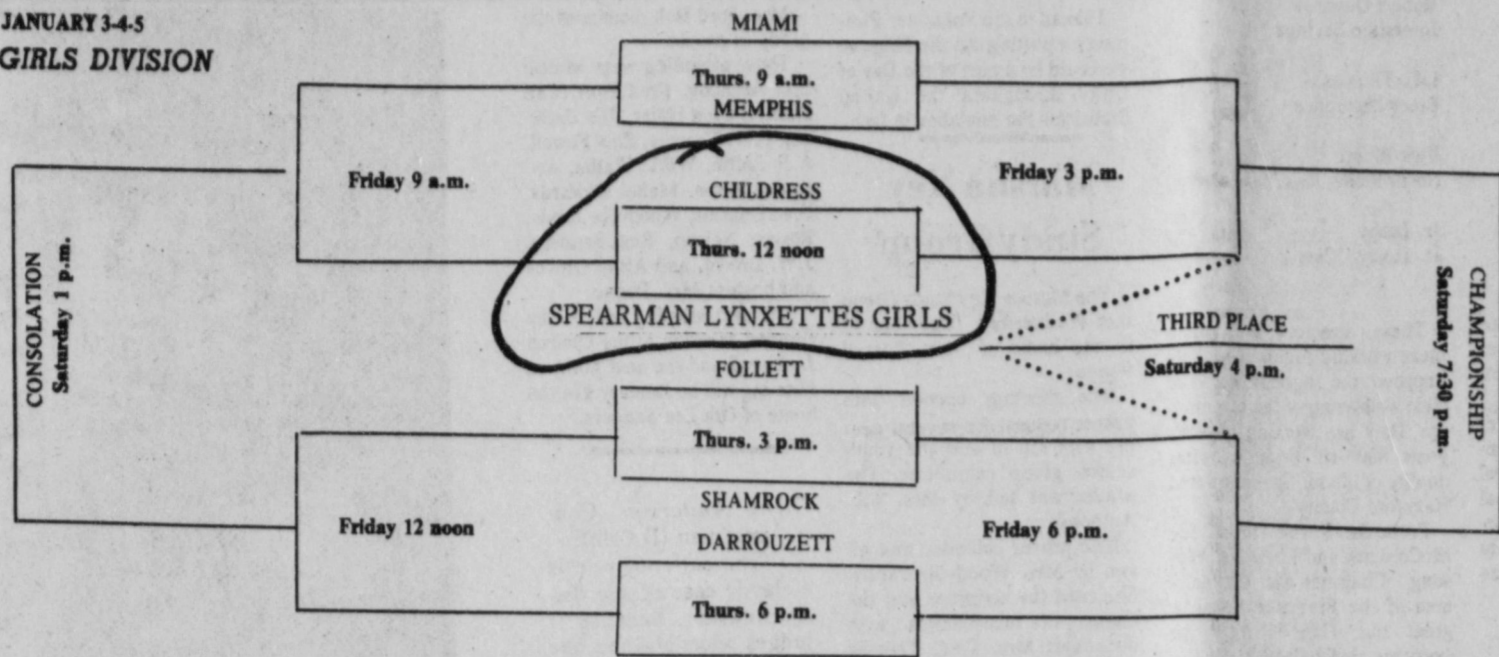

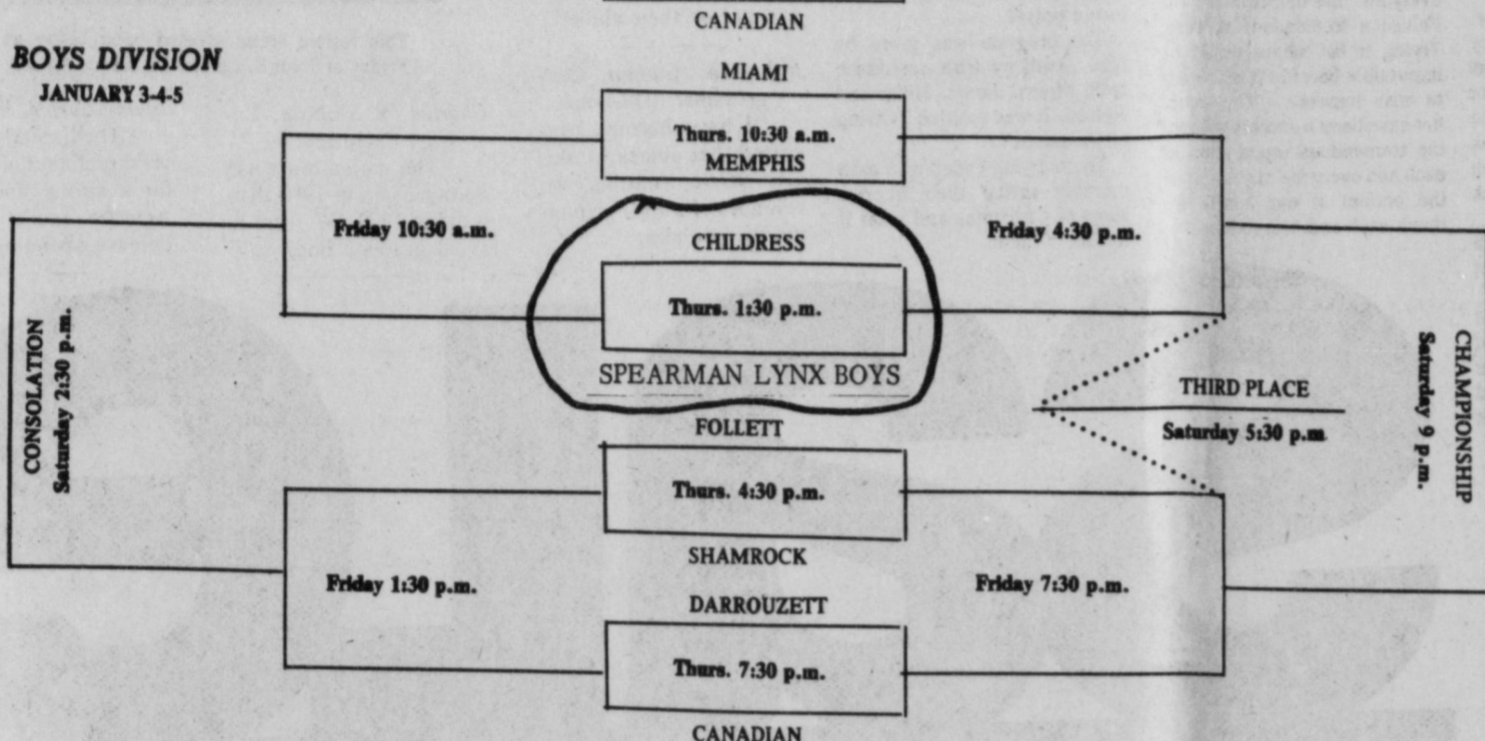

CAULKING consists of moving the tip of a caulking gun along a crack as you squeeze out a thin bead of caulking putty. Fill in all cracks around windows and doors or other openings. Stuff large cracks with insulation before sealing.
