Sgt. Beeson Writes About North Korean Invaders



Sgt. Jimmy Beeson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Beeson mailed the following letter Jan. 24th to his parents. We feel that the letter is very news-worthy, and gives our readers a first hand view of the situation in Korea.

Dear Mom and Dad: How are you doing tonight? Wish I could say things over here are the same as they always have been, but things have been popping around

We are out on the gun right now, on a red alert. This all means that while we are on the alert, that no one can leave. We are supposed to have a round, if they need one, in the air within 2 min-

utes after we are called upon. Am sending you a clipping out of a paper. This deals with why we are like we are now. All of these agents were supposed to have come across the sector about a thousand meters away from the compound where we are now. The guys out on the line haven't been taking things serious, but their ideas have changed real quick.

Intelligence thought the surviving agents would try and come back through where they came in. Right now every available man is up on the front. All compounds have tripled guards, over base camp, which usually has only 18 guards, had 49 last night. Usually these guards only carry 5 rounds of ammo, last night each man had from 40 to 80 rounds a piece.

Out here on the gun, I placed 2 men on guard per shift. They are carrying 40 rounds with 2 hand grenades within easy reach. Usually each man has to put his weapon in the arms room, but I had each of these draw theirs out, clean it and leave it by their bunds.

We aint playing games now. This is all for real, and I sure ain't taking any chances. There has been firing all around us. I don't know if the people have seen anything or they're just shooting at any-

thing that moves. So far tonight, US soldiers have killed 6 invaders and captured 3. And they had brought 6 under fires. That's why we were on alert. The invaders were moving toward our sect-

got your letter from the 19th tonight. I was getting worried but was real glad to

hear that everyone is alright. You asked about the men in the accident. I ha ven't heard a word. I guess they are getting along as good as expected. I know they are keeping one guy doped up so he don't find out that he lost both legs and an arm.

Well mom, I guess I had better close for tonight. Take care of yourself and Unkle Fud for me and remember I love and miss you both very much.






