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M. TeBeest, Oslo Farmer Died Feb. 9th

Mr. TeBeest, 67, departed at his home in the Oslo community on Friday, Feb. 9, from illness which extended over a period of more than a year.

He moved with his family to Oslo, here he was employed on the county roads, up to the time of his illness. At the age of 14 he was baptized in the Presbyterian church at Castlewood, S. D. In 1899 he was married to Miss Johanna TeKrony. She survives her husband. To them 8 children were born. All of these survive their father except Gertrude, who died in 1915 at the age of 13.

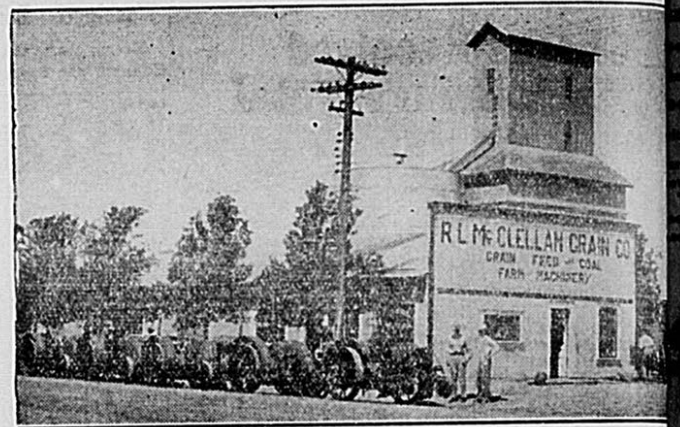

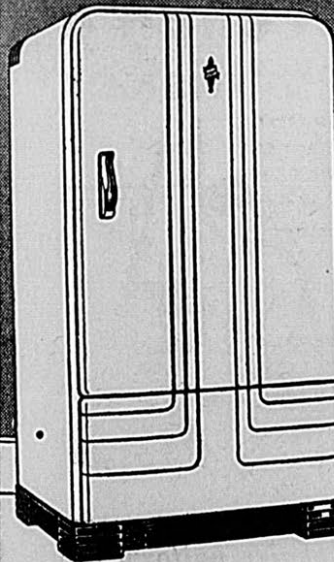

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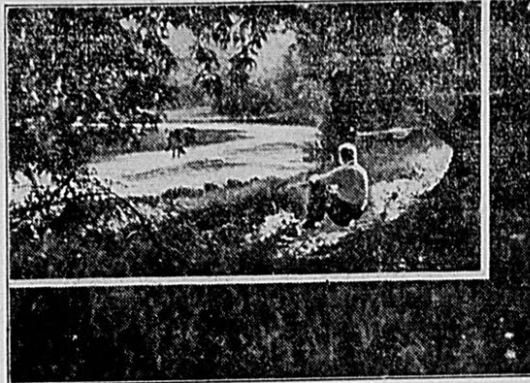

The SNAPSHOT GUILD
CHECK UP ON YOURSELF



Do your summer prints show the care this one does—the deft framing of foliage, judicious placing of figures, strong shadows against brilliant highlights and full exposure for shadow detail? Will trimming them help, as trimming on the white line helps balance this picture? When you make a mistake, do you note it down, so you can avoid it in the future? It's a helpful idea.

FALL is a season for taking stock in many businesses. It is also a good time for the amateur cameraman, after a busy summer, to take stock of himself and his work.

Are you improving? Are you taking better pictures now than you were six months or a year ago? And if not, why not?

If, perchance, you aren't improving as rapidly and steadily as you think you should, I'll venture this is the reason—you aren't studying your mistakes.

The first spare hour you have, why don't you collect all your summer prints and single out those that are bad—the portraits made in harsh sunlight with no provision for the shaded side of the face, the landscapes with dead foregrounds and no "framing" of trees or foliage, the prints that show blank white skies, without clouds or tone.

Recall the scene and then write down on the back of each print what you should have done to make the picture good.

If you have a blank sky or very thin clouds, note down that you should have used a filter.

If a portrait has no detail on the shady side, note that you should have used a reflector near the face on that side, even if it was only a

sheet of cardboard or a white picnic cloth spread in the sun.

If a landscape is dead, analyze it and recall the scene. Maybe by backing up a little or moving to one side, you could have included a gracefully-curving tree branch fairly close to the camera, to give the picture depth and a natural frame. Maybe by a change of position you could have included a path or a hedge that would lead the eye gradually across and into the picture. Write on the back of the print what you should have done.

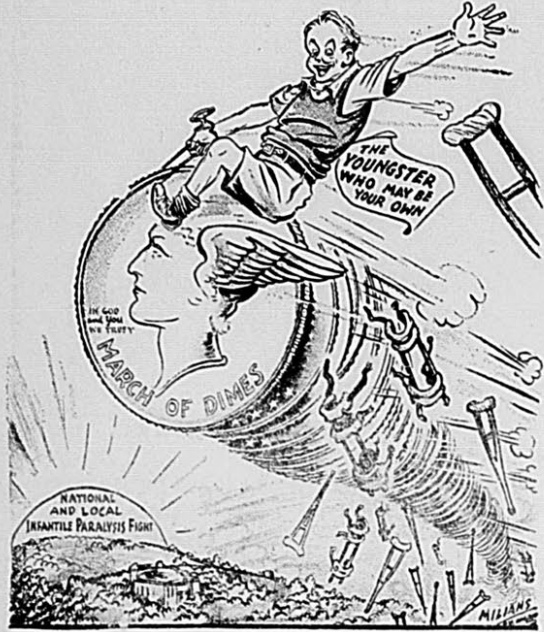
Maybe you have child pictures in which backgrounds are mottled and confused, sticking up in meaningless fashion behind the subject. Another background, a change of viewpoint, might have made each picture perfect. Write down what you should have done.

After you have noted these mistakes, don't just stick the prints away and forget them. Use them as a reference file. Take a few out on your picture-making jaunts and be mindful of them when new picture chances arise.

Learn what you do wrong—decide how to do it right—think before you shoot. Here is one of the secrets of picture-making success.

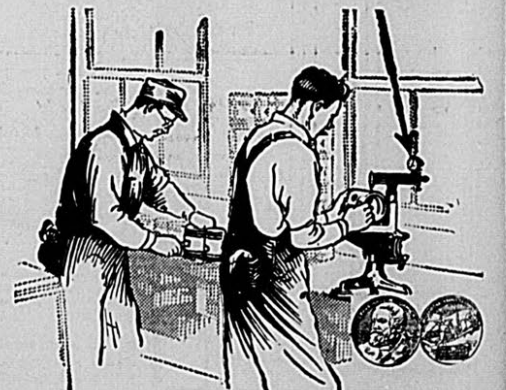

THIRTY YEAR HISTORY OF BOY SCOUT ORGANIZATION

Wednesday Feb 14th 34 Scouts of Spearman ended their participation in the national celebration of the 30th anniversary of Boy Scouts in America. Locally the program consisted of an excellent Church Sunday evening and a Father and Sons banquet held at the Spearman High School on Tuesday of this week. Certainly Spearman can be proud of their 34 scouts who are setting an excellent example in this community.

For the first time during his newspaper experience this writer found an authentic history of the organization and work of Boy Scouts in America. The story appeared in the Tulsa Herald of Tulsa, Texas. We reproduce the history below:

An American business man groped in a London fog three decades ago, and from the mist a boy appeared and inoculated him with the germ of a movement which is to be celebrated Feb. 8-14 as the 30th Anniversary of the founding of the Boy Scouts of America an organization which has penetrated every state in the union and has told part of its story in the citizenship of nearly every country in the world.

The story reflects the ageless search for an organization which would function with and for boys, to serve both youth and the community. It unfolds with touching sometimes dramatic, sometimes prosaic, not unlike the evolution of other ideas which have become integral instruments of modern civilization.

It began with primitive man who developed a ritual for the training of his youth. It found encouragement in the ancient Greek and his games, and it enjoyed adult patronage as boy groups in England under Charles I. —Many years passed before an unusual mixture was evolved—a leader of men schooled in the business of destroying mankind romanticized military training in an effort to make better citizens of his soldiers.

That officer was Robert S. S. Baden-Powell, in charge of the South African Constabulary. He recognized that his men lacked character values; they knew nothing of pioneering of the outdoors, of the things he believed essential for the full life. Ordinary processes of military training did not fit them for life in South Africa. To improve them as individuals, and as members of society, he developed a scheme of group activity with emphasis on the outdoor life.

Lost In Fog
Strangely, England's youth as-

simulated his views as he expressed them in booklets. Possibly the attraction was because of youth's inherent love for a uniform. Nevertheless, he revised his program to suit boys and incorporated in it the somewhat similar views of American youth leaders. The Boy Scouts were therefore established.

One of Baden-Powell's early Scouts was on the alert when an American business man, William D. Boyce, found himself lost in a London fog. He aided the visitor, but instead of accepting a gratuity, he explained that he was a Boy Scout and could not take a tip. He had merely done a "good-turn"—a chance "good turn" which transmitted the Boy Scout program from England to America. The English Scout, whose name has been lost to record, introduced Mr. Boyce to Baden-Powell, and the two conferred on several occasions, discussing the Scouting program.

Mr Boyce was a Chicago publisher interested in boys. He had employed as many as 30,000 boys in magazine sales forces, and long had hunted for an organization which would furnish them with recreation and moral development. In Baden-Powell's program he saw the answer. He recognized that Baden-Powell had incorporated in his youth program a basis for instruction and moral incentive.

Its distinctive features—the Oath, Law, Motto, Uniform and Badge, the Troop and Patrol, and close association with respected leaders, could attract youths and inspire self action among them. He returned to this country, therefore, with a trunkful of literature and a head crammed with ideas and ambition.

Incorporation offered protection more important at the time, it invited mobilization and cooperation of all youth leaders, such as Daniel Carter Beard, who had established "The Society of the Sons of Daniel Boone", and Ernest Thompson Seton, originator of the "Tribute of Woodcraft Indians". Both organizations contained some of the outdoor features incorporated in the planned program for the Boy Scouts of America, and Baden-Powell admittedly had used their theories in developing his program, with the result that the predominant characteristics of each were pooled to complete a balanced program.

The selection of Dr West as executive secretary—he became Chief Scout Executive within a short time—was a stroke of genius. An orphan at six, he became a leader of boys while in an

orphanage, directing their work play and education. He worked his way through high school and graduated from law school at 25. Despite his youth and a physical handicap he was respected as a social worker and helped obtain for Washington a juvenile court, promoted the Washington Playground Association, and was secretary of President Theodore Roosevelt's first White House conference on the care of dependent children. When he accepted the office of executive secretary it was to be temporary, lasting 6 months, the half-year has never ended for him.

The first World War brought Scouting to national interest. It opened with 300,000 boys in uniform, equipped to offer an amazing demonstration of boy power trained and organized for service. Serve they did. They took subscriptions for 2,350,977 Liberty Loan bonds totaling 150 million dollars, located 20 million board feet of standing walnut for the government and gathered the equivalent of 100 carloads of fruit pits for gas masks. They gave nation-wide first aid service in the influenza epidemic which followed the Armistice.
