PIONEER PAPER **OBSERVES 50TH** FOUNDING DATE

Panhandle, Tex., July 29—
Thursday, July 22, marked the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the Panhandle Herald, the first pioneer newspaper in the Panhandle area, to survive for five decades.

H. H. Brooks, the founder, was one of the most picturesque characters, who ever lived in Texas. He left the Henrietta Enterprise in charge of his wife, Margaret J. Brookes, and went to Quanah on the train, then overland to Panhandle.

Taking part of his plant to Panhandle, he began plans for publishing a newspaper. He ordered two pages of ready print and named his paper the Carson City Herald. By the time he was ready to print the other two pages at Panhandle, the name of the city had been changed because of postal requirements.

SIDE LIGHTS

I have submitted to the Com-I have submitted to the Committee on Agriculture suggested provisions for general farm legislation. The measure containing these provisions is based largely on suggestions made by farmers and farm groups and by Committee members. Its major features are as follows.

2. Its declared objective is to establish and maintain so far as is practically parity prices for all farm commodities and parity facome for all farmers, as well as to continue soil conservaton.

3. It provides an ever-normal granary, warehouse, or storage reserve for the five major non-perishable commodities which are ordinarily produced in surplus quantities. This would benefit both producer and consumer.

4. The measure provides a graduated scale of soil conservation and benefit payments so that there will be a reduction in payments to large operators.

5. It provides a fund for search for new uses and new markets for farm commodities and the

This idea of editing a newspa-per and spending half one's time out-of-town is not so hot. The wriout-of-town is not so not. The wri-ter spent fifteen days of June a-way from Spearman and about 18 days of July away from the old home town. It sure makes it a bit hard to get interesting reading material . . .

Some of you boys please ask me where I have been when I meet you on the street. So far it seems that no one has missed my absence from the fair city.

Former city manager Simpson Former city manager Simpson left Spearman a few years ago and sojourned over in Arkansas for a time. 




