PREPERATIONS FOR FAIR COMPLETED

WHEAT SHOWING AT FAIR FEATURES QUALITY

Information given County Agent Joe Hatton relative to the fair at Amarillo states that there will be a special showing for wheat. Special prizes will be awarded and the wheat in this showing will be judged as follows: 25 percent on the wt.; and appearance and 75 percent on milling and baking qualities.

If you have some good wheat that you would like to enter in this event Mr Hatton will be glad to take it to the fair for you. To make a good showing the wheat should be cleaned. It takes two gallon samples to enter in prize contests. Prizes for the best wheat will be awarded by the Texas wheat improvement association. The prizes are as follows: 1st prize \$10 2nd prize, \$5; 3rd prize \$3; 4th prize 2, and 5th 1. Mr Hatton stated Tuesday "If you want me to enter the wheat for you, please bring in your 2 gallon sample by Friday Sept. 13.

Bread baked from the wheat entered will be displayed in the agricultural building on the fair grounds beginning Thursday September 19th.

YOU CAN'T FREEZE EVERYTHING

Despite the remarkable adaptability of frozen food lockers for preservation of fruits and vegetables, there are 5 products—whole celery, lettuce, citrus fruits, cucumbers and tomatoes which are not suited to frozen storage.

However, both citrus and tomato juices may be frozen for storage.

Fruits and vegetables to be frozen should usually be harvested at the stage when they are in the best condition for immediate table use and should be processed immediately.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT DECLINES ON FIRST DAY OF 1940 TERM

Decline in enrollment in both the grade school and the high school was noted in the opening day's work of the 1940-41 term. Supt. Elma Gunn reported a total enrollment of 275 students in the grade schools and 160 students in the high school. On the same date last year the enrollment in the grade school amounted to 281 and the high school students opening day numbered 180. However last year the opening day report was the largest initial enrollment recorded in 6 years. The total for opening day last year was 480 as compared with 435 this year. The fact that Monday was a legal holiday and many students had planned activities of various kinds before the school opening was announced, is believed to be the cause for lower enrollment. Supt. Gunn anticipates a slight increase in the number of students this year over last year schoolastis.

In the grade schools the first four grades accounted for 150 students and the intermediate 125. There are 32 beginners and 40 7th grade students.

While the high school enrollment is incomplete, the records show there are now 29 freshmen 40 sophomores, 45 juniors and 46 seniors. Should the present enrollment stand it would constitute a Believe It Or Not. As a rule the enrollment shows a large freshman class, and smaller classes up to the seniors, who usually are outnumbered by all other classes. The senior class of 46 this year is one of the largest in the history of the school.

Sponsors for the high school classes are Mrs Wilbanks, freshman; Miss Deakin and Mr Jackson sophomore; Miss Hughes and Mr Powell juniors, and Mrs Caldwell seniors.

There is an enrollment of 66 in Home Economics. 1 18; 2, 23 and 3rd year 25.

There are 60 typing students enrolled.

The senior band will have 60 or more and the junior band will have 40 to 50.

Good ingredients and the necessary skill in handling are easily acquired; and baking presents no problem when you use a modern electric range. Accurately controlled temperature and uniform heat in the ovens of these new ranges insure even baking and browning whether your recipe requires high temperature or low. Just set the electric thermostat and turn the switch. Ovens pre-heat quickly and no waiting is necessary.

The fresh fruit season means pies and more pies. This Deep Dish Blueberry Pie is simple to make and it's the kind that will win praise from your family and your guests.



To Keep Left-over Pieces of Pastry Flaky
 Lay the small pieces of left-over pastry carefully on top of each other, keeping them right side up. Then, using a rolling pin, pat and roll gently, and use as desired.



To Keep Pastry Canvas From Slipping
 Sprinkle a small quantity of water on the table top and cover with the pastry canvas. The water holds the canvas taut.

To Improve the Flavor of Fruit Pie
 To improve the flavor of cherry, peach, or apricot pie, sprinkle with a few drops of almond extract. If fruit pies are a little flat in flavor, add a tablespoon or two of lemon juice.

To Cook Cream Fillings
 Cook cream fillings for pies on the surface unit of your electric range, without a double boiler. A choice of 5 measured heats on these new-type units provides just the proper heat for ever cooking operation.

To Keep a Pie Shell From Blistering
 When baking a pie shell without the filling, prick the crust with a fork many times before baking.

To Keep Juicy Pies From "Running Over"
 If you have difficulty with fruit pies boiling over in the oven, try this: Place pastry in pan as usual and fill with fruit. Then cut the top crust, cutting it about 1/2-inch smaller all around than the pie pan. Place on the pie and bake as usual. The 1/2-inch opening all around the edge prevents juices from boiling over.



- Deep Dish Blueberry Pie**
- 1 flaky pie crust (unbaked)
 - 1 quart blueberries
 - 3/4 cup granulated sugar
 - 3 tablespoons flour
 - 3 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 teaspoon lemon peel (grated)

Line a good deep pie dish with flaky pie crust. Clean blueberries and drain. Place in pie dish and cover with sugar which has been mixed with the flour. Sprinkle with lemon juice and grated lemon peel. Cover with top crust. Press together firmly and flute edges. Cut a slit in top for steam to escape. Bake in hot oven with the electric thermostat set at 425° for about 35 minutes.

Puddings Are Popular

SOMEHOW even the best meal
tastes better when it's topped
off with just the right dessert. And
when that dessert is an old-fash-
ioned, steamed, "Huckleberry Pud-
ding," it makes a meal something
to be long remembered!

Old fashioned steamed puddings
have come into their own again,
now that they can be prepared in
the easy, modern manner. And an
easy manner it is, when you can do
the steaming in the deep well
cooker of a new electric range!

Just pour about
2 cups of water
into the cooker
kettle, and place
the trivet or
rack in the bot-
tom of the ket-
tle. Put pudding
molds on the
trivet, cover and turn switch to
High until steam
escapes from the
vent. Then turn switch to third
position, and continue steaming.
There's no watching necessary, no
standing over a hot stove and no
"timing" either, if you set the elec-
tric timer to tell you when the
cooking's done.

Steamed Blueberry or Huckleberry
Pudding
(Serves 5-6)
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg (beaten)
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/4 cups flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
1 cup blueberries or
huckleberries

Cream shortening and add sugar
gradually, creaming until light and
fluffy. Add beaten egg and blend
well. Sift dry ingredients together and
add to the creamed mixture alternately
with the milk. Fold in berries and
pour batter into greased pudding
mold and cover.
Pour 2 cups of water into the

well cooker of modern electric
range, place trivet or rack in pos-
ition, and place pudding pan on
rack. Cover, and turn switch to
High until steam
escapes, then
turn switch to
third position
and continue
cooking for 2
hours. Unmold
on serving dish,
and serve with Orange Cream
Sauce.

Orange Cream Sauce
1/2 cup butter
1 cup confectioner's sugar
1 egg (separated)
1 teaspoon lemon juice
3 tablespoons orange juice
Dash of salt

Cream butter and add sugar
gradually, creaming until light and
fluffy. Add egg yolk, fruit juices
and salt and beat until well blend-
ed. Fold in stiffly beaten egg white.

When you want perfect pecan
meats for decorat-
ing cakes or
puddings, try
this: Cover the
nuts with boil-
ing water and
allow them to
stand in the
water until it
becomes cold. Then remove, and
proceed as usual.

Scald and dry orange and lemon
peel. Grind into a coarse powder,
and use for flavoring sauces, pud-
dings, cakes, etc.

Use the deep well cooker on your
modern electric range for steaming
bread.

To make a delicious sauce for
puddings and ice creams, whip bits
of leftover jelly until light, and
combine with chopped nut meats
and a little whipped cream.
