### IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FOR WHEAT ASKED

With wheat planting time fast approaching, County Agent Joe Hatton this week suggested that farmers think seriously on a type of grain to be sown that will afford them the greatest return from a standpoint of a quality harvest.

"This past year wheat on the Plains has declined in quality, according to millers of flour, and Hansford county farmers are among those forgetting that the miller, the housewife, and the baker are the ones who must be satisfied.

"We are not making a sales talk for a particular brand of wheat. The significant thing is that it be a grain with a high baking quality and high protein content to satisfy the demands of the Eastern bakers.

"At the present time there is considerable discussion suggesting a penalty for such varieties as Chiefton and Early Blackball are planted, and on the other hand, offer a premium for planters of Turkey Red, Konrad and Tinmarq.

According to information received here Turkey Red and Tinmarq rank high in baking quality and are good producers with Blackhull running second to the two varieties.

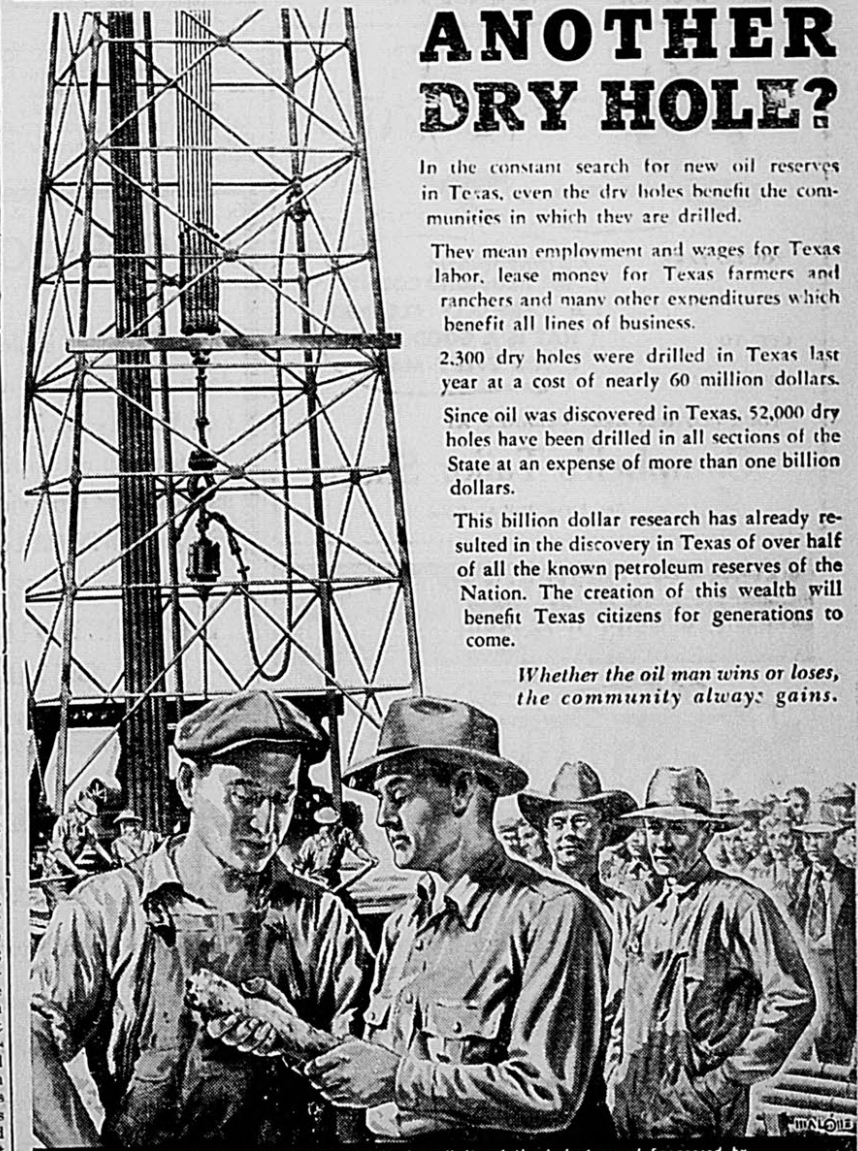

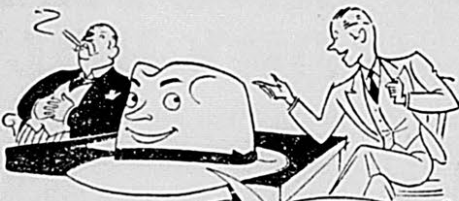

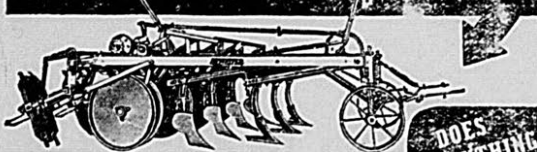

(Note No. 1 below). Later you level ridges and prepare an excellent seed bed, leaving layer of trash on top to prevent soil-blowing. (Note No. 2 below). Then, with machine as shown below you deposit seed on a wide, 6-in. moist seed bed, covering seed uniformly with a layer of moist soil. (Note No. 3 below).

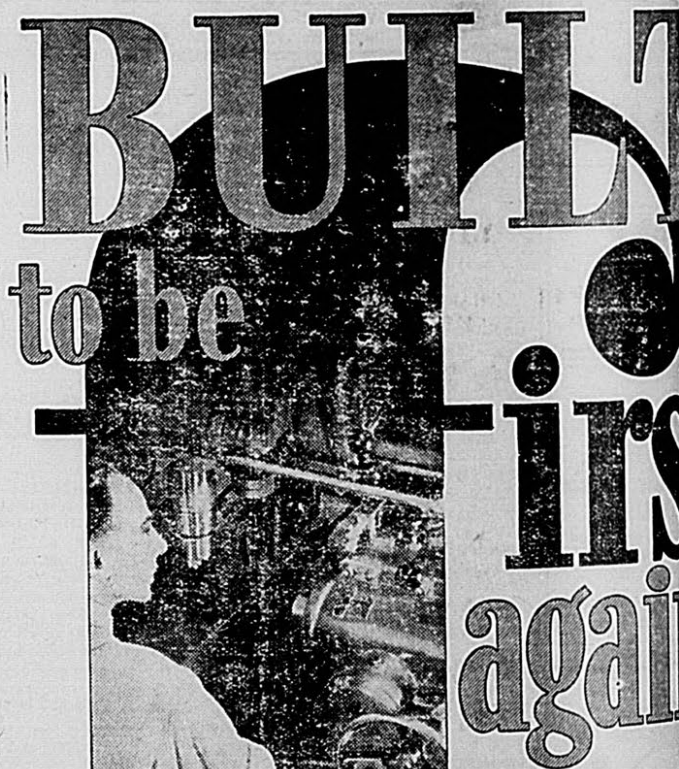
