The record shows that Perryton beat Wellington only 7-6 whereas Panhandle beat Wellington 33 to 0. Spearman lost to White Deer by a smaller score than Canyon lost to White Deer, and when you study the situation, you begin to realize that the Spearman Lynx team would not look so bad in any other section of class A than the bracket they are playing in. Truly the North Plains have several outstanding teams in our class A bracket. White Deer, Canadian, Panhandle and Phillips will stage a real battle for the regional championship, and it doesn't matter which team represents our bracket, it will likely win to the final game. Perryton is rated much better than Spearman, but Spearman, even at the bottom of the list can do more against Perryton on our own home field than any team they will play.

Apparently the local school officials face a problem of deciding whether they shall stay in class A football or go to class B. This year if the team was in class B we would play such teams as Higgins, Pollett, Miami, Le-fors, and perhaps this one year we would have more interesting contests and make a much better record if we were in the class B bracket.

BARKLEY ATTENDS WATER CONSERV. MEET

Judge A. F. Barkley returned this week from a meeting of the Panhandle Water Conservation Association of the Panhandle country held at Amarillo, stated the organization was keeping alive the program of building lakes and conserving water in the drouth areas of the states. Barkley stated that the association, which represents some 26 counties of the Panhandle both in Texas and New Mexico, was lending the aid of their organization to a new movement which has as its objective, the organization of a home guard unit to replace the national guard, now in active service.

Tentative plans call for the Commissioners Court and the Chamber of Commerce to appoint a representative from each county, these representatives to meet in Amarillo and draft out a plan for organization and operation of home guard units.

GENE WORLEY PRESENTED CONGRESS

Gene Worley of Shamrock, Congressman elect, was the luncheon guest of Texas members of Congress at Washington last Monday.

Worley was taken onto the House floor by Rep. Thomason of El Paso and introduced to other Texans, according to press dispatches.

The 31-year old nominee told the Texas delegation that he realized the handicap he faced in succeeding Marvin Jones who is chairman of the House agricultural committee, but pledged to give his best service.

He was in Washington simply to get acquainted and to apply for an office suite.

Worley will visit this city soon and tell his plans for the continuing of the agricultural programs for this county.

Let There Be No Procrastination

Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel last week formally issued a proclamation calling upon men subject to conscription to register on October 16, at their respective voting places.

Required to register under terms of the proclamation are all men who have reached the 21st anniversary of their birth and who shall not have reached the 36th anniversary, excepting officers in the various army reserve branches, diplomatic representatives.

Those who because of sickness are unable to present themselves for registration on Oct. 16 shall apply to the county clerk for instructions on how they may be registered by agent.

Those who expect to be away from home on registration day, may register with the nearest registrar who will forward the registration to the proper registrar.

All persons assisting the county clerk will volunteer their services without pay. The voting places in each precinct must be opened without cost to the government.

There can be NO ABSENTEE registrations and each person subject to registration MUST register wherever he happens to be on Oct. 16.

business of registering prospective one year soldiers. Hoskins distributed sample forms of the registration blank over the county so they might be placed in store windows and prospective registrants might study the form and become familiar with the questions that will be asked them on that day. All young men are requested to look over this form and be prepared to answer the questions as rapidly as possible.

F. W. Brandt, in charge of registration at the court house box in Spearman has estimated that it will keep his chosen volunteer aid pretty busy registering a minimum of 70 men Oct. 16. Mr Close in charge of school house box believes he will register a minimum of 40 men on registration day.

Supplies for 1000 prospective service men were shipped Mr Hoskins, which represents a bit of waste since there has not been a total vote in Hansford county above 1300 in many years.

Hoskins announces that a school of instructions will be held at the court house at 7:30 p.m. Monday Oct. 14. Every election judge who has assumed the responsibility of registering men and all their help are urged to attend this meeting Monday night.

HANSFORD COUNTY TAXPAYERS

Your state and county taxes became due on Oct. 1, 1940, and can be paid any time after that date up to and including Jan. 31, 1941, without penalty or interest.

The new law allows a discount on 1940 taxes if paid during October, November or December, as follows:

- 3% discount on State taxes if paid during October, 1940.
2% discount on State taxes if paid during November, 1940.
1% discount on State taxes if paid during December, 1940

NO discount if paid in January, 1941. Penalty and interest start February 1, 1941.

The above discounts applies on State Taxes only.

Taxes may be paid in half payments, provided the first half and polls are paid by Nov. 30, 1940; second half should be paid by June 30, 1941. No discount allowed on first half taxes. Discount allowed on last half as follows: Dec. 1 to April 1, 3 percent; April 2 to May 1, 2 percent; May 2 to May 31, 1 percent.

CERTIFICATE OF TITLE LAW IN EFFECT—

Another new law that went into effect Oct. 1, 1939, is the Certificate of Title Law. After this date it will be unlawful to offer for sale or trade any motor vehicle without first obtaining a certificate of title to same. Applications for title is to be made at the office of the tax collector of the county in which you reside. For further information concerning this new law, inquire at the office of county tax assessor and collector.
