OIL MEN GATHER AT FORT WORTH

FORT WORTH—Oil's first rotary drilling rig will spud in the celebration here Oct. 31 and Nov. 2 of the 45th anniversary of the birth of the Texas oil industry.

Powered by a blind mule hitched to a pole, the original rig will drill again to open the anniversary convention of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association. The ancient rig, which was located at Corsicana by President E. L. Smith, of the association, will be set up on a vacant space near convention headquarters here and drilling of a wildcat oil test started under supervision of the rig's owner, J. E. and C. E. Rittersbacher of Corsicana. Positively no stock in the wildcat test will be sold. The rig was built in 1883 for water well drilling.

Red Cross Roll Call Starts November Eleventh

At a Red Cross Roll Call Regional Conference which representatives of the Hansford county chapter will attend in Amarillo, national defense as a major Red Cross obligation will be stressed in formulation of plans for the annual Roll Call, Nov. 11 to 30, R. L. McClellan, chapter chairman said today.

Bruce Sheets, Roll call chairman P. A. Lyon, Mrs. P. A. Lyon, J. E. Gunn, and others plan to

attend the meeting.

Also at the meeting will be chapter leaders from 40 other counties. The Amarillo conference is one of 41 planned in the Red Cross 17-state midwestern area early this fall as an initial step toward strengthening chapter membership to help meet added responsibilities of the Red Cross locally and nationally. Members of the National Red Cross staff will attend.

In the past 12 months, a normal year, the Red Cross aided

53,000 soldiers and an additional 200,000 veterans including dependents, he said. Now that an army of 1 million or more men is imminent, the Red Cross must prepare for a proportionate increase in demand for its services.

In view of world conditions, the Red Cross nursing strength now standing at 42,000 must be materially strengthened, he pointed out. Also more thousands of first aiders will be trained in industries engaged in war material production.

The local draft board, P. A. Lyon, F. W. Brant, and W. L. Russell, are in charge of the draft and the advisory committee will answer to them.

RED CROSS WILL AID DRAFTEES

To relatives and friends of men registering today for military training, Bruce Sheets, chairman of the Hansford Red Cross chapter, extended assurance the Red Cross is making full preparation for expansion to deal with welfare problems of all men who enter service as well as their families at home.

Pointing out that the Red Cross is the government's official agency chartered to deal with personal or family problems of men of the army and navy, Mr. Sheets said the public will be asked for increased membership support during the organization's annual Roll Call, Nov. 11 to 30.

Army hospitals have already asked for more than 4,000 nurses to be on duty by next July. The first groups have been called, on September 15 and another recently. For convalescents, Red Cross 'Gray Ladies' will write letters, read books, provide games and other amusements. Red Cross volunteers will make comfort items for hospitalized men.

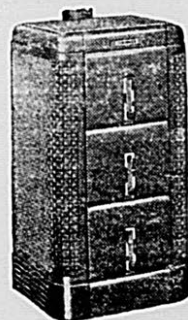
