FOUR PAGES THIS WEEK

Oak mountains, bull basin, sycamore canyon and etc. It is a fact that two of the three bucks killed by our party from Texas were killed within sight of the little Rastjen cabin. Although we were not patient enough to hunt that way—we could have strolled out from the house several hundred yards, carried a comfortable chair, and killed our bucks without much effort. I tell the world that none in our party were that patient.

I have two believe-it-or-not incidents to report as result of this deer hunt. Harry Hastjen, from Canadian, who was the instigator of this trip, carried his young son fishing Sunday before we started on our trip Monday Oct. 14. Harry is a real specimen of manhood—six foot four and 256 pounds of muscle, and it is all muscle and bone except a small area near the waist line. He wrenched his back while rowing a small boat Sunday, and the doctors at Canadian forbid him to make the trip. He declares it took him 7 minutes time to get into a car when he started on his way from Canadian. It really took him 5 minutes getting out of his car at Spearman and loading into my car when we started on our trip. He absolutely suffered terrible pain on the 746 mile drive to the Rastjen ranch near Flagstaff. Tuesday he was able to walk a little, and when he saw a Buck he hit a dead run (for the house to get his rifle)—then he thought about it being the day before the season opens—and he dropped into a crippled walk. By Wednesday noon Harry was doing the dixie doodle, and he plumb forgot he was an invalid on Thursday—at least long enough to bag a four point deer at Twin Oak mountains. Saturday Harry walked on 'old Baldie' and he walked so fast that he left me far, far behind. It's a fact that he got plumb cured during this deer hunt, and his local doctors told him he could not even get out of his car.

The other believe-it-or-not happened late Thursday night. As I have related I missed 17 shots at Turkeys, and the two Rastjen boys bagged two turkeys each. The birds were pretty badly shot up, and we just skinned three of them and prepared em for cooking. The other turkey had been shot just where the neck joins the body, and was in good shape. We scalded this hen and packed her for bringing home. Just about the time we got her picked ready to hang out, we noticed her craw was bursted. Frank Rastjen took his knife and emptied the craw and believe it or not—five hours after this bird had been shot, a live grasshopper jumped out of the craw and hopped around in the cabin. The only explanation is that the Turkey swallowed the hopper just before she was shot.

I'm telling the world that Frank Rastjen, our host, is the best equipped and best trained cook I ever ate after. He is one man that loves to see his friends eat—and how we did get results from the Texas delegation who visited him. Just as a starter Frank would hand you a heaping bowl of oatmeal, a large oversize biscuit, a small barrel of log cabin syrup. By the time you have this appetizer stored away, a second helping of biscuits would roll out accompanied by liver and onions and shoe string potatoes. Then when you are plumb full, Frank hands out thick slices of tenderized ham topped off with two eggs looking at you. Of course you have to eat flapjacks and grape jelly as a closing cap to a quickly thrown together breakfast. I won't take time to give you the menu for our other meal (we only ate two meals each day). However I will mention that buck steak, roast beef baked and fried turkey, ham that had been basked in port wine and baked with pineapple and bacon ham hocks and beans, turnips and sow bellie, corn bread and prune cake, apple pies, pumpkin pies, chocolate and cocoanut cake, and lots and lots of good old mountain dew (water) was included in the menu.

To those 500 people who I promised to give a buck steak—I will say that Eddie Fay has taken over the deer meat. She has it locked in our locker at the Equity, and says she is going to figure out some way to take care of all my friends. I never once expected to bring back a Buck or I wouldn't have promised everyone in Hansford county a deer feed.

FIRST DRAFT DRAWING TO BE HELD OCT. 29

According to information carried in the daily papers of the state the first lottery or drawing of numbers for the national draft of soldiers will be held on Oct. 29.

A study of publicity stories released from the national draft board headquarters indicate the numbers corresponding to the lottery numbers will be the first potential soldiers of each county in the nation subject to selective draft. For example, if the first number drawn should be number 10, then every young man with the serial number ten would be contacted for immediate service. It is estimated that it will take 15 to 20 hours to complete the first lottery, with high governmental officials drawing the numbers. The first number will be drawn by Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson. Prior to the first drawing President Roosevelt will launch the program with a radio address from Washington.

It is understood that questioners will be forwarded all men who hold a ticket for the first lottery. In other words, before any men are called into active service, they will be questioned carefully for indication of exemptions.

Local officials believe there will be very few from Hansford county that will be required to report in the first lottery. It is the understanding that the total number registered by any local board will be 3,500. Thus with less than 400 registered in Hansford county, there would only be a nominal number selected when the choice comes from a group of 3,500.

Printed below will be found the names and serial number of every man in Hansford county registered to date. We suggest that local people keep this issue of the paper and use it as a reference for the coming draft. When the national lottery is made known, a Hansford county man can refer to this list and know instantly whether or not he is among those who are subject to immediate call for active service. One can trace the numbers and know who of his friends are among those called to service.

The letter S is for Spearman. M. for Morse, rt. route, st. star route, H. for Hitchland and G. for Gruver, gl. general delivery and rd. rural free delivery.

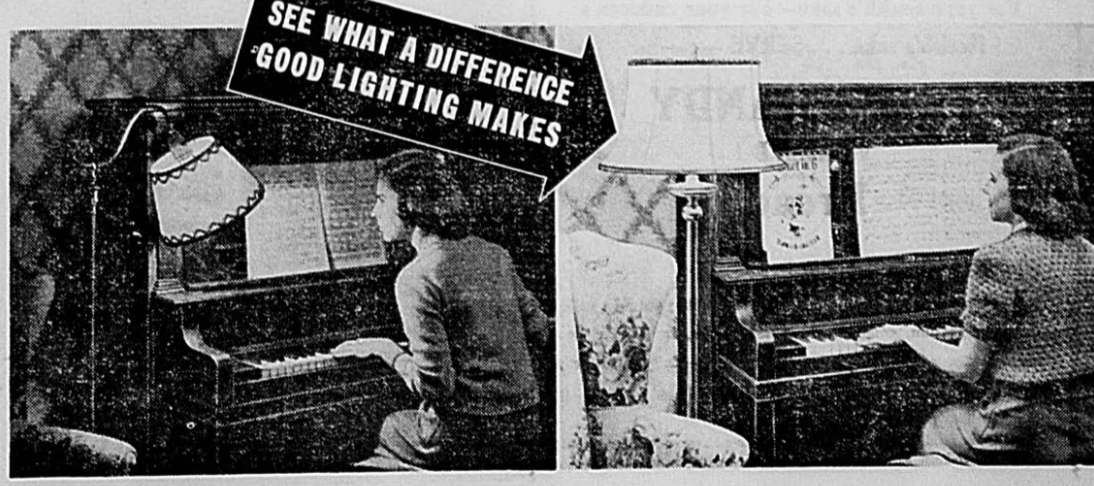
