### CARL BAIZE OF BORGER HELD ON ASSULT CHARGE

Carl Baize, Borger, is held in the Stinnett jail awaiting action of the grand jury of Hutchinson county, after arrest on charges of assault.

On the afternoon of Oct. 23 Baize joined M. R. Hall of Fort Sumpter, N. M., aiding him in selling a truck load of apples. He is alleged to have urged Hall to come to Stinnett, and then to Spearman to dispose of his apples. It is alleged that Baize routed Hall over the old Borger-Spearman highway, and that when the truck was in the Holt neighborhood, he is alleged to have asked Hall to stop for some cause, and struck him with some instrument, knocking Hall unconscious. The incident happened before sundown, it is alleged. When Hall regained consciousness, according to his statement, and drove to Spearman he was in a bad physical condition and could not steer his truck very carefully, and fell out of his truck when he stopped in Spearman, according to Constable Bob Crawford who came to the truck by Hall, and immediately phoned a description of the offender to Borger. Carl Baize was arrested Thursday morning at Borger, and it is alleged \$28.00 missing from the pockets of M. H. Hall was found on his person.

### SPEARMAN BOY IS HONORED AT CANYON

Roy Lee Jones, honor student of West Texas State, Canyon, and one of the best athletes of the college, was honored this week when he received the coveted award for averaging the highest grade of any athlete during the 1938-39 college year. The trophy was presented Roy Lee at a meeting of the student body in the auditorium Wednesday of this week. The average grade was over an entire year, and is one of the most coveted honors of the entire college. Dr Hill presented the award and lauded the Spearman student for the excellent work, and the fine example he was setting for his classmates. Incidentally, Roy Lee is one of the most valuable members of the football and basketball teams of the college. ### Draft Information

Only 34 men registered in Hansford county were included in the numbers of the first 1,500 drawn from the famous fish bowl at Washington, Tuesday of this week, when the national lottery for classification of men subject to army training during the next five years was begun. Since the total classification is not available to this paper in time for publication, we are carrying the names only of the first 34 men selected. According to information from the local selective draft board, questionnaires will be mailed the first contingent of classified men just as soon as the master list showing their order of classification is received in Spearman. This list will likely be received in Spearman about Nov. 5. Questionnaires will be mailed and the men classified for duties just as rapidly as possible.

Local board authorities believe that less than 20 men will be asked for as the Hansford quota for 1940-41. This is based on the fact that the entire enrollment for this county is below 375 men, and the quota asked by the government for the first year will represent approximately 20 percent of the total enrolled man power within the age limit to be trained during the 5 year plan. This county will likely receive credit for volunteer enlistments.

The first call, it is understood will require less than 5 percent of the entire years quota. It is not likely that Hansford county will be asked to send a man for the first quota.

It is interesting to note that out of the 34 men whose number have been drawn and whose names appear above, 21 are married and will be given a deferred classification immediately. Of this number 10 men are known to be single, and would likely fall into the classification ready for immediate duty. The other 4 men are unknown among Spearman people, and might fall in either of the above mentioned classes.

Twenty of the men in this list of 34 live either in or receive their mail from the Spearman post office. Seven of the men are listed with Gruver addresses, 1 man has Hitchland for his post office and one receives his mail from Morse with 5 remaining men of this list getting their mail on the Texhoma route.

The complete list showing the order in which all men of the army service age are classified according to the national lottery will be carried in next weeks paper.

### LYNX WILL PLAY RANGERS FOR FINAL GAME

What has been the traditional game of games for the past 11 years—the annual football clash between the Spearman Lynx and the Perryton Rangers, will be played at Perryton this year on Friday evening Nov. 1. While this is a change from the usual exchange of games each year on Armistice day, the change which gives the game to Perryton was agreed on by local school officials at a meeting held in Perryton Monday night of this week. The Spearman team joined Class A football last year, and the rules of the new classification call for all conference games to be played on turf and lighted fields. Perryton did not force the issue and demand their rights in this case but asked for the game on the grounds that the lighted field at night would accommodate more of their fans, and likewise allow more supporters from Spearman to attend. They were very generous in their terms guaranteeing Spearman Lynx \$100 and dividing the gate equally after expenses had been deducted. This will give the local team a chance to make more money out of the game, and the season, and enable the school authorities to award the players with representative awards for their years work in the sport. The game officially completes the Lynx schedule, but there is some talk of trying to make a game with Stinnett or Pampa

### VESTER HILL ATTENDS FIRESTONE MEET

Vester Hill, attended a convention of Firestone dealers held at Amarillo Tuesday night of last week. Mr Hill reports more than 100 dealers of the Panhandle at the meeting, and a display of Firestone Products that warmed his heart. Vester said that the reports at the meeting were to the effect that the tire company industry did not expect a shortage of raw rubber for manufacturing tires. He said Firestone was one of three national manufacturers who was prepared to manufacture tires with synthetic rubber in case of a shortage of raw materials. Vester said the average cost of synthetic rubber tires would advance about \$5.00 per tire if this process was used. He saw samples of tires made from synthetic rubber, and stated tests show that they outlast the average tire.

Local people believe the time is approaching for the tide to turn, and perhaps in this game Friday the Lynx will begin a series of wins. Comparative figures give Perryton all the advantages. They have larger and more experienced players and have a better record for the year. However, as Principal Fred Rattan states, the Perryton team is not rated more than two touchdowns better than Spearman—and in the annual important game of the season—two touchdowns do not mean a thing.

## Hansford County Oil Test Begins

Construction of a 96 foot steel oil derrick is underway at this time on Block 2 Section 2, WC-Ry Co. Survey, Hansford County, land of Charles O'Laughlin, just over the county line East of Ochiltree county and 15 miles northwest of Spearman.

Contract has been let to the Fain Drilling company of Pampa and Oklahoma City, for the erection of the derrick and drilling of the well. Contract depth is not available at this time. Location of the well is 990 feet from the east line of Section 2 and 990 feet from the south line of Section 2 block 2. The well is approximately 3 miles Northeast of the Johnnie O'Laughlin homestead in section 60 block 2 WC Ry Co survey. Rogers Rig company of Pampa have the contract for erection of the steel derrick, and indications are that the well will be spudded in within the next 15 days. We are informed that ITIO have a block of 36 sections under lease and that the Magnolia oil company have some 12 to 14 sections leased near the ITIO block. Advance information indicates the drilling crew and workers at the well will locate at Spearman, provided they can get modern accommodations, during the life of the drilling contract.

Although 'Looking Around' is not a new department, this is the first time it has been completed this year. This week the Looking Around writer visited the Primary department. The Halloween theme seemed to be dominant in all the rooms.

Mrs Campbell's first grade pupils have made owls, Jack O'Lanterns, clowns, pumpkins, black cats, and humpty dumpty. After these were completed, some of the owls and jack o'lanterns were posted along the side of the room. Still others were hung on the door, and several were fixed around the edge of the sand table I might mention that the sand table is a miniature farm, complete with a house, barns, farm implements, all kinds of livestock and even some miniature poultry. Some of the children really carried out the Halloween spirit by placing some of the pumpkins and owls, and witches by the house, and one of the owls was placed in the chimney! All of these owls, etc, were made entirely by the first grade pupils.

Stepping right across the hall I found Miss Roach's second grade. Bats, weird witches, and neatly arranged around the black board. All of the work was representative of the class—in fact every student had some of his own work displayed. On the bulletin board several of the free hand drawings were exhibited. These drawings certainly prove that some of these youngsters are young artists. The sand table was beautifully decorated with small pumpkins.

Next I visited Mrs Skinner's third grade room, where I found a large jack o'lantern which could be lighted. I was told that prior to my visit the room had been darkened and the lantern lighted. When lighted the lantern was pretty. Around the border halloween posters, pmpkins, cats and bats were displayed. An added attraction of this room is the museum, which has been started. Among this collection were Indian relics, cotton bolls, petrified wood, sea shells, gourds, flint, snake skins, moss, beetle, moth, cocoons, and pressed flowers. This collection is very valuable to the students in their study of geography, since so many different parts of the country are represented. For example the sea shells came from Oregon and California. The pupil that contributed these had either visited in California and Oregon or knew something of these states; therefore they were able to tell the class something of interest of these states.

Upon entering Miss Spark's room, the fourth grade, I found the pupils all busily studying. This active group, under the leadership of Miss Sparks, have created some very neat halloween posters, black cats, broom riding witches, brown owls and pumpkins. All of these are attractively arranged around the black board. This room really expressed the halloween spirit. These pupils as well as their teacher are to be complimented upon this splendid work.

To complete this enjoyable visit I dropped into Mrs. Loftin's third and fourth grade. Here I found the pupils discussing their lesson. Black cats, and all the halloween trimmings were the foremost decorations in this room. Not only is this work neat, but also it is attractively arranged. It shows that the pupils have put forth much effort in making these decorations, and the quality of this work shows that the teacher has carefully supervised the children.
